Foundation

Scripture Focus: Romans 12:3

L. J. Harry tells the following story:

still remember the day I saw the president of the United States in person. It was the fall of 2004, and President George W. Bush was finishing up his crisscross campaign of the US one month before Election Day. On that particular Saturday evening, he was coming to my hometown of Orlando. I was beyond excited to see the president. My family had come down from Ohio to visit, and they were going to go with us to the rally.

When we made it to the stadium, we were surrounded by a sea of people. And amidst all the moms and dads with cameras and binoculars, and all the kids with Bush buttons and flags, I saw the Secret Service. They were checking bags and purses, and they were mixing in with the crowd, watching for anything and anyone suspicious. I expected to see black suits, white shirts, and black ties, but these agents were in khakis and blue blazers. But their watchful eyes and their coiled earpieces gave them away.

We made our way through the crowd and to our seats in the arena. It was the middle of the day as we sat in the arena waiting for the president. From our seats, we could see the tunnel where we believed he would enter. I kept a close eye on the tunnel and a close eye on the stage. Throughout the day, several dignitaries stepped to the microphone and delivered their speeches to rally the crowd.

At first, their speeches were stirring. But as the day wore on and we wore out, we were done with the speeches and ready to see the president. The sun was setting, and the night was settling in, but still no president. Then one more spokeswoman stepped up to the mic and announced the president was almost to the stadium.

I could not decide if I should watch the helicopter or watch for the motorcade. While I was looking up and looking around, I heard these famous words echo throughout the stadium, "Ladies and gentlemen, the president of the United States."

I looked toward the tunnel, and there he was. The president was standing in the same stadium as me. I cannot describe how exciting it was to see and hear the president and first lady. It was worth the several hours of waiting, sitting in the steamy, hot weather on the rock hard bleachers.

The Father and His Possessed Son

They sat. They stood. They waited. They wondered when He would come down. And that is when they heard the shriek. One of the young men ran for the water. His dad was chasing after him, but he was too fast for his father. He thrashed around in the water for a while. His dad tried his best to pull him away. He tried to coax him, convince him. The years had been hard on this family.

This son was only a few years old when this dad realized his son was not in control. The Scripture tells us the devil tried to destroy the son in water and in fire, but he could not. But that did not keep him from trying. And the horror of losing his son or losing his own mind is what brought this father to the mountain that day. He had heard of Jesus and heard what He could do. And he was going to ask Jesus for a miracle.

Jesus Returned From the Mountaintop

Finally, after several minutes that seemed like months, the crowd could see Jesus and three of His faithful few starting to leave the summit, heading down the mountain. This was everybody's chance to be saved, healed, delivered, and forgiven. You name it, Jesus could do it. People brought their prayer request cards and wish lists, hoping Jesus would grant them.

As He made His way toward the crowd, the crowd made their way toward Jesus. They ran from all directions in His direction. But rather than worship, Jesus could hear arguing. He saw nine of His disciples and some of the religious teachers in a war of words, and Jesus asked why they were arguing.

The <u>disciples</u> were unable to cast out the demon.

But before Jesus could get an answer, this forlorn father spoke up. "Master, my son is possessed by a spirit. It tears him. He foams at the mouth. He gnashes with his teeth. The spirit even tries to destroy him in water and in fire. I brought him to your disciples to cast him out, but they could not. I need You to help me."

It must have been a difficult day when this dad found out his son was going to struggle. He watched as other dads sent their sons away for summer camps, but he could not afford to let his son out of his sight. He was not trying to keep him from having fun, he was just trying to keep him out of the water and out of the fire. He was trying to keep him alive. Life was unthinkably difficult for the dad. Life was unthinkably difficult for the boy.

From this father's point of view, the spirit that had attached itself to his son must have appeared indomitable. Mark 9:18 reads, "Whenever it seizes him, it throws him down" (ESV). The boy looked like a puppet, caught on the end of a string controlled by a merciless puppeteer. And the devil was pulling the strings whenever and however he wanted, as if this child was created as mere entertainment for a sick and sadistic devil.

LESSON BIG IDEA: We are able to believe, not because of our own righteousness, but because God has gifted us with faith.

Once the disciples tried to cast him out and could not, he must have appeared just as strong to them as he appeared to the father. This devil had not yet met Jesus, but he was about to. They brought the boy to Jesus, and as soon as he saw Jesus, the devil knew his seconds were numbered. That is when he revealed his grim colors. The Bible reads, "And when he saw him (Jesus), straightway the spirit tare him; and he fell on the ground, and wallowed foaming" (Mark 9:20, KJV).

It does not take a degreed theologian to understand the devil cares not for our souls or for our safety. When he peddles his wares, he only peddles one product: sin. And sin, according to James 1:15, always brings forth death. He may sell sin in different shapes, colors, and sizes, but when you tear away all the trappings, all Satan has to sell is sin. And all sin has to offer is death.

Here is what intrigues me about the devil and this story. The devil could not destroy this boy. If he could have, he would have. All he could do was make life miserable for him, but he could not take his life. If the devil could destroy us, he would, but he cannot. But that is not for lack of trying. So he often resorts to his plan B. He tries to destroy our faith. He will try to shake us and test our faith to see if we truly believe what we say we believe. He does that to us, and he did that to this father in Mark 9.

The Father's Doubt

This father's faith had been so shaken, he was able to stand sandal to sandal and stare into the compassionate eyes of Almighty God—the Great I Am—and still doubt. The next statement this dad made was filled with as much doubt as faith. "If You can do anything, have compassion on us and help us." Two letters which cast such a dark, foreboding shadow over faith—If.

Take a quick look at Jesus' highlight reel so far. He has turned water into wine, healed a nobleman's son, cast out a devil in Capernaum, healed Peter's mother-in-law, brought in more fish than the fishermen could count, touched and healed a leper, cleansed nine lepers and made one absolutely whole, healed a man sick with palsy, healed a withered hand, raised a widow's son from the dead, calmed a storm, cast out two devils in Gadara, healed a twelve-year-long issue of blood, and raised Jairus' daughter from the dead. And those are just some of the highlights.

We know, the disciples knew, and Jesus knew He could do anything for anyone at any time. But this father did not know that. The difficulty this father faced was so formidable in his mind, it eclipsed even the brightness of the glory of God standing in front of him. It is easy to fault him, but it is even easier to imitate him. If your faith has not yet been tested, just wait, it will be.

When the phone rings and the doctor calls you into her office to break the news that the cancer has spread, when the boss calls you into his office to break the news that the company is closing the doors on your career and your retirement, or when the highway patrol appears at your doorstep early in the morning to tell you the children you love most were involved in a tragic accident and are fighting for their lives—those are **moments when your faith is shaken and tested**. When you walk out of the doctor's office or the boss' office or into the ICU, those are the times you identify most with this heartbroken, exhausted father. "God, if You can heal this cancer. If You can find me another job. If You can raise up my baby girl."

This father's prayer was filled with the very real, unvarnished pain that had dogged him for the last couple of decades. So he reached out to Jesus in one last grasp for help and asked Jesus to have compassion and help him and his son. Jesus' response is remarkable. Jesus said, "If thou canst believe, all things are possible to him that believeth" (Mark 9:23, KJV).

Other translations make it clear that Jesus was incredulous. "What do you mean, 'If I can'?" (Mark 9:23, NLT). "'If you can'?" (Mark 9:23, NIV). "If you can'!" (Mark 9:23, ESV). "Since You can," or "Because You can" would have been a more appropriate prayer, but the beauty of the Bible is the real, unvarnished

cry of this father. The Bible does not paint him as filled with faith because God knows we will not always be filled with faith.

The key to this miracle and others is just simple faith. If we can believe, all things are possible to him and her who believes. According to Romans 12:3, God has dealt to every one of us a measure of faith. This father was given a measure of faith near the beginning of his life, but when his son began to be tortured by the devil, his faith began to wane. And every time the devil threw his son into the water, his faith waned. And each time the devil threw his son into the fire, his faith waned. Like a nail in the tread of a tire, his faith waned until there was very little left to push him forward. But he had just enough faith to reach out to Jesus.

There will be times when we come home from camp meeting or a conference and our faith soars above the clouds. In those times, it is easy to believe God is able and willing to work every miracle we need from Him. We know He is able to cure every incurable disease, empty every hospital bed, close every funeral home, pay the bills, and bring the groceries. We know Him as the mighty God and the everlasting Father—the one able and the one willing to work miracles when we pray.

But there are times our faith crawls along the basement floor, and we want to believe He is able and willing to work the miracles we need from Him. In those times, camp meeting and those conferences seem but a distant, faint memory. And now we face a terminal diagnosis, a stack of bills, an empty pantry, and empty stomachs.

This miracle shines a bright, blinding light on a father's doubt. He was not filled with faith, but despite his doubt, Jesus still took the time to hear his prayer and feel his pain. The father then looked to Jesus and responded, "Lord, I believe; help my unbelief!" (Mark 9:24, NKJV). He made no excuse for his doubt nor tried to justify himself with "I didn't mean if You can help. I meant since You can help. Yeah, that's it." He just cried out, "I believe, but I need You to help my unbelief."

There will be times when we doubt. We need not make excuses for our doubt because God will see right through them. We just need to respond honestly, like this father responded, and ask God to help us believe.

Finish

As the Scripture zooms out, we see a crowd of people running toward Jesus, this father, and the boy. They were curious to see what Jesus would do, what He would say. Jesus' next action was filled with compassion and power. He rebuked the unclean spirit, saying to it, "Deaf and dumb spirit, I command you, come out of him and enter him no more!" (Mark 9:25, NKJV). Against his will, the unclean spirit knew he had to go, but before he left, Mark 9:26 reads, "the spirit shrieked, convulsed him violently" (NIV).

This action was one more indicator that the devil cares not for us. He left the boy like a vengeful tenant may leave an apartment. The King James Version reads "the spirit cried, and rent him sore." He punched holes in the drywall, broke the windows, ripped out the vanity, and left the water running in the tub. He did all he could to hurt the boy one more time, but he knew he had to go once Jesus spoke the word.

LESSON BIG IDEA: We are able to believe, not because of our own righteousness, but because God has gifted us with faith.


To everyone's amazement, the boy lay on the ground motionless, seemingly lifeless. Many of the people around thought he was dead. But Jesus calmly walked to where he was lying, took him by the hand, and lifted him up. And he arose. From there, the father and son were reunited, and both of their lives were changed. In fact, the son's life was spared.

The Bible is silent regarding whether the father gave thanks to Jesus or whether he quit his job and followed Jesus. The very next verse places Jesus inside a house with His disciples, but the father and his newly delivered son are not recorded. This miracle is special because it shows the undisguised doubt of a frustrated, fatigued dad. But it also shows the compassion and power of our compassionate and powerful heavenly Father.

Hopefully today, your faith is soaring. Hopefully you believe God is able and willing to do everything you need Him to do. But perhaps your faith is not soaring. It may not even be climbing or gliding. It might be crawling. But you still have faith, for we know we have all been given a measure of faith.

So follow in the footsteps of the father in this story. Make your way to Jesus, make your impassioned plea to Him, and then trust Him to do what He knows to do and what only He can do. You will find He has the compassion and the power to work a miracle on your behalf.

 - 3. But there are times when our faith crawls along the basement floor, and we *want* to believe He is able and willing to work the miracles we need from Him.

- 4. This miracle of the father and his possessed son shines a bright, blinding light on a father's doubt. He was not filled with faith, but despite his doubt, Jesus still took the time to hear his prayer and feel his pain.
- D. There will be times when we doubt.
 - 1. We do not need to make excuses for our doubt.
 - 2. We need to simply ask God honestly to help our belief.

- \divideontimes This would be an excellent time for a personal testimony. Alternatively, consider asking ahead of time for a volunteer in the class to share his or her story.

s the Scripture zooms out, we see a crowd of people running toward Jesus, this father, and the boy. They were curious to see what Jesus would do and what He would say. Jesus' next action was filled with compassion and power. He rebuked the unclean spirit, saying to it, "Deaf and dumb spirit, I command you, come out of him and enter him no more!" (Mark 9:25, NKJV). Against its will, the unclean spirit knew it had to go, but before it left, Mark 9:26 reads, "the spirit shrieked, convulsed him violently" (NIV).

This action was one more indicator that the devil cares not for us. The King James Version reads "the spirit cried, and rent him sore."The spirit left the boy like a vengeful tenant may leave an apartment. It punched holes in the drywall, broke the windows, ripped out the vanity, and left the water running in the tub. The spirit did all it could to hurt the boy one more time, but it knew it had to go once Jesus spoke the word.

To everyone's amazement, the boy lay on the ground motionless, seemingly lifeless. Many of the people around thought he was dead. But Jesus calmly walked to where the boy was lying, took him by the hand, and lifted him up. And the boy arose. From there, the father and son were reunited, and both of their lives were changed. In fact, the son's life was spared.

The Bible is silent regarding whether the father gave thanks to Jesus or whether he guit his job and followed Jesus. The very next verse places Jesus inside a house with His disciples, but the father and his newly delivered son are not recorded. This miracle is special because it shows the undisquised doubt of a frustrated, fatigued dad. But it also shows the compassion and power of our compassionate and powerful heavenly Father.

Hopefully today your faith is soaring. Hopefully you believe God is able and willing to do everything you need Him to do. But perhaps your faith is not soaring. It may not even be climbing or gliding. It might be crawling. But you still have faith, for we know we have all been given a measure of faith.

So follow in the footsteps of the father in this story. Make your way to Jesus, make your impassioned plea to Him, and then trust Him to do what He knows to do and what only He can do. You will find He has the compassion and the power to work a miracle on your behalf.

Searching for Faith

Prior to class, write or print the word "faith" very small on two-inch pieces of paper and laminate them with contact paper (one for each group of four students). Locate printed articles containing the word "faith" (one article for each group of four students).

As students enter class, play the new series song, "Faith Is" . Show the small papers containing the word "faith." Ask students to guess the word on the paper. Write student responses on the whiteboard.

Have the class form groups of scientists and assistants (four in each group). Give each group a magnifying glass, a dictionary, a small paper containing "faith," and an article about faith. Students inspect the paper and article to find faith. Have one student in each group look up faith in the dictionary and read the definition to the group.

Reflection

- Why would a scientist need tools to inspect something small?
- How can your friends see your faith in action?
- How can God find faith in you?

Faith is carried in our hearts. Jesus does not need any tools to find our faith because He gave it to us as a gift.

Today we will investigate the definition of faith and learn how a father received the gift of healing for his son after asking for help in overcoming doubt.

Acorn to an Oak

Show an acorn, a real one or the visual (TRP) . Then flip over the visual to show an oak tree.

Show a time-lapse video of a tiny acorn becoming a mighty oak tree.

Discuss how the oak tree changes. Compare it to how faith starts out small and grows.

Reflection

- Does the acorn look anything like the oak tree it will become?
- How is the acorn like our faith?
- How do you know the acorn can and will become an oak tree?
- · What can happen if we have faith in God?

Life in a Drop of Water

Show images of microscopic organisms in water such as the first fifty seconds from the video, "Life in a Drop of Water." Suggested link:

Afterwards, let students brainstorm facts they learned from the video. List responses on the whiteboard.

Reflection

- Even though the parts of a cell aren't visible to our naked eyes, are they still there? How do you know?
- · How is faith like unseen cells?
- How can we believe in what we do not see?
- Why do you believe in God?

Series Memory Passage

"But without faith it is impossible to please him: for he that cometh to God must believe that he is, and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him" (Hebrews 11:6).

Memory Call-out

Display the memory verse (TRP) . Number the students as 1, 2, or 3. Call out a number: 1, 2, or 3. The students with the corresponding number will stand and say the verse. Call the numbers in any order and even twice in a row. Play for several minutes to ensure students are comfortable with the verse.

Independent Practice/Reflection

Give each student a copy of the acorn pattern (TRP) ... Hand out scissors and crayons. Instruct students to cut out the acorns and then write the verse on their acorns and color them.

Erase the Verse

Display the memory verse (TRP) . Write out the verse on the whiteboard. Erase every other word. Ask volunteers to fill in the blanks. After quoting, volunteers start erasing one word at a time while quoting it after each erasure.

Drawing the Memory Verse

Hand out paper and crayons. Students copy the verse at the top of their papers and draw a picture of themselves seeking God at the bottom of the page.

Students share their drawings with a partner.

Reflection

- · How do we make God happy?
- · Why do we need faith?

Bible Lesson: *You've Got Faith (Mark 9:17-29)*

- Have you ever planted a seed? If so, what was it and what happened?
- Did you have faith when you planted your seed? Why or why not?

Memory Circle

Prior to class, create "faith cards" by writing one word or phrase from Hebrews 11:6 on a large index card for every student, or print out the memory verse words ...

Display the memory verse (TRP) . Students will stand in a circle in word order, display the words at chest level, and recite the verse together. Continue reciting as two cards at a time are hidden until the class can recite without prompts. Students can swap cards, change positions, and repeat the activity.

When you've played for several minutes, set aside the cards for the Finish portion of today's lesson.

Memory Blanks

Display the memory verse (TRP) . Give each student paper and a pencil. Ask students to copy the verse on their papers but leave out five words, drawing blank lines in the spaces.

Students exchange papers with a friend. Challenge students to write the missing words without referring to the displayed verse.

When they have finished, have students read the verse together as a class.

Reflection

- Why is it important to memorize and share God's Word?
- According to the memory verse, what do we have to do when we come to God? Why?
- · How will memorizing God's Word build your faith?

Designate actors to play the roles of Jesus and a father. Give them each a script (TRP) . You will be the narrator. Divide the remaining students, having one group pretend to be scribes and the other to be followers of Jesus.

NARRATOR: One day a multitude was with Jesus and His disciples. Scribes who hated Jesus and His followers were criticizing the disciples. The scribes felt like they were better than the disciples because on this day the disciples had a problem. Jesus asked the disciples what was going on. A man in the crowd explained the situation. He revealed that since birth his son had been very sick.

FATHER: My son is possessed of a dumb spirit that prevents him from speaking, yet makes him fall down, tear at his skin, and have violent convulsions! It causes him to fall into campfires, gnash his teeth, and foam at his mouth!

NARRATOR: The father told Jesus that he had asked the disciples to pray for his son's healing. Although he had seen others get healed when the disciples prayed, today they had been unable to cast out the demon. The father was afraid that he did not have enough faith. Jesus told the man the same thing He had taught His disciples.

Jesus: If you can believe, all things are possible to you.

FATHER: I want to believe, but I need You to help me to believe more! Help me get rid of my doubt!

NARRATOR: Jesus rebuked the evil spirit and commanded it to come out of the child and to never enter him again. The boy fell to the ground as if he were lifeless. Jesus took him by the hand and raised him up, totally healed. The witnesses, father, and disbelieving scribes were amazed.

The Bible does not tell us that Jesus increased the father's faith. Jesus did not ask him, "How much faith do you have?" The man said he believed. Because of this little bit of faith, he made the effort to get his child to the disciples for healing. His effort qualifies as a good work, doesn't it? Imagine trying to get a falling down, thrashing child through a multitude. It probably made him very tired and he may have been embarrassed.

Just as the father was focused on his small portion of faith, thinking it was not enough, the disciples were focused on their imagined problem instead of the purpose. Privately they asked Jesus why

they had been unable to cast out the demon. They thought the problem was within them.

But who was delivering these miracles of healing? God! And who were the disciples supposed to have faith in? God, not themselves!

Jesus taught His disciples that nothing was impossible if they had faith as small as a mustard seed. He told a parable about faith the size of a mustard seed being able to move mountains. The disciples learned to depend on God, not themselves!

Show the mustard seed visual (TRP) . A mustard seed is about one-sixteenth of an inch long. Look how tiny one-sixteenth is on this ruler.

(Pass out the rice.) One grain of rice can hold four mustard seeds. Everyone take one grain of rice and find a place to keep it. Do you think you could carry it every day in your pocket without losing it? Or in your school backpack? We carry our faith in our hearts where we cannot forget it, lose it, or allow someone to steal it. Faith cannot be measured by a ruler. When you picked up that grain of rice, you were picking up four times as much faith as Jesus told the disciples they needed when believing for miracles.

Although mustard seeds start out tiny, some grow into a bush up to eight feet tall, almost a tree. Jesus wanted to show His disciples that a little faith could have incredible results, so He allowed the crowd to hear the man crying that he needed more faith. Only then did God give him his heart's desire—a healed child. Jesus proved that miracles come from believing and having the faith to receive them, not because of a measurable amount of faith, and not because of personal works.

Faith brings many changes in our lives. Faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God. You have the gift of faith, and you can receive the gift of the Holy Ghost.

Discussion Questions:

- How do you think God feels when you doubt Him or His promises?
- How did the miraculous power of Jesus affect the faith of witnesses around Him?
