The Holy Spirit You Never Knew Week 3: <u>Learn!</u> Teacher's Guide

1) Preparation

- a. Study the Bible
 - i. Isaia<mark>h 42:1-4</mark>
 - ii. Isaiah 50:4-6
 - iii. Luke 2:21-40
 - iv. Acts 2:1-13
- b. Carefully read Fresh Air
 - i. Chapter 3
 - ii. Chapter 8, pages 189-95, 204-07
- c. Read the discussion questions about these chapters at the end of Fresh Air.
- Class goal: to understand how important study and learning are to a robust life in the Spirit. Put negatively, to realize that one needn't lose control to experience the Spirit or, more important, the Spirit doesn't step in *after* preparation and learning but *through* preparation and learning.

3) Suggested class outline

- a. Review last week, with special emphasis upon the disciplines that opened the way for Daniel to become a poster boy for the Spirit for the long haul. (5 minutes)
- b. Simeon's song (Luke 2) (15 minutes)
 - i. Point out the three verbs that depict how Simeon experiences the Spirit in Luke 2:25-27
 - ii. Read Simeon's song (the nunc dimittis) carefully out loud
 - iii. Ask people where its various phrases come from (which you know are from the portrait of the servant figure in Isaiah 40-55)
 - iv. Discuss the relationship between learning and the Spirit. Perhaps ask people:
 - 1. When they have tended to think the Spirit would show up (e.g., in worship, at camp)
 - 2. Whether they can recall experiences of the Spirit that took place during a period of learning and, more generally, discipline (like Lent!)
- c. Briefly study the steps of routine maintenance in Isaiah 50—which suggest how the servant figure of Isaiah 40-55 received revelation. (10 minutes)
- d. If there is still time, discuss one more example of the importance of learning, this time where we might not expect it: on the day of Pentecost! (10 minutes)
 - i. Read out loud Acts 2:1-13
 - ii. I would suggest spending less time discussing this and, instead, teaching them three key points based upon Acts 1-2 (see *HuffPost* essay)
 - 1. Stay put and wait
 - 2. Shut up and pray
 - 3. Sit tight and study
 - iii. In preparation
 - 1. Read Fresh Air, 189-95, 204-07

- 4) Suggested use of the board. Divide the board into thirds with vertical lines. At the top of the first column, write Simeon (Luke). At the top of the second, write The Servant (Isaiah). At the top of the third, write First Pentecostals (Acts) (or something like that).
- 5) **Discussion questions.** Feel free to use the discussion questions at any time during this class.
