New poetry anthology *Woven* weaves together First Nations voices from around the globe

Magabala Books, in collaboration with Red Room Poetry, is thrilled to announce the release of *Woven* out 1 February 2024, a groundbreaking poetry anthology edited by Anne-Marie Te Whiu, that brings together some of the world's leading First Nations poets.


In a world first, the anthology features collaborations by 30 First Nations poets from around the globe, including Jackie Huggins and Linda Tuhiwai Smith (Aotearoa NZ), Ali Cobby Eckermann and Joy Harjo (USA), Tony Birch and Simon J. Ortiz (USA), Ellen van Neerven and Layli Long Soldier (USA), Evelyn Araluen and Anahera Gildea (Aotearoa NZ) to name but a few.

'By anchoring the project in relationality, *Woven*'s foundation is about how we connect with each other and what we are prepared, as First Nation artists, to offer and receive. The emphasis was about (re)generating poetic First Nations bonds – solidarity, consensus, family, land, oceans, the moon, remembering, dreaming, sharing, opening, mourning, respect, celebrating, finding, losing, healing and more healing,' explains Anne-Marie Te Whiu.

With poets from various First Nations backgrounds, including Sami, Māori, Chamoru, American First Nations, and Indigenous Australians, the anthology offers a diverse and experimental range of poetic styles, reflecting the rich tapestry of First Nations voices. The poems are anchored in community, place, and ancestral connections and are a remarkable example of intercultural dialogue.

'We are incredibly excited about the release of *Woven*,' says Magabala Editor Arlie Alizzi. 'This anthology is a unique and bold experiment in Indigenous poetry that reflects respect, solidarity, and mutual recognition across international borders.'

Woven will officially be launched at the Aotearoa NZ Festival of the Arts in February 2024. Following the launch in Wellington, *Woven* will have its Australian launch in March 2024 at the Blak&Bright festival in Naarm (Melbourne).
