Back in April, I received an unusual message from Warmun Arts in the East Kimberley, an art centre I have worked with for years and had the privilege to visit on many occasions. Dom, the Gallery Coordinator, said a crate had been discovered at the back of the art centre's storeroom that contained more than 20 works on paper by the legendary Rammey Ramsey that had not been seen for ten years. He sent pictures of its contents. Might Aboriginal Contemporary be interested in exhibiting them as a collection? It was one of the fastest decisions I've ever made.

Rammey is a senior Warmun artist whose country, Warlawoon, lies to the west of Bedford Downs. Rammey lived and worked on stations around Warlawoon for most of his life until he moved to Bow River Station, where he still lives under the care of his two daughters, artists Tracey and Kathy Ramsay. Rammey didn't start painting until 2000 and, in the same year, was part of a show titled 'Gaagembi', literally meaning 'Poor Things', which included works expressing

sorrow for loss of Country and the traditional way of life. Through Jirrawun Arts, Rammey was exposed to artists such as Warhol, Miro and Skully, and the influence of post-modernism on timeless depictions of Country are the signature of much of his finest work.


The rare collection Warmun Arts and Aboriginal Contemporary bring to you in 'Rammey' were painted between 2008 and 2010 and show an artist deeply connected to Country producing an expressive, experimental body of work; someone at the height of his powers – gestural and gaudy.

Rammey is the last living elder from Warlawoon and these works are powerful depictions of his Country, the hills, gorges, waterholes boabs and station life. Beyond his cultural role as a painter, Rammey has also been an instrumental knowledge holder for song, dance and ceremony. It is a great privilege for our gallery to be able to bring you these extraordinary rare and important works.

Rammey Ramsey paints his ancestral country of Warlawoon located to the west of Bedford Downs near Elgee Cliffs in the remote East Kimberley region of Western Australia. Warlawoon is the country of Ramsey's mother and father, and his Gija name. Although he has not been there for many years, Warlawoon is the main subject of Ramsey's works, which depict both a personal and collective history, and a memory of place.

A senior Gija man, Ramsey lived at Warlawoon as a young boy and then worked for much of his life as a stockman on various Kimberley cattle stations, including Bedford Downs, Lansdowne Station and Bow River Station. Ramsey combined stock work with his collective knowledge of Gija lore and ceremony. He came to painting in his later years, but art was always an essential part of his life through ceremony.

There is a complex relationship between form and content in Ramsey's paintings, with country as the framework. Straddling abstraction and embedded figuration, these representations of the artist's treasured country of Warlawoon are intertwined with aspects of Ngarrangkarni (Dreaming) stories. Capturing knowledge of his country and its associated narratives, Ramsey paints only what he has rights to through birth and family, maintaining these representations of significant cultural histories for future generations.

Rammey Ramsey continues to live and paint in the community of Bow River, a 30-minute drive then left-turn at the stripey rock, after leaving the Warmun community heading towards Kununurra.
