Regional Australia Menstrual Health Survey 2023

Context

Modibodi wanted to understand how periods were managed by people living in regional Australia and if period management was experienced differently than in urban areas. Our research was designed to start a conversation on the experiences of regional women, girls and those who menstruate. For our part ensuring our products are accessible and information on reusable period products is easily available.

Results


The full survey results have been shared with government and menstrual health academics to continue a conversation on the needs of people living regionally. It can be used to inform further research to address menstrual health in non-urban areas.

Survey Boundaries

- Data was collected online via a Survey Monkey online survey. There were 21 questions in total.
- The survey was open to rural/regional/remote participants who menstruate in Australia.
- Respondents were recruited online via the Modibodi website and through partners sharing the survey.
- The survey was open from 6th March to 21st May and from 20th June to 5th September 2023.
- 436 respondents submitted answers with a 84% completion rate.
- The age of respondents ranged from under 18 to over 52, with over 54% of respondents aged 25-40.
- 98% of respondents identified as female, 1% as male and 1% chose not to disclose.
- Respondents came from all States and the Northern Territory, there were no respondents from the ACT.
- Respondents were asked to answer the survey based on their experience over the past three months.

Q1 Are you located outside a Capital City?



Q2 Which state do you live in?




Q3 What is the approximate population of your town?


Q4 Approximately how many minutes would it take to drive to a store that could stock period products?

Q5 How old are you?



Q6 What is your gender?



Q7 What is your employment status?



Q8 What is your highest education level?



Q9 Over the past 3 months could you access period care products when you needed them?



Q10 Over the past 3 months were you able to afford enough period care products to change them as often as you wanted?



Q11 Over the past 3 months did you feel that the cost of period care products was affordable to you?




Q13 Over the past 3 months how long would you need to travel to reach a store with available period care products?




Q17 Over the past 3 months have you been able to access information related to your menstrual cycle and health when you needed it?

Q18 Where would you access menstrual cycle and health information?





Q19 Over the past 3 months have you been absent from work/school because you of your menstrual cycle?




