

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# First ... **Turn Your Light ON**

Remove the light cover

They are very durable and by holding the two corners and pulling down, it should come right off.



Make sure the battery is fully pushed in and connected to the two terminals.

Click the ON/ OFF button to activate the light

This activates your light and DOES NOT have to be done daily. You only need to do this once when you set the light up.

- Place the clear plastic casing back onto the light
- Mount your light in a sunny location and you're good to go!

Make sure to choose a location that receives **direct sunlight** without any shade. More tips inside...

## Where to position your Solar Light?



Solar lights are best placed in areas where they receive *direct* sunlight for at least 8 hours to ensure long-lasting luminance.



Cloud and rain can effect how much charge your battery receives, especially during winter



Make sure to mount your light away from any shaded areas.

E.g Shadows caused by your house, surrounding hedges or canopies.



Other light sources located near your light could trick your solar light into thinking its daytime when the sun has gone down.

Don't position next to other outdoor lighting

The perfect place for your solar light is somewhere sunny with no shade!





Please note: Position solar light in direct sunlight for 8 hours to charge the battery fully. Charging time depends on the intensity and and duration of direct sunlight.

## Care Tips for Your Solar Lights & Artwork

### Tip #1: Clean



If dirt or debris accumulates on your solar light, it may affect how the light works. To clean, gently wipe the light with a soft cloth or sponge dampened with mild soapy water. *Note: Please do not use any harsh cleaning products or detergents.* 

### Tip #2: Storing for winter



We highly recommend bringing your solar light in during the winter. As the weather can be harsh and unpredictable, putting them away in safe and dry storage can help prolong the lifespan of both the paint work and solar light.

#### For Best Practice:

1 Turn the light off and remove the battery

Removing the battery and storing this alongside your solar light will just prevent any corrosion that could damage or destroy the light.

2 Make sure the item is completely dry

When you bring your light inside make sure to dry the item completely before putting it away.

3 Store in a dry place

Do not keep the solar light in damp or humid area such as a basement or an outdoor shed. Instead, make sure to store it in a dry and warm place.

### Tip #3: Retouch (Optional)



Our wall plaques, wall art & garden brackets are powder-coated with weather resistant paint to help to protect your items.

However, over time, this protective layer may begin to break down due to exposure to the outdoor environment. This may happen quicker with more intricate designs or if you live by the sea.

Though weathering is natural and expected, you can **repaint** them if you notice the paint is wearing. Simply rub the paint work down with wire brush and repaint with any exterior paint.
