Winner Woven Cluster Chandelier by Pigeon Toe Ceramics

Pigeon Toe designer Lisa Jones brought her background in ceramics together with her new education in weaving for the Woven Cluster Chandelier. "Using ceramic as the 'frame' was my first experiment and I loved the result so much I developed an entire lighting collection around it," she says. The clay she uses comes from Tacoma and reeds are hand-dyed by Jones's weaving teacher, Carol Ross. (pigeontoeceramics.com)

Leather Drawer Pulls by Walnut Studiolo



Geoffrey and Valerie Franklin's Walnut Studiolo got its start making leather bicycle gear: handlebar grips, bags, straps, mud

flaps. With its new line of drawer pulls, Geoffrey reconnected with his architecture background. "We were originally contacted by an interior designer who wanted us to develop a series of leather drawer pulls," says Geoffrey. "We designed an idea board of about half a dozen ideas, and together we honed in on this design." Walnut sources vegetable-tanned leather (with none of the nasty chemicals) harvested as a by-product of the beef industry. (walnutstudiolo.com)

FROM OUR JUDGE: "It's not very often one gets excited over cabinet and drawer hardware. But when you grab ahold of Walnut's leather cabinet handles and drawer pulls, you don't want to let go. Their design blends beautifully with every aspect of décor."
