

ABOUT THE EXHIBITION

Featuring some fifty works, the *M* is for Menopause, Baby! group exhibition uses art to talk about a subject that people tend to shy away from ... THE MENOPAUSAL JOURNEY. By 2025, it's estimated that 1.1 billion women will be experiencing menopause, or "The Change" as it is frequently called. Menopause is not a disease. Menopause is not a mental health condition. It is a natural part of the aging process when a person has gone 12 months without a menstrual period. In the United States, the average age for menopause is 51. However, it can occur earlier in life. But what exactly is menopause? What does it mean to be perimenopausal or postmenopausal? Too often, these normal stages of life are spoken about negatively in hushed tones as if they're something to be ashamed of or feared. Those with symptoms may be told it's all in their mind and struggling can become normalized. The M is for Menopause, Baby! exhibition brings together creatives, health care providers, and other experts to offer accurate information and challenge the myths, stereotypes and stigma that surround the menopausal journey.

Health equity is central to this exhibition. Now more than ever, it is critical to reduce the disparity in health status for underserved populations and to ensure dignity and respect for everyone. Achieving this requires ongoing efforts and acknowledgement of systemic bias. Building on that perspective, the exhibition features a silent auction to benefit My Sister's House, which is a local non-profit that aids victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, and human trafficking. Likewise, to address period poverty, a period products drive is occurring in conjunction with the exhibition, and dropoff boxes are available at Rocky Mount Mills, Eastern North Carolina Medical Group, and UNC Health Nash. Menopause and menstruation share many commonalities. And for some, the first period can be shrouded in the same silence, secrecy, shame, and confusion as the last period. And in both of these instances, life changes forever in new and unexpected ways that are often not discussed. The *M* is for Menopause, Baby! exhibition provides an art-centered space to start a conversation that welcomes all voices.

M is for Menopause, Baby! is presented by Drinking Gourd Gallery in partnership with Rocky Mount Mills, KIKI PIPER, and UNC Health Nash.

Mainly, I wanted to learn about color theory and how to blend colors.

Fluid art is also called acrylic pour art. It is a form of abstract impressionist artform where I pour various mediums on a canvas or other surfaces. The paint can be manipulated by using compressed air, palette knives, or gravity. As a travel nurse, I often use colors from the places I've traveled. For instance, I recently had a travel assignment in Mississippi on the Golf Coast, I used a lot of brown and turquois colors to represent the ocean and shoreline. I also draw my inspiration from the people I meet in my travels. My recent work "Sisterhood" represents the many nurses I've had the opportunity to work with.

When writer friends in New York invited me to join them in abstract painting classes on Zoom with Mellissa Morris via Falmouth Art Center in Massachusetts, I signed up. The result is the art work I am now doing.

This is what I learned to do: I experiment. Making art is almost like cooking or writing. I incorporate a variety of materials from china markers, collage, colored pencils, paints, pastels, charcoals, and transform recycled paper in my work.

Abstract painting helped me to thrive during the Pandemic. My adventure has freed up my imagination and my work is a form of meditation: I have active conversation with the materials, the canvas or paper and the colors. Most often, I draw a line and see where it takes me.

Sometimes I think, other times, I am spoken to and a story unfolds. I believe Art heals the spirit and weaves richness into our lives! I hope you will enjoy looking at my work.

I was raised in Wilson, North Carolina and graduated from East Carolina University's School of Art. In 1969 I moved to New York City and stopped painting for approximately fifty years. My interest in the creative process however led me on a different path, to independently study a number of artists and to learn from their best practices. This research resulted in the publication of a well reviewed photo essay children's picture book: Henry Moore: From Bones and Stones to Sketches and Sculptures.

Upon my return to Wilson in 2002, I taught elementary school and middle school art to literally thousands of students during my thirteen year tenure. I support and enjoy friendships through Wilson Arts, NC Museum of Art, Wilson Active Artists, Falmouth Art Center, and Tar River Artists Collaborative.















As an African-American woman, I grew up with a keen awareness that hair was a symbol of history, identity, survival, freedom, creativity, pride, empowerment, and resistance that could also be used as a tool of oppression. Our kinks, naps, coils, curls, braids, plaits and "kitchens" were the subject of much discussion. I remember that my aunt and her friends had beautiful, fierce Afros that commanded respect. And on any given Saturday afternoon in the 1970s, my mother could open the Royal Crown pomade and wield a hot comb in a way that would have made Madame C. J. Walker jealous. I haven't straightened my hair in a long time now. Instead, I wear it short and natural, which tends to surprise people who haven't seen me in a while. And I am going gray. This painting is about that transition. About embracing change. Seeking out the new self that is patiently waiting in the shadows. Forging new paths. And loving my roots.

Vasomotor symptoms (VMS), commonly called hot flashes and night sweats inspired this piece. This vasomotor menopause symptom impacts roughly 75 percent of American women going through perimenopause and menopause, according to The North American Menopause Society (NAMS). You are viewing the back of this woman as she leans to the side and shouts to anyone in earshot, "IS IT HOT IN HERE? OR, IS IT JUST ME?" If you look closely, you may be able to see some of the faceless women that I "tattooed" on my subject's arms and back. I wanted to convey that this woman is not alone in her experience.




Seeing Red: Period Poverty in America

Period poverty refers to a lack of access to menstrual products and affects many women and girls globally causing physical, mental, and emotional distress. The stigma and shame associated with periods often prevents individuals from talking about it. U.S. Rep. Grace Meng (D-NY) introduced Menstrual Equity for All Act in 2019 and it was signed into law in October 2021. This law requires all public schools serving any grade 6-12 to provide free menstrual products in school bathrooms. Together, we can work to end period poverty by donating pads, tampons, and other menstrual products to local organizations and schools on National Period Day, October 19, and throughout the year.




Soul Vibrations

I worked in the healthcare field for over 50 years, and I enjoyed doing art with the residents on my extended care unit. They enjoyed drawing and coloring as much as I did. I also once had the idea to do a quilt with the residents. I created the pattern, and I shared it with them. And together we made a quilt that still hangs on the recreation room wall at the hospital where I used to work.
