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SAVE THIS BOOK

This is an unvented gas-fired heater. It uses air (oxygen) from the room in which it is installed. Provisions for adequate combustion and ventilation air must be provided. Refer to <u>Air For Combustion and Ventilation</u> section on page 7 of this manual.

▲ WARNING: Improper installation, adjustment, alteration, service or maintenance can cause injury or property damage. Refer to this manual for correct installation and operational procedures. For assistance or additional information consult a qualified installer, service agency or the gas supplier.

This appliance may be installed in an aftermarket,* permanently located, manufactured (mobile) home, where not prohibited by local codes.

This appliance is only for use with propane or natural gas. Field conversion by any other means including the use of a kit is not permitted.

SAFETY

IMPORTANT: Read this owner's manual carefully and completely before trying to assemble, operate, or service this heater. Improper use of this heater can cause serious injury or death from burns, fire, explosion, electrical shock and carbon monoxide poisoning. Failure to follow these instructions will void the warranty.

Only a qualified installer, service agent, or local gas supplier may install and service this product.

WARNING: Keep the appliance area clear and free from combustible materials, gasoline, and other flammable vapors and liquids.

AWARNING: This appliance can be used with propane or natural gas. It is shipped from the factory adjusted for use with propane.

A DANGER: Carbon monoxide poisoning may lead to death!

carbon Monoxide Poisoning: Early signs of carbon monoxide poisoning resemble the flu, with headaches, dizziness or nausea. If you have these signs, the heater may not be working properly. Get fresh air at once! Have heater serviced. Some people are more affected by carbon monoxide than others. These include pregnant women, people with heart or lung disease or anemia, those under the influence of alcohol and those at high altitudes.

NATURALAND PROPANE GAS: Natural and Propane gas are odorless. An odor-making agent is added to the gas. The odor helps you detect a gas leak. However, the odor added to the gas can fade. Gas may be present even though no odor exists.

WARNING: FIRE, EXPLOSION AND ASPHYXIATION HAZARD

Improper adjustment, alteration, service, maintenance, or installation of this heater or its controls can cause death or serious injury.

Read and follow instructions and precautions in User's Information Manual provided with this heater.

WARNING: Young children should be carefully supervised when they are in the same room as the appliance. Toddlers, young children and others may be susceptible to accidental contact burns. A physical barrier is recommended if there are at risk individuals in the house. To restrict access to a fireplace or stove, install an adjustable safety gate to keep toddlers, young children and other at risk individuals out of the room and away from hot surfaces.

WARNING: Do not allow fans to blow directly into fireplace. Avoid any drafts that alter burner flame patterns.

WARNING: Do not use a blower insert, heat exchange insert or other accessory not approved for use with this heater.

WARNING: Due to high temperatures, the appliance should be located out of traffic and away from furniture and draperies.

SAFETY

WARNING: Clothing or other flammable material should not be placed on or near the appliance. Never place any objects in the heater.

WARNING: Heater becomes very hot when running. Keep children and adults away from hot surfaces to avoid burns or clothing ignition. Fireplace will remain hot for a time after shutdown. Allow surfaces to cool before touching.

WARNING: You must operate this heater with screen in place. Any safety screen or guard removed for servicing an appliance must be replaced prior to operating the appliance.

- Do not place propane supply tank(s) inside any structure. Propane supply tank(s) must be placed outdoors.
- 2. This heater shall not be installed in a bathroom
- This heater needs fresh air ventilation to run properly. This heater has an Oxygen Depletion Sensing (ODS) safety shutoff system. The ODS shuts down the heater if not enough fresh air is available. See <u>Air for Combustion and Ventilation</u>, pages 7 and 8. If heater keeps shutting off, see <u>Troubleshooting</u>, page 22.
- Keep all air openings in front and bottom of heater clear and free of debris. This will ensure enough air for proper combustion.
- If heater shuts off, do not relight until you have provided fresh, outside air. If heater keeps shutting off, have it serviced.
- 6. Do not run heater:
 - Where flammable liquids or vapors are used or stored
 - · Under dusty conditions.
- Before using furniture polish, wax, carpet cleaner, or similar products, turn heater off. If heated, the vapors from these products may create a white powder residue within burner box or on adjacent walls or furniture.

- Do not use heater if any part has been under water. Immediately call a qualified service technician to inspect the room heater and to replace any part of the control system and any gas control which has been under water
- Turn off and unplug heater and let cool before servicing. Only a qualified service person should service and repair heater.
- 10. Operating heater above elevations of 4,500 feet could cause pilot outage.
- To prevent performance problems, do not use propane fuel tank of less than 100 lbs. capacity.
- Do not use this heater as a wood-burning heater. Use only the logs provided with the heater.
- 13. Do not operate heater if any log is broken. Do not operate heater if any log is chipped (dime-sized or larger).
- 14. To prevent sooting, follow the instructions in *Care and Maintenance* (see page 20).
- 15. Do not add extra logs or ornaments such as pine cones, vermiculite, or rock wool. Using these added items can cause sooting. Do not add lava rock around base. Rock and debris could fall into the control area of heater. After servicing, always replace screen before operating heater.
- 16. This heater is designed to be smokeless. If logs ever appear to smoke, turn off heater and call a qualified service person. Note: During initial operation, slight smoking could occur due to log curing and the heater burning manufacturing residues.

PRODUCT FEATURES

SAFETY PILOT

This heater has a pilot with an Oxygen Depletion Sensing (ODS) safety shutoff system. The ODS/pilot shuts off the heater if there is not enough fresh air.

PIEZO IGNITION SYSTEM

This heater is equipped with an electronic piezo control system. This system requires one AAA battery (provided).

THERMOSTATIC CONTROL

The control automatically cycles the burner on and off to maintain a desired room temperature.

LOCAL CODES

Install and use heater with care. Follow all local codes. In the absence of local codes, use the latest edition of *The National Fuel Gas Code*, *ANSI Z223.1/NFPA 54**.

This heater is designed for vent-free operation. State and local codes in some areas prohibit the use of vent-free heaters.

State of Massachusetts: The installation must be made by a licensed plumber or gas fitter in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Sellers of unvented propane or natural gas-fired supplemental room heaters shall provide to each purchaser a copy of 527 CMR 30 upon sale of the unit.

In the State of Massachusetts the gas cock must be a T-handle type. The State of Massachusetts requires that a flexible appliance connector cannot exceed three feet in length.

UNPACKING

- 1. Remove top inner pack.
- 2. Tilt carton so that heater is upright.
- 3. Remove protective side packaging.
- 4. Slide heater out of carton.
- 5 Remove protective plastic wrap.
- 6. Hold the screen, lift, and pull forward.
- 7. Remove log set by cutting plastic ties.
- 8. Carefully unwrap log.
- Check for any shipping damage. If heater or log is damaged, promptly inform your dealer where you bought the heater.




Figure 1 - Vent-Free Fireplace Insert

WATER VAPOR: A BY-PRODUCT OF UNVENTED ROOM HEATERS

Water vapor is a by-product of gas combustion. An unvented room heater produces approximately one (1) ounce (30 mL) of water for every 1,000 BTUs (0.3 KWs) of gas input per hour. Unvented room heaters are recommended as supplemental heat (a room) rather than a primary heat source (an entire house). In most supplemental heat applications, the water vapor does not create a problem. In most applications, the water vapor enhances the low humidity atmosphere experienced during cold weather.

The following steps will help ensure that water vapor does not become a problem.

- Be sure the heater is sized properly for the application, including ample combustion air and circulation air.
- If high humidity is experienced, a dehumidifier may be used to help lower the water vapor content of the air.
- 3. Do not use an unvented room heater as the primary heat source.

QUALIFIED INSTALLING AGENCY

Only a qualified agency should install and replace gas piping, gas utilization equipment or accessories, and repair and equipment servicing. The term "qualified agency" means any individual, firm, corporation, or company that either in person or through a representative is engaged in and is responsible for:

- a) Installing, testing, or replacing gas piping or
- b) Connecting, installing, testing, repairing, or servicing equipment; that is experienced in such work; that is familiar with all precautions required; and that has complied with all the requirement of the authority having jurisdiction.

AIR FOR COMBUSTION AND VENTILATION

A WARNING: This heater shall not be installed in a confined space or unusually tight construction unless provisions are provided for adequate combustion and ventilation air. Read the following instructions to insure proper fresh air for this and other fuel-burning appliances in your home.

Today's homes are built more energy efficient than ever. New materials, increased insulation and new construction methods help reduce heat loss in homes. Home owners weather strip and caulk around windows and doors to keep the cold air out and the warm air in. During heating months, home owners want their homes as airtight as possible.

While it is good to make your home energy efficient, your home needs to breathe. Fresh air must enter your home. All fuel-burning appliances need fresh air for proper combustion and ventilation

Exhaust fans, fireplaces, clothes dryers and fuel burning appliances draw air from the house to operate. You must provide adequate fresh air for these appliances. This will insure proper venting of vented fuel-burning appliances.

A WARNING: This heater shall not be installed in a room or space unless the required volume of indoor combustion air is provided by the method described in the National Fuel Gas Code, ANSI Z223.1/NFPA 54, the International Fuel Gas Code, or applicable local codes.

WARNING: If the area in which the heater may be operated is smaller than that defined as an unconfined space or if the building is of unusually tight construction, provide adequate combustion and ventilation air by one of the methods described in the National Fuel Gas Code, ANSI Z223.1/NFPA 54, the International Fuel Gas Code, or applicable local codes.

AIR FOR COMBUSTION AND VENTILATION

VENTILATION AIR

Ventilation Air From Inside Building




Figure 2 - Ventilation Air from Inside Building (Wall installation shown)

This fresh air would come from an adjoining unconfined space. When ventilating to an adjoining unconfined space, you must provide two permanent openings: one within 12" of the ceiling and one within 12" of the floor on the wall connecting the two spaces (see options 1 and 2, Figure 2). You can also remove door into adjoining room (see option 3, Figure 2). Follow the National Fuel Gas Code, ANSI Z223.1/NFPA 54, Air for Combustion and Ventilation for required size of ventilation grills or ducts.

Ventilation Air From Outdoors

Provide extra fresh air by using ventilation grills or ducts. You must provide two permanent openings: one within 12" of the ceiling and one within 12" of the floor. Connect these items directly to the outdoors or spaces open to the outdoors. These spaces include attics and crawl spaces. Follow the National Fuel Gas Code, ANSI Z223.1/NFPA 54, Air for Combustion and Ventilation for required size of ventilation grills or ducts.

IMPORTANT: Do not provide openings for inlet or outlet air into attic if attic has a thermostat-controlled power vent. Heated air entering the attic will activate the power vent. Rework worksheet, adding the space of the adjoining unconfined space. The combined spaces must have enough fresh air to supply all appliances in both spaces.




Figure 3 - Ventilation Air from Outdoors (Mantel installation shown)

NOTICE: This heater is intended for use as supplemental heat. Use this heater along with your primary heating system. Do not install this heater as your primary heat source. If you have a central heating system, you may run system's circulating blower while using heater. This will help circulate the heat throughout the house. In the event of a power outage, you can use this heater as your primary heat source.

WARNING: A qualified service person must install heater. Follow all local codes.

WARNING: Never install the heater

- · in a bedroom or bathroom.
- · in a recreational vehicle
- where curtains, furniture, clothing, or other flammable objects are less than 42" from the front, top, or sides of the heater
- · in high traffic areas
- in windy or drafty areas

A CAUTION: This heater creates warm air currents. These currents move heat to wall surfaces next to heater. Installing heater next to vinyl or cloth wall coverings or operating heater where impurities (such as tobaccosmoke, aromatic candles, cleaning fluids, oil or kerosene lamps, etc.) in the air exist, may cause walls to discolor.

IMPORTANT: Vent-free heaters add moisture to the air. Although this is beneficial, installing heater in rooms without enough ventilation air may cause mildew to form too much moisture. See <u>Air for Combustion and Ventilation</u>, pages 7 and 8.

CHECK GAS TYPE

Be sure your gas supply is right for your heater. Otherwise, call dealer where you bought the heater for proper type heater.

CLEARANCES TO COMBUSTIBLES




Figure 4 - Minimum Clearances to Wall and Ceiling

A WARNING: You must maintain the minimum clearances shown in Figure 4. If you can, provide greater clearances from floor, ceiling, and joining wall. Measure from outermost point of heater.

Minimum Wall and Ceiling Clearances

- A. Clearances from outermost point of heater to any combustible side wall should not be less than 8".
- B. Clearances from the heater to the ceiling should not be less than 42".

Note: When heater is installed directly on carpeting, tile or other combustible material, other than wood flooring, the heater must be installed on a metal or wood panel extending the full width and depth of the heater.

BUILT-IN FIREPLACE INSTALLATION

A WARNING: Do not allow any combustible materials to overlap the firebox front.

MARNING: Do not allow combustible or noncombustible materials to cover any necessary openings like louvered slots.

A WARNING: Never modify or cover the louvered slots on the front of the firebox.




Figure 5 - Clearance to Combustibles

Built-in installation of this fireplace involves installing fireplace into a framed-in enclosure. This makes the front of the fireplace flush with wall. If installing a built-in mantel above the fireplace, you must follow the clearances shown in Figure 5.




Figure 6 - Fireplace Clearances

NOTICE: Surface temperatures of adjacent walls and mantels become hot during operation. Walls and mantels above the fireplace may become hot to the touch. If installed properly, these temperatures meet the requirement of the national product standard. Follow all minimum clearances shown in this manual (see Figure 6).




Figure 7 - Rough Opening for Wall Installation




Figure 8 - Rough Opening for Corner Installation

- Frame in rough opening. Use dimensions shown in Figure 7 for the rough opening. If installing in a corner, use dimensions shown in Figure 8 (page 11) for the rough opening. The height is 19", which is the same as the wall opening above.
- Carefully set fireplace in front of rough opening with back of fireplace inside wall opening.
- Attach gas line to fireplace gas regulator.
 See <u>Connecting to Gas Supply</u>, page 12.
- 4. Check all gas connections for leaks. See Checking Gas Connections, page 14.

IMPORTANT: When finishing your firebox, combustible materials such as wall board, gypsum board, sheet rock, drywall, plywood, etc, must have 1/2" clearance to the sides and top of the firebox. Combustible materials should never overlap the firebox front facing.

CABINET MANTEL

If using a cabinet mantel, assemble following the instructions included with the mantel at this time.

Note: Some mantels are designed with physical and chemical distress to enhance the realistic appearance of the wood.




Figure 9 - Installing Fireplace Insert Into Mantel

- Carefully push the fireplace insert into the mantel from the front as shown in Figure 9.
- Position the fireplace against the wall in the desired location

CONNECTING TO GAS SUPPLY

WARNING: A qualified service technician must connect heater to gas supply. Follow all local codes.

WARNING: This appliance requires a 3/8" NPT (National Pipe Thread) inlet connection to the pressure regulator.

WARNING: For natural gas, Never connect heater to private (non-utility) gas wells. This gas is commonly known as wellhead gas.

WARNING: Do not overtighten gas connections.

CAUTION: Use only new, black iron or steel pipe. Internally tinned copper tubing may be used in certain areas. Check your local codes. Use pipe of 1/2" diameter or greater to allow proper gas volume to heater. If pipe is too small, undue loss of pressure will occur.

A CAUTION: For natural gas, check your gas line pressure before connecting heater to gas line. Gas line pressure must be no greater than 9" of water. If gas line pressure is higher, heater regulator damage could occur.

A CAUTION: For propane gas, never connect heater directly to the gas supply. This heater requires an external regulator (not supplied). Install the external regulator between the heater and gas supply.

A CAUTION: Avoid damage to regulator. Hold gas regulator with wrench when connecting into gas piping and/or fittings.

A CAUTION: Use pipe joint sealant that is resistant to gas (Propane or Natural Gas).

Before installing heater, make sure you have the items listed below:

- external regulator for propane unit only (supplied by installer)
- piping (check local codes)
- sealant (resistant to natural gas and propane gas)
- · equipment shutoff valve*
- · test gauge connection*
- sediment trap
- · tee joint
- · pipe wrench
- · flexible gas hose (check local codes)
- · 3/8" NPT brass fitting
- * A CSA design-certified equipment shutoff valve with 1/8" NPT tap is an acceptable alternative to test gauge connection. Purchase the optional CSA design certified equipment shutoff valve from your dealer.

Typical Inlet Pipe Diameters




Figure 10 - Gas Connection

Use 3/8" black iron pipe or greater. Installation must include an equipment shutoff valve, union, and plugged 1/8" NPT tap. Locate NPT tap within reach for test gauge hook up. NPT tap must be upstream from heater (see Figure 10, page 13).

IMPORTANT: Install an equipment shutoff valve in an accessible location. The equipment shutoff valve is for turning on or shutting off the gas to the appliance.

For propane installations, apply pipe joint sealant lightly to male threads. This will prevent excess sealant from going into pipe. Excess sealant in pipe could result in clogged heater valves.

The installer must supply an external regulator. The external regulator will reduce incoming gas pressure. You must reduce incoming gas pressure to between 11" and 14" of water. If you do not reduce incoming gas pressure, heater regulator damage could occur. Install external regulator with the vent pointing down as shown in Figure 11. Pointing the vent down protects it from freezing rain or sleet.

Install sediment trap in supply line as shown in Figure 10. Place sediment trap where it is within reach for cleaning. Place sediment trap where trapped matter is not likely to freeze. A sediment trap traps moisture and contaminants. This keeps them from going into heater controls. If sediment trap is not installed or is installed wrong, heater may not run properly.

Figure 11 - External Regulator with Vent Pointing Down




Figure 12 - Gas Regulator Location and Gas Line Access into Heater Cabinet

CHECKING GAS CONNECTIONS

A WARNING: Test all gas piping and connections for leaks after installing or servicing. Correct all leaks at once.

AWARNING: Never use an open flame to check for a leak. Apply a noncorrosive leak detection fluid to all joints. If bubbles form, there is a leak. Correct all leaks at once.

PRESSURE TESTING GAS SUPPLY PIPING SYSTEM

Test Pressures In Excess Of 1/2 PSIG (3.5 kPa)

- Disconnect heater with its appliance main gas valve (control valve) and equipment shutoff valve from gas supply piping system. Pressures in excess of 1/2 PSIG will damage heater regulator.
- 2. Cap off open end of gas pipe where equipment shutoff valve was connected.
- Pressurize supply piping system by either opening propane supply tank valve for propane gas or opening main gas valve located on or near gas meter for natural gas or using compressed air.
- Check all joints of gas supply piping system. Apply noncorrosive leak detection fluid to all joints. If bubbles form, there may be a leak.
- 5. Correct all leaks at once.
- Reconnect heater and equipment shutoff valve to gas supply. Check reconnected fittings for leaks.





Figure 13 - Equipment Shutoff Valve

Test Pressures Equal To or Less Than 1/2 PSIG (3.5 kPa)

- 1. Close equipment shutoff valve (see Figure 13).
- Pressurize supply piping system by either opening propane supply tank valve for propane gas or opening main gas valve located on or near gas meter for natural gas or using compressed air.
- Check all joints from gas meter to equipment shutoff valve for natural gas or propane supply to equipment shutoff valve for propane (see Figure 14 or 15). Apply a noncorrosive leak detection fluid to all joints. Bubbles forming show a leak.
- 4. Correct all leaks at once.




Figure 15 - Checking Gas Joints for Natural Gas

PRESSURE TESTING HEATER GAS CONNECTIONS

- Open equipment shutoff valve (see Figure 13, page 14).
- Open main gas valve located on or near gas meter for natural gas or open propane supply tank valve.
- 3. Make sure control knob of heater is in the OFF position.
- Check all joints from equipment shutoff valve to control valve (see Figure 14 or
- 15, page 14). Apply a noncorrosive leak detection fluid to all joints. Bubbles forming show a leak.
- 5. Correct all leaks at once.
- Light heater (see <u>Lighting Instructions</u> on page 17). Check all other internal joints for leaks.
- Turn off heater (see <u>To Turn Off Gas Appliance</u>, page 18).

INSTALLING LOGS

▲ WARNING: Failure to position the parts in accordance with these diagrams or failure to use only parts specifically approved with this heater may result in property damage or personal injury.

A CAUTION: After installation, and periodically thereafter, check to ensure that no flame comes in contact with any log. With the heater set to high, check to see if flames contact any log. If so, reposition logs according to the log installation instructions in this manual. Flames contacting logs will create soot.

- Install log #1 on the rear plate as shown in Figure 17.
- Install logs #2 and #3 as shown in Figure 18.
- 3. Install log #4 and log #5 as shown in Figure 19.




Figure 16 - Stove Cabinet (Brick liner not shown)

IMPORTANT: Make sure logs do not cover any burner ports. It is very important to install the logs exactly as instructed. Do not modify logs. Use only logs supplied with heater.




Figure 18 - Installing Logs #2 and #3




Figure 19 - Installing Log #3 & #4

BATTERY INSTRUCTIONS

A CAUTION: Do not dispose of batteries in fire, batteries may explode or leak.

- · Battery is included.
- · Remove battery when depleted.
- Be sure to observe proper polarity (+/-)
 when installing or replacing the battery.
 Damage due to improper battery installation
 may void the warranty on the product.
- For long periods of non-operation, remove batteries from all components for safety.

Unscrew ignitor cap and install a AAA battery with the + pointing out. Replace cap.

OPERATION

FOR YOUR SAFETY READ BEFORE LIGHTING

A WARNING: If you do not follow these instructions exactly, a fire or explosion may result causing property damage, personal injury or loss of life.

- A. This appliance has a pilot which must be lighted by hand. When lighting the pilot, follow these instructions exactly.
- B. BEFORE LIGHTING smell all around the appliance area for gas. Be sure to smell next to the floor because some gas is heavier than air and will settle on the floor.

- · Do not touch any electric switch; do

- C. Use only your hand to push in or turn the gas control knob. Never use tools. If the knob will not push in or turn by hand, don't try to repair it, call a qualified service technician. Force or attempted repair may result in a fire or explosion.
- D. Do not use this appliance if any part has been under water. Immediately call a qualified service technician to inspect the appliance and to replace any part of the control system and any gas control which has been under water.

OPERATION

LIGHTING INSTRUCTIONS

WARNING: You must operate this heater with the screen in place. Make sure screen is installed before running heater.

NOTICE: During initial operation of new heater, burning logs will give off a paper-burning smell. Orange flame will also be present. Open damper or window to vent smell. This will only last a few hours.

- 1. STOP! Read the safety information above.
- 2. Unscrew ignitor cap and install a AAA battery with the + pointing out. Replace cap.
- 3. Make sure equipment shutoff valve is fully open.
- Turn control knob clockwise to the OFF position.
- Wait five (5) minutes to clear out any gas.
 Then smell for gas around heater and near the floor. If you smell gas, STOP! Follow "B" in the safety information above. If you do not smell gas, go to the next step.




Figure 21 - Control Knob in the OFF Position

- 6. Turn control knob counterclockwise /
 to the PILOT position. Press in control
 knob for five (5) seconds (see Figure 21).
 Note: The first time that the heater is operated after connecting the gas supply,the
 control knob should be pressed for about
 thirty (30) seconds. This will allow air to
 bleed from the gas system. If pilot does not
 stay lit, refer to Troubleshooting, pages 22
 though 25. Also contact a qualified service
 technician or gas supplier for repairs. Until
 repairs are made, light pilot with match.
 - If control knob does not pop up when released, contact a qualified service technician or gas supplier for repairs.
- With control knob pressed in, push down and release ignitor button. This will light pilot. The pilot is attached to the rear of the front of burner. If needed, keep pressing ignitor button until pilot lights.

- Note: If pilot does not stay lit, refer to <u>Troubleshooting</u>, pages 22 though 25. Also contact a qualified service technician or gas supplier for repairs. Until repairs are made, light pilot with match. To light pilot with match, see <u>Manual Lighting Procedure</u>, page 18.
- Keep control knob pressed in for 30 seconds after lighting pilot. After 30 seconds, release control knob.
 - Note: If pilot goes out, repeat steps 3 through 7. This heater has a safety interlock system. Wait one (1) minute before lighting pilot again.
- Turn control knob counterclockwise /
 to desired heating level. The main burner should light. Set control knob to any heat level between HI and LO (5 and 1).

A CAUTION: Do not try to adjust heating levels by using the equipment shutoff valve.

MARNING: If input gas type is NG, make sure NG pilot burner ignites. If input gas type is LP, make sure LP pilot burner ignites.

OPERATION

THERMOSTAT CONTROL OPERATION

The thermostatic control used on this model differs from standard thermostats. Standard thermostats simply turn the burner on and off. The thermostat used on this heater senses the room temperature. At times the room may exceed the set temperature. If so, the burner will shut off. The burner will cycle back on when

room temperature drops below the set temperature. The control knob can be set to any comfort level between HIGH (5) and LOW (1). Note: The thermostat sensing bulb measures the temperature depending on housing construction.

TO TURN OFF GAS TO APPLIANCE

Shutting Off Heater

Turn control knob clockwise $\begin{tabular}{ll} \end{tabular}$ to the OFF position.

Shutting Off Burner Only (pilot stays lit)

Turn control knob clockwise \to the PILOT position.

MANUAL LIGHTING PROCEDURE

- Remove screen by lifting and pulling forward.
- Follow steps 1 through 5 under <u>Lighting</u> <u>Instructions</u>, page 17.
- With control knob in PILOT position, strike match, and hold near pilot. Press in control knob; pilot should light.
- Keep control knob pressed in for 30 seconds after lighting pilot. After 30 seconds, release control knob.
- 5. Make sure the heater screen is in place before operating heater.

INSPECTING BURNERS

IMPORTANT: Owner's should check pilot flame pattern and burner flame pattern often. Incorrect flame patterns indicate the need for cleaning (see <u>Care and Maintenance</u>, page 20 through 21) or service.

▲ WARNING: Only a qualified service person should service and repair heater. This includes maintenance requiring replacement or alteration of components.

PILOT FLAME PATTERN




Figure 22 - Correct Pilot Flame Pattern (Natural Gas shown)




Figure 23 - Incorrect Pilot Flame Pattern (Natural Gas shown)

Figure 22 shows a correct pilot flame pattern. Figure 23 shows an incorrect pilot flame pattern. The incorrect pilot flame is not touching the thermocouple. This will cause the thermocouple to cool, which shuts the heater off. If pilot flame pattern is incorrect, as shown in Figure 23

- turn heater off (see <u>To Turn Off Gas to Appliance</u>, page 18)
- see *Troubleshooting* pages 22 through 25.

WARNING: If yellow tipping occurs, your heater could produce increased levels of carbon monoxide. If the burner flame pattern shows yellow tipping, follow instructions below.

Notice: Do not mistake orange flames with yellow tipping. Dirt or other fine particles enter the heater and burn causing brief patches of orange flame.

BURNER FLAME PATTERN

Figure 24 - Correct Burner Flame Pattern with Control Knob Set to HI (5)






Figure 25 - Incorrect Burner Flame Pattern with Control Knob Set to HI (5)

BURNER PRIMARY AIR HOLES

Air is drawn into the burner through the holes in the fitting at the entrance to the burner. These holes may become blocked with dust or lint. Periodically inspect these holes for any blockage and clean as necessary. Blocked air holes will create soot.

CARE AND MAINTENANCE

A WARNING: Turn off heater and let cool before servicing.

A CAUTION: You must keep control areas, burner, and circulating air passageways of heater clean. Inspect these areas of heater before each use. Have heater inspected yearly by a qualified service technician. Heater may need more frequent cleaning due to excessive lint from carpeting, bedding material, pet hair, etc.

MARNING: Failure to keep the primary air opening(s) of the burner(s) clean may result in sooting and property damage.

MAIN BURNER

Periodically inspect all burner flame holes with the heater running. All slotted burner flame holes should be open with yellow flame present. All round burner flame holes should be open with a small blue flame present. Some burner flame holes may become blocked by debris or rust, with no flame present. If so, turn off the heater and let it cool, and remove blockage or replace burner. Blocked burner flame holes will create soot.

CLEANING BURNER PILOT AIR INLET HOLE

We recommend that you clean the unit every 2,500 hours of operation or every three months. We also recommend that you keep the burner tube and pilot assembly clean and free of dust and dirt. To clean these parts we recommend using compressed air no greater than 30 PSI. Your local computer store, hardware store, or home center may carry compressed air in a can. You can use a vacuum cleaner in the blow position. If using compressed air in a can, please follow the directions on the can, you could damage the pilot assembly.

- 1. Shut off the unit, including the pilot. Allow the unit to cool for at least thirty minutes.




Figure 26 - Burner and Injector Holder

- Inspect burner, pilot and primary air inlet holes on injector for dust and dirt (see Figure 26).
- Blow air through the ports/slots and holes in the burner. Also clean the pilot assembly.

- Check the injector holder located at the end of the burner tube again. Remove any large particles of dust, dirt, lint, or pet hair with a soft cloth or vacuum cleaner nozzle.
- 5. Blow air into the primary air holes on the injector holder.
- In case any large clumps of dust have now been pushed into the burner. Repeat steps 3 and 4.

CARE AND MAINTENANCE

ODS/PILOT

A CAUTION: Never use a wire, needle, or similar object to clean ODS/pilot. This can damage ODS/pilot unit.

Use a vacuum cleaner, pressurized air, or a small, soft bristled brush to clean.




Figure 27 - Pilot Inlet Air Hole

A yellow tip on the pilot flame indicates dust and dirt in the pilot assembly. There is a small pilot air inlet hole about 2" from where the pilot flame comes out of the pilot assembly (see Figure 27). With the unit off, lightly blow air through the air inlet hole. You may blow through a drinking straw if compressed air is not available.

CABINET

Air Passageways

Use a vacuum cleaner or pressurized air to clean.

Exterior

- Use a soft cloth dampened with a mild soap and water mixture.
- · Wipe the cabinet to remove dust.

LOGS

- If you remove logs for cleaning, refer to *Installing Logs*, page 15, to properly replace logs.
- Replace log(s) if broken or chipped (dime-size or larger).

▲ WARNING: If you smell gas:

- · Shut off gas supply.
- Do not try to light any appliance.
- Do not touch any electrical switch; do not use any phone in your building.
- Immediately call your gas supplier from a neighbor's phone. Follow the gas supplier's instructions.
- If you cannot reach your gas supplier, call the fire department.

▲ WARNING: Only a qualified service technician should service and repair heater. Make sure that power is turned off before proceeding. Turn off and let cool before servicing.

IMPORTANT: Operating heater where impurities in air exist may create odors. Cleaning supplies, paint, paint remover, cigarette smoke, cements and glues, new carpet or textiles, etc., create fumes. These fumes may mix with combustion air and create odors.

Note: All troubleshooting items are listed in order of operation.




