This booklet contains a comprehension worksheet for each chapter in the book.

There are four kinds of questions requiring filling in the blank, listing, vocabulary definitions, and essay-type answers.

The student will need to be taught how to answer the essay-type questions with a complete sentence. For example, if the question says, "Why did Pa want to leave the little house in the Big Woods?" The answer should be, "Pa wanted to leave the little house because there were too many people in the Big Woods."

Sentences - Students need to learn to restate the question in their answers.

Mechanics - The answer must be a complete sentence starting with a <u>capital letter</u> and ending with an end mark.

Spelling - Every word in the answer must be <u>spelled accurately</u>. Most of the words that need to be spelled correctly will be on the worksheet or in the appropriate book.

Reading - The student is given a reading grade for having the correct comprehension answer.

English - The student is given an English grade. There are 4 possible points for each essay-type answer: 1) Restating the question in the answer, 2) making a complete sentence, 3) starting with a capital letter, and 4) ending with an end mark.

Spelling - The student is given a spelling grade by starting with a perfect score and deducting one or two points for each misspelled word.

An answer key is provided in the back of this booklet to assist with the grading process. The make-up of the sentence does not have to be exact, but the key elements need to be present for a correct answer.

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
