### **About AVL**

AVL Looms has been in the business of designing and building some of the world's finest handweaving looms since 1977.

Jim Ahrens had been building and designing looms for a number of years before Jon Violette, the "V" in AVL, approached Ahrens about a partnership in 1977. Violette, an industrial management professional, had discovered Ahrens' work through his sister who ran the Pacific Basin School of Textiles in Berkeley, where Ahrens was a volunteer advisor.

The two men worked together in the Bay Area for three years until Violette moved Ahrens and Violette Looms to Chico, where it officially became known as AVL Looms Inc., and has operated ever since.

In 1982, Violette was instrumental in the development of the first computerized dobby, then called the "Apple Dobby". He retired from active life in the company in 1987.

Once known for our production looms, AVL has broadened its line considerably and we now offer customers a full spectrum of fine weaving equipment, ranging from our small Home Looms, to our Industrial Dobby Looms, Rug Looms, and Jacquards.

### The Compu-Dobby 5 Design Concept

The guiding concept behind the Compu-Dobby 5 is ease of use with precise, repeatable control. The loom is designed to be easy to thread, easy to setup and easy to weave on.

### **LOOM FEATURES**

### Compu-Dobby<sup>®</sup>

A first for handweaving looms, the Compu-Dobby 5 enables computer control of pattern *and* key loom functions, including warp tension and pick spacing.

Pattern control is a state of the art system that eliminates the multi-treadle dance of traditional looms and the tedious pegging of mechanical dobby looms. Much like the legacy cartridge systems from the Compu-Dobby I and II, the Compu-Dobby 5 stores entire weaving files (WIFs) onboard with three significant advantages over all other systems:

- Ultra-fast pick writing. The system can achieve weaving speeds in excess of 100 picks per minute.
- Hundreds of weaving files may be stored for later use.
- Eliminates latency timing issues inherent in computer communications systems. Latencies can cause slower weaving and even missed picks.

As a web enabled device, this loom connects to your computer or tablet via WiFi or USB and controls the loom from your favorite browser. AVLDrive version 5 is an easy to use, intuitive interface run from within the CompuDobby 5. As a direct result, there is no software to install for the loom, nor limitation on the controlling device, except for a minimum screen resolution ( $1024 \times 768 \text{ pixels}$ ). AVLDrive is compatible with all major browsers, including Safari, Chrome, Edge, Firefox and Opera. The current version of the browser should be used.

### Warp Beams and Automatic Warp Tension System

Another first in our industry, some looms offer digital control of warp tension using a small electrical motor and drive system connected via spring and brake cable to the warp beam. The motor is controlled by the Compu-Dobby & AVLDrive. Easily change the warp tension at any time during weaving by a click of the mouse or a touch of the finger on the touchscreen. This system allows very fine, repeatable control with a range from locked beam to free turning for winding on the warp.

Automatic cloth advance is an AVL-only feature on hand weaving looms. Earlier mechanical versions of these systems are well known for providing fine control over pick advance spacing. This feature utilizes digital controls via an electric motor driven worm and gear attached directly to the cloth beam. Much like the digital warp tension controls, set the picks per inch in AVLDrive and start weaving. Easily change the advance setting or manually advance the cloth at any time during weaving by a click of the mouse or a touch of the finger on the touchscreen. This system allows very fine, repeatable control with a range from hundreds of picks per inch (or centimeter) to gross movements needed when starting a new warp.

## CONNECTING TO THE LOOM

### **ATTENTION:**

Please read through this entire section before powering on your loom.

### **CONNECTION TYPES**

In order to connect to the loom, your device must either have a USB port or the ability to connect to the internet. There are three ways to connect a device to the loom:

<b>Connection Type</b>	Description
USB	USB cable from your device to the loom. Only devices with USB ports can connect this way.
LAN (Local Area Network)	Through a router. Only devices with WiFi can connect this way.
LoomDirect	Connection to the loom's local WiFi network (not through a router). Only devices with WiFi can connect this way.

The software interface (AVLDrive) is web browser based so you do not need to download anything. Simply open your standard web browser (Chrome, Safari, Firefox, etc.) and type in the loom's address.

When the loom is started, it will try to connect to the router (LAN) it is normally connected to first. If it cannot find the router, it will start LoomDirect. The USB connection is always available.

### **LOOM MODES**

The loom is designed to be controlled through the AVLDrive software, so there is no "power" button anywhere on the loom.

We recommend the use of a good surge protector between the outlet and UPS on the Compu-Dobby 5, especially in regions subject to lightning strikes and other extreme electrical anomaly incidences. In areas prone to brown/black out or power grid fluctuations, we recommend a 800W, 1000VA UPS for Compu-Dobby 5 equipped K-Series.

### **Standby Mode:**

When you plug the loom in it enters Standby Mode. The loom is designed to be left plugged in and in Standby Mode at all times. In standby power mode, the loom consumes very little power, and maintains the network connection to the router or LoomDirect WiFi.

### Note:

Avoid pulling the power cord while the loom is in standby power mode. Please use the Shutdown menu option to completely power down the loom prior to pulling the power cord from the electrical socket.

### **Weaving Mode:**

Weaving mode is when the loom and all its digital controls have been powered on through AVLDrive. You will hear the warp tension motors set into place and other digital features come to life.

### **WARNING:**

Do not pull or cut power to the loom while in Weaving mode.

### **Shutdown Mode:**

This mode allows you to shut down the loom properly so that power can be removed. It can be initiated from Weaving Mode or Standby Mode through AVLDrive. Shutting down the loom through AVLDrive is the proper way to stop all power to the loom. Once the loom has been shutdown the power cord can be unplugged.

If the loom has been Shutdown through the software, but is still plugged in, simply unplugging it and plugging it back in will initiate Standby Mode.

### **POWERING ON THE LOOM**

When powering on the loom for the first time, you will need to use either a USB connection or connect via LoomDirect. In order to connect via a router (LAN), you will have to setup the Network information on the loom using one of the other connection types first. Once setup you can then connect via router each time you come to the loom. However, if Wifi connections are ever lost you can always revert to USB or LoomDirect.

1) Connect the loom to power via the provided power cable. All lights but the "Error" light will light up as shown in the images below.





2) Wait for the loom to bootup. This may take up to several minutes. Once ready the loom will show just the "Power" and "Network" lights. The network light may be Green or Red.



### **LED Lights**

The loom uses a lighted interface for communication with the weaver.

<b>Light Name</b>	Description
POWER	Orange light means "power" to the loom in standby mode. Red light means "power" to the loom in weaving mode.
NETWORK	Different colors indicate the network status. Blinking Red: searching for a router. Red: connected to a router Green: LoomDirect is available (not searching for a router).
СОМ	Green light shows the loom is connected to a device. No light means there is no device connected.
ERROR	Red light will shine when an error has occurred.
SHED	Red light will shine when shed open. Green light will shine when shed closed. If the dobby is in between states (shed null), it will be unlit.

### **SETTING UP COMMUNICATION**


### Connecting via USB

When using a USB, a cable is attached from your device to the loom. If you are not using the USB connection, remove the cable from the device.

- 1) Plug the normal USB plug into your device and plug the other end into the Compu-Dobby.
- 2) Open an Internet browser program on your device (Chrome, Internet Explorer, Microsoft Edge, Firefox, Opera, etc.).
- 3) In the Address Bar, type in 192.168.6.2 when using a Mac or 192.168.7.2 when using a Windows PC and press Enter to open AVLDrive. This is the IP address for the loom when connecting via USB. You can also use the Loom Name URL once it has been setup.

### Note:

Any time you're connected via USB you can use the IP address or the loom name to open AVLDrive. If the loom name is entered, and a USB cable is connected to the loom and the device, the loom will default to using the USB cable, even if a network connection is setup.



4) When the device is connected, the COM Light will come on. The COM light indicates only that a device is connected.



### Connecting via LoomDirect


LoomDirect means the loom is generating its own WiFi network and will show up as an available network on your device. The great part about this feature is that you don't need to be actively connected to the internet to wirelessly connect to the loom. However, your computer must still have the capability to connect to the internet.

The loom's protocol is to first search for a router to connect to. If it does not find one, it will automatically switch to LoomDirect and create its own network.

### Note:

If no router (LAN) connection is established your loom will automatically switch to LoomDirect.

- 1) Wait for the loom to switch to LoomDirect and the private network to show up on your device. This should occur quickly.
- 2) When the Network light shines green, the loom is now putting off its own network that can be found from your device.
- 3) The network will be AVL\_[loom\_serial\_number] where loom\_serial\_number is the serial number for your loom.
- 4) Connect your device (laptop, tablet, phone) to this WiFi network.



- 5) The password for the network will be CompuDobby5.
- 6) Open your browser and type in 192.168.16.2, or the name of the loom if you've named it.

### Note:

If the loom name is entered, and a USB cable is connected to the loom and the device, the loom will default to using the USB cable, even if a network connection is setup.

- 7) When the device is connected, the COM Light will come on. The COM light indicates only that a device is connected.
- 8) Once you establish the LoomDirect connection you won't have to go through this process again. You can shut down your loom and you'll be able to turn the loom on and connect to AVLDrive automatically.

### Note:


If you switch to a new device, you will need to connect to LoomDirect on the new device and enter the Network ID and password.

### Setting up Network settings to connect via router

For this connection, you will connect using your router at your location. The router allows you to access the internet wirelessly on your device. Both your computer and the loom will be connected to the same network. In order to use this connection type, you must have access to the internet.

If you don't have internet, you can still connect via WiFi with LoomDirect connection covered in its own section.

- 1) Connect your device to the loom via USB or LoomDirect.
- 2) Go to Network tab in AVLDrive.




- 3) Select your network from the dropdown list and enter the password for your router.
- 4) Click the Restart Network button.
- 5) Unplug the USB or disconnect from LoomDirect. The COM light will go off, indicating that no device is connected. You will also note that the Network light will change. Wait for the network light to be solid red again before continuing.

### Note:

The network light should remain RED during these steps, indicating that the Compu-Dobby is connecting to a router. If your network light turns GREEN, the Compu-Dobby has started LoomDirect. Check the password for your router and re-enter the password. If the loom still does not connect to the router, make sure that the router is working correctly.

- 6) Wait for the WiFi connection to the loom. It can take up to several minutes for the loom to connect to the router.
- 7) Connect your device (laptop, tablet, phone) to the same WiFi network you connected the loom to.



- 8) You can refresh your browser.
- 9) When the device is connected, the COM Light will come on. The COM light indicates only that a device is connected.
- 10) Once you establish the router connection you won't have to go through this process again. You can shutdown your loom and you'll be able to turn the loom on and connect to AVLDrive without these steps.

### Note:

If your router name or password changes, you will have to setup the network using the USB or LoomDirect.

### **LOST CONNECTION**

If the loom loses its connection to the router while in standby power mode, follow these steps to reconnect.

- 1) In the software, go to the Utilities tab.
- 2) Click Shutdown.
- 3) Once the loom has completed the shutdown sequence and the LEDs have turned off, remove power from the loom.
- 4) Plug the loom back in.
- 5) The loom will perform a normal boot up and then reconnect to the router.


### NAMING YOUR LOOM

### **Install Bonjour Print Services for Windows**

If you have a Windows computer, you will have to install Bonjour Print Services in order to use a loom name. This software is a default part of a Mac computer. There is no similar software for Android. If are using an Android device or you prefer not to install the software on your Windows computer, you can continue to use the IP address to access AVLDrive.

Bonjour Print Services for Windows lets you access AVLDrive via your web browser using your "loom name" as the URL. Example: http://[loom name].local. This service needs to be downloaded and installed on your computer.

1) Go to https://support.apple.com/kb/DL999?locale=en\_US.




 Click the Download button. The file will be downloaded to a location on your computer. For Windows computers, this will most often be the Download folder.

### Note:


Depending on your browser, you will see a notice that the file is being downloaded at either the top or bottom of the screen. Once the download is complete, you may be able to click on the notification to open and install the software.

3) Navigate to the correct folder.



4) Open the downloaded file to initiate the install wizard.



### Add Loom Name

Naming your loom is an important step that will make it easy to access your loom via WiFi from any device.

This creates a URL that you type in to the address bar on a web browser. It will be easy to remember, unlike the IP address. Your loom name can be changed at any time.

The LOOM URL will be http:// + [loom name] + .local

### Example:

Loom name = myloom

Loom URL = http://myloom.local

### Note:

The name must be a solid piece of text with no spaces. If a space is added to the name, the URL will only be the letters before the space even though the "Loom Name" shows the complete name with the space.


GOOD EXAMPLES: myloom, my\_loom, my-loom

BAD EXAMPLES: my loom (loom would only show up as "my")

### Note:

If you ever forget the name of your loom you can always connect with the IP address.

1) Once you have AVLDrive open, select the "Options" tab.



- 2) In the box for Loom Name, enter the name you'd like to use for your loom. If the box is not blank, delete the existing name and enter the new text of your choice.
- 3) Click the enter button on your keyboard, or simply clicking anywhere on the page.
- 4) Refresh or exit your browser. **The COM light will turn off and then back on pretty quickly.** In the Options Tab you'll see the



- loom name has been changed. You will also see the Connected To: field under Please select file has changed.
- 5) Type the new URL into your browser with your new Loom Name as shown in the beginning of this section: http:// + [loom name] + .local
- 6) Click Enter on the keyboard.
- 7) AVLDrive will refresh and the COM Light will light up once communication is established with the loom. You can now use this URL to access AVLDrive via USB, router, and LoomDirect.

### **LOSS OF COMMUNICATION**

If the loom and the software does not seem to be communicating correctly, reload the AVLDrive page.

8) Reload the AVLDrive page by pressing Ctrl+R(Windows) or Cmd+R(Mac). You can also click the reload icon on your browser.



### **RESET CONNECTION**

Normally when using a computer, the connection between the computer and the loom will be automatically terminated. When using a tablet, this may need to be done manually. Rarely, this may also need to be done on a computer. See page 63 for instructions on how to reset the connection.

### **REBOOT THE LOOM**

1) Enter "/reboot" after the URL or IP address in your web browser. The loom should reboot as if it had been shutdown and restarted.

### **SHUTDOWN THE LOOM**

If you will be removing the loom from a power source, you should to shutdown the loom using the commands in the software first. This is similar to shutting down a computer so that it restarts correctly.

- 1) In the software, go to the Utilities tab.
- 2) Click Shutdown.
- 3) Once the loom has completed the shutdown sequence, you can remove power from the loom.

### **USING WEAVEPOINT**


Weavepoint 8.0.2.0 and above offers direct access to AVLDrive for your loom with Compu-Dobby 5. The loom control function in Weavepoint will open the software, and upload the pattern you have open in Weavepoint.

AVLDrive only works with WIF files. When a file is opened in AVLDrive using WeavePoint, the file has been exported from WeavePoint as a WIF and imported to AVLDrive. The WIF file will then be available on the File tab in AVLDrive for future use.

### **Set Weave Options in WeavePoint**

1) Select Options on the Weave menu to open the Weave Options dialogue box.

2) Select Compu-Dobby 5.

### Note:


Choosing Compu-Dobby 5 will launch AVLDrive with the pattern you have open. If this is selected, there will be no other options you can choose in Weave Options window.

### **Connect to Loom**

- 1) Have the pattern you want to weave with open. You can use WeavePoint files or WIF files.
- 2) Select Loom Control on the Weave menu.





- 3) Select USB if your loom is connected with a USB cable. If you are connecting to your loom wirelessly, choose WiFi.
- 4) If WiFi is chosen, you must enter the Loom Address so that the connection will be made correctly.

### Note:

You may use either the IP Address or the Loom Name for the Compu-Dobby 5.

- 5) If you have a pattern open in WeavePoint, the pattern name will display here.
- 6) Select Replace any existing pattern with same name if you want to overwrite a pattern already on the loom with the same name.
- 7) If Start loom control with this pattern is checked, the pattern will open in the loom control so that it is ready for you to weave with.
- 8) Click OK. A message that the pattern was uploaded will appear.



9) Click OK. The pattern will open in AVLDrive in the Weaving tab.

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# WEAVING WITH THE COMPU-DOBBY 5

No matter how you are connecting to the loom, the loom software will appear in your browser. Depending on the browser you are using, the software may appear subtly different from the pictures in this manual, however all functionality will be the same.

When you power on the loom using the software, the loom will go through a series of self-tests: The solenoid self-test, the warp tension motor initialization, and (if the loom has two warp beams) the second warp tension motor initialization. A notification will appear in the software letting you know that the tension system is calibrating. It will be removed when the calibration is complete. If you have one warp tension motor, the process will take about 90 seconds. If you have two, it will be about 180 seconds. Once the self-tests are complete, you will be able to continue using the software.

The software allows you to make changes to the loom as you weave, including the pick to be woven. If the shed is closed, the changes will be made immediately as the button is pressed in the software. If the shed is not closed, the changes will be reflected in the Next field and will be made when the shed is returned to the closed state.


### WARPING THE LOOM

Looms with automatic warp tension motors are designed to allow you to wind on the warp without removing the tension cable. A button on the Weaving tab allows you to set the tension to the lowest setting.

- 1) Connect to the loom as described previously. The software defaults to the File tab.
- 2) Open the Weaving tab. You do not need to have a weaving file open.


### Note:

If you open a file for weaving (see page 26) when the loom is powered off, the loom will automatically power on.

4) The loom will begin its self-tests. At the same time, the button will switch to Power Off and the Power light on the interface will turn briefly yellow, then red.



5) Click the free warp tension button.



6) The button will turn red to indicate it is activated. Click the button again to turn it off.




- 7) Wind the warp onto the warp beam. For more information, see the weaving section in your loom manual.
- 8) You can click Power Off to return the loom to standby when threading the heddles and reed. If you are going to turn off power to the loom, shutdown the loom through the software.



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### **OPEN A FILE FOR WEAVING**


1) Connect to the loom as described previously. The software defaults to the File tab. For complete information on the Files tab, including how to import files, see page 44.



- 2) Click a file from the list to select it.
- 3) Click Open for Weaving. The Weaving tab will open with your selected file as shown in the next screenshot.

### Note:

You can also double-click a file to open it for weaving.



### Power On

When you power on the loom using the software, the loom will go through a series of self-tests: The solenoid self-test, the warp tension motor initialization, and (if the loom has two warp beams) the second warp tension motor initialization. A notification will appear in the software letting you know that the tension system is calibrating. It will be removed when the calibration is complete. If you have one warp tension motor, the process will take about 90 seconds. If you have two, it will be about 180 seconds. Once the self-tests are complete, you will be able to continue using the software. The motors should return to the settings the loom was shutdown in.

### Note:


If you open a file for weaving (see page 26) when the loom is powered off, the loom will automatically power on.

The Power button is used to turn weaving mode on/off. It is not used to completely Shutdown the loom. Shutting down the loom is done through the utilities tab and is only needed when preparing the loom to be unplugged form power.

1) Click Power On to boot up the loom.


The loom will begin its self-tests. At the same time, the button will switch to Power Off and the Power light on the interface will turn briefly yellow, then red.



3) Once the loom has completed its self-tests, you will be able to commence weaving.

### **RESUME A WEAVING SESSION**

1) Connect to the loom as described previously. The software defaults to the File tab. For complete information on the Files tab, including how to import files, see page 44.



2) Click the file that was last being used to resume the session.

- 3) Click Open for Weaving.
- 4) The resume weaving dialog appears. Click OK to continue weaving.

### **CONTROLLING THE CLOTH ADVANCE**

The cloth advance controls allow you to advance the warp without weaving, or reverse the warp. You can also set the picks per inch (PPI). The default PPI is 15.

### Set the PPI

The default for the cloth advance is picks per inch, but you can change inches to centimeters in the options tab. See page 53 for instructions on changing to centimeters.

It's important to note that PPI can be affected by types of yarn and the sett, so please use the PPI as indicated in the Cloth Advance Box as a starting point, and understand that numbers may need to be adjusted to get the correct PPI on the cloth. However, once you have the PPI set, it will not change on the cloth until adjusted in the software.

1) In the software go to the Cloth Advance area and click in the PPI field.



2) Use the small arrow keys to change the value, or click in the field and type in the value you want. You can enter fractional values when typing, for example "15.25".

### Note:

If you want to advance the warp quickly, for example when warping the loom, set the PPI to one.

### Advance the Warp

Typically, you manually advance forward to bring the fell line to the correct weaving position after you have warped the loom. The correct position is when the beater arms hit the bumpers and the fell line is at the reed.



3) In the software go to the Cloth Advance area.



4) Use the up arrow to advance the warp. Click the arrow until the warp has advanced as far as you want it.

### **SET WARP TENSION**

You can set the tension by entering a number in the field or by using the up and down arrows on the field. The default tension is set at 55.

When the loom is powered on for weaving, the warp tension motor will search for its reference home, then return to the tension setting left by the weaver in the previous weaving session.

 In the software go to the Warp Tension field. Use the arrow keys to change the value, or click in the field and type in the value you want.



### **TABBY**

You may want to weave a tabby (plain weave) header before beginning your main pattern. The tabby tab allows you to choose the pattern that will create plain weave with the threading you are using. Once you have chosen the correct tabby on the Tabby tab, you will be able to switch to it at any point by clicking the Tabby button on the Weaving tab. For information on how to setup new tabbies, please see page 53. When selected, the tabby will begin with pick A. The tabby defaults include both "Odds and Evens" and "Evens and Odds." Choose the best option depending on the last pick before the tabby section.

1) Open the Tabby Tab by clicking on the name. The tabby will only show the number of shafts available on your loom. The following example was taken on a 40 shaft loom.



2) From the drop-down menu, choose the tabby to use with your threading. Several defaults are available.

3) Return to the weaving tab.




4) Click Tabby to switch to the pre-defined tabby. The pattern showing on the weaving tab will change to plain weave and the button will change from Tabby to Pattern with red text. The tabby will begin with pick A, which is the top pick shown on the Tabby tab.

### Note:

If the pattern that is showing is not plain weave, you may have chosen the wrong tabby. Return to the tabby tab and change the tabby.

5) To return to the pattern, click the Pattern button.


### **REVERSE**

The Reverse feature flips the pattern upside down and keeps you weaving forward. This is NOT used to unweave or to go backwards in your pattern.


This could be used to provide symmetry in a pattern, for example, keeping the ends of a scarf the same when it is worn.

1) Click Reverse to reverse the weaving pattern. This allows you to automatically reverse the weaving order of the WIF.

2) The button will change to Forward with red text. Click Forward to return to the original pattern.



### **SET THE RANGE**

The default range for the WIF is from the first to last pick. If you do not want to weave the whole pattern, enter the range of picks you want to use. Once you reach the end of the range, the range will repeat.



Use this feature to experiment with different looks from the same WIF file. You could also choose a small section from a longer pattern to help create a set of differing sized items, for example, a table runner and napkins.

1) In the Set Range Area, click Set Range.




2) The Set Range window appears.




3) Enter the Start and End Picks. Click Apply.

The following examples show the full pattern, then 1-10 and then 1-15 were set as the range for the same WIF file. Each pattern appears slightly different.

# **UNWEAVE**

#### **WARNING:**

Anytime you move the weaving backwards, you must remove the pin in the cloth storage beam. This will release the tension on your finished cloth so that the loom will not be damaged.

The Unweave button is used when you need to remove some of your weft threads. When you press down the treadle, the shed will open the picks in the reverse order that you wove. The warp beam will move backwards when Unweave is selected. Once you have removed the weft back to the desired point, you can use the manual advance buttons in the cloth advance section of the Weaving tab to adjust your fell line back to the proper point if necessary.

1) Take the pin out of the cloth advance beam so that the cloth will unwind easily.

2) Click Unweave.



3) The button will change to Weave with red text. Click Weave to return to normal functionality.

# Reverse the Warp

Use this option to adjust the fell line if necessary.

- 1) Make sure the pin is out of the cloth advance beam so that the cloth will unwind easily
- 2) In the software go to the Cloth Advance area.



3) Use the down arrow to reverse the warp. Click the arrow until the warp has reversed as far as you want it. Use the beater to adjust the fell line.

- 4) Reset the tension. Depending on how far you have unwoven, you may need to rewind the warp onto the warp beam.
- 5) Return the pin to the cloth advance beam.

#### Note:

If you cannot find the hole for the pin easily, move the cloth advance beam by using the beater until you see the hole. The cloth advance beam will not wind on cloth unless the pin is in the hole.

6) If there is any slack in the cloth you can tighten up by using the beater.

# **ADJUST THE PICK**

You can change the pick to be woven by using the right or left arrow keys on the keyboard, or by entering the exact pick number to weave. If the shed is closed, the solenoids will fire to adjust the pick. The display will be adjusted to show the changes. Changing the pick with the arrow keys is the fastest way to step through the design.

When a range is set, the pick will "wrap around" when the value would stray outside the bounds set by the range.

When opening the last file you used, most versions of the Compu-Dobby 5 software will ask you if you want to resume where you left off at your last weaving session. If you have an older version, it may not save your last pick. In this case, enter the pick you want to start this weaving session with.

You can also use this feature to start at a different pick then the one you left off at for design purposes.

#### Note:

Check the current pick to see what will be opened when you treadle. If the current pick is zero, treadle once to advance to the correct pick.

# **Change the Pick**

#### Note:

Change the pick with the right or left arrow keys while the shed is closed to quickly step through the design.

1) Press the right arrow on the keyboard to increase the pick by one. Press the left arrow on the keyboard to decrease the pick by one.





# **ZOOM IN ON THE WIF**


You can zoom in on the WIF in order to see it in more detail. You can zoom out on the WIF in order to see more of it.

# LOCK THE WARP BEAM

There is a button that allows you to lock the warp beam in place. When the warp beam is locked, the cloth advance is automatically disabled.

This feature could be used by weavers who want to be able to experiment with placing wefts while manually advancing the cloth and letting off warp.

If you need to treadle through your pattern for some reason, you can use this feature to avoid having the warp advance, however it is faster to turn off the cloth advance without locking the warp beam. See page 47.

#### Note:

Change the pick with the right or left arrow keys while the shed is closed to quickly step through the design. You do not need to lock the warp beam or turn off the cloth advance.

- 1) Open the software.
- 2) Click the Lock warp beam button.




3) Click the button again to turn it off.



## **POWER OFF**

1) When you are done weaving, click Power Off to return the loom to its normal standby state. If you are going to turn off power to the loom, shutdown the loom through the software.


#### FILE TAB

Files are stored on the loom. The files must be in the WIF format. The file tab allows you to open your weaving files or to transfer weaving files to the loom. It is the default tab that appears when you open the software.

If you are using Weavepoint, you can use the loom control feature to open Weavepoint files directly in AVLDrive. With any other software, you must export your weaving files to the WIF format. With the Compu-Dobby 5, files are stored directly on the loom. From the files tab, you can open WIF files that have been stored on the loom. You can also upload files from your computer to the loom for use.

#### Note:

If no file is selected, only Transfer to Loom and Open, Upload to Loom, and Backup to Local Machine will be available.










## Show repeat counter

The color bar to the right of the draft will appear. The following examples show the color bar on and the color bar off.




#### Show drawdown in color

# Show numbers in liftplan

When you are zoomed in far enough on the WIF, you will be able to see the harness numbers. The following example shows the WIF or if you turn this option off. This is also what will appear if the file is zoomed too far out to show legible numbers. The examples for the color drawdown on the previous page show harness numbers.



#### Fabric scrolls down

If selected the fabric will scroll down on the screen as you weave, if not, the fabric will scroll up. The following example shows this option turned on. The other screenshots in this manual show the fabric scrolling up.



#### Use metric (cm) for advance

This option allows you to use the metric system for the cloth advance. The default is imperial (inches).


#### **Enable Cloth Beam Advance**

This option allows you to turn on or off the cloth beam advance. The cloth beam advance is also turned off if the warp beam is locked. This can be used to halt the cloth advance when stepping through the design.

### **TABBY TAB**

This tab allows you to set up or use a tabby (plain weave). Several defaults are included. If your threading requires a tabby pattern that is not included, you can add a new tabby. You can also edit, delete, or rename existing tabbies.

1) With the AVLDrive software open, click Tabby.



2) To select a tabby, choose it from the drop-down menu. The tabby that appears in the tab is the one that will be selected when the Tabby button is clicked on the Weaving tab.

# Add a Tabby

Once you have added a new tabby, you will need to edit so that the correct harnesses rise on each lift.





# USING A TABLET WITH COMPU-DOBBY 5

Sometimes it is difficult to find the right place to put a computer for weaving on your loom. It seems like it is either in the way, at risk of an errant fly shuttle, or too far out of your normal visual range. Putting it on a chair next to the loom is a bit too low and requires you to turn too so far that you have trouble keeping your rhythm.

One solution is to use a tablet. A tablet is a great way to weave with the Compu-Dobby 5. With the addition of a mounting arm it can be positioned so that it is at the correct height while not obstructing your view of the action of the loom. And it can be moved out of the way with just a push.

AVL does not recommend specific tablets or operating systems. There are many manufacturers and models to choose from; too many for us to monitor. With the operating systems in common use today, iPads are able to use the "loomName.local" style of address. However, the Android tablets do not support ".local" so the standard IP address will need to be used. See page 16 for more information about the loom name and IP addresses.

#### Choosing an arm

The first thing is to choose how you will attach the arm to the loom. Many arms attach with a clamp while some will need screw holes in the frame of the loom. A clamp is not usually as stable as a more permanent mounting and if you want to be able to move the tablet aside with a quick swipe of the hand, it may not be the best choice.

Another consideration is the capacity of the arm. If you are thinking of using a large tablet like the 13" iPad, many of the arms cannot support that size tablet. With the mechanical motion of the loom, you will need a fairly robust arm to keep it from drooping. So, check that both the size and the weight capacity of the arm are sufficient.

# Choosing a tablet


The tablet needs a minimum resolution of 1024 x 768 pixels. On the iPad Retina displays that translates to needing 2048 x 1536 pixels. We have followed industry standards while creating AVLDrive so the tablet needs a browser that is consistent with current standards.

A USB cable connection is not required. The loom will automatically connect to your router (if it has been configured to do so) or it will create its own private network. See page 11 and following for more information.

#### Reset the connection

Unlike computers many tablets are designed to be turned off and on without disturbing existing connections. In many cases, when you are finished with AVLDrive on a tablet you will need to reset the connection for the loom. This happens automatically with computers, but because of the difference in the way connections are handled by tablets, it becomes a manual step. If you forget, the next time you attempt to connect to the loom you will probably get a busy message, and you can send a reset message at that time.

1) When connecting to the loom, you receive the message below.



- 2) Enter "/reset" after the URL or IP address in your web browser.
- 3) Refresh your page.



4) Once you receive the notification that the "current user has been logged out", simply reenter your normal URL or IP address.

# COMPU-DOBBY 5 CONNECTION INFORMATION

The Compu-Dobby 5 uses a connection known as "http," which your browser may indicate is unsafe. Since no personal information is passed over the connection, additional security is not required.

## SEND TROUBLESHOOTING INFORMATION TO AVL

If you are having problems with your loom, AVL may ask you to send the log file generated by the program to them in order to figure out the problem. In some cases, the log file may be so large that you have problems sending it. Follow these instructions to make the log file easier to handle. In order to use this option, you will need to be able to recreate the issue.


1) Enter "/reboot" after the URL or IP address in your web browser. The loom should reboot - this clears the log file.

#### Note:

The option to reboot the loom was added in v.1.2.0. If your loom is on a previous version, you will need to shutdown the loom completely, then turn it back on.

- 2) Wait for the loom to reboot and for the network to reconnect. This may take a couple of minutes.
- 3) Reload AVLDrive. The reboot will cause the browser to disconnect.
- 4) Perform the actions in the software or on the loom that causes the problem. Repeat the actions a few times.
- 5) Write an email to AVL explaining the problem. In the email, explain what actions you take, what results and error messages you receive, and how many times the problem occurred.
- 6) Choose the Utilities tab.





7) Click Show Log.



- 8) Select all of the text in the log file.
- 9) Copy the log file and paste into the email. Send the email to sales@avlusa.com.

Your warranty covers:

New Looms: AVL Looms, Inc., a California corporation ("AVL") warrants to the original purchaser of any AVL loom (each, a "Product") that the Product will be free from defects in materials and workmanship during the limited warranty period described herein. The limited warranty coverage begins (a) the day the Product is installed by a professional from AVL, or (b) on the date of shipment from AVL to the original purchaser if the Product is not installed by AVL (the "Effective Date"). Except as set forth under the section entitled "What is Excluded?" below, AVL will, for a period of two (2) years from the Effective Date (the "Original Warranty Period"), repair or replace the defective part(s) of the Product with a repaired, renewed, or comparable part (whichever is deemed necessary or proper by AVL) if it becomes defective or inoperative or fails to perform according to AVL's specifications. Any repair during the Original Warranty Period will be carried out without charge to you for parts (except applicable taxes, if any). You will be responsible for all labor in connection with installation of the parts and service upon the Product, as well as the cost of shipping involved.
