

or people involved in the world of rare books, whether collectors, readers, or booksellers, one of life's joys is having the opportunity to buy a good group of interesting books, which occurred a short time ago when I added this collection to the shelves of the Mysterious Bookshop.

The seller described it as a collection of books that served as the basis for films noir, mainly from the 1940s and 1950s, largely based on Kevin Johnson's magnificent books, *The Dark Page* and *The Dark Page II*—volumes so beautifully produced that I refer to them as biblioporn.

Both Kevin and the collector were wrong on a basic premise, conflating hard-boiled detective fiction with noir, which thematically are polar opposites though stylistically somewhat akin.

Some years ago, I edited a very large collection of dark stories titled *The Best American Noir of the Century* that included an introduction by James Ellroy, who understands noir better than most. In the foreword, I tried to define noir fiction, describing the works as "existential, pessimistic tales about people, including (or especially) protagonists who are seriously flawed and morally questionable. The tone is generally bleak and nihilistic, with characters whose greed, lust, jealousy, and alienation lead them into a downward spiral as their plans and schemes inevitably go awry."

Noir fiction has attracted some of the best writers over the past century, mostly in the United States but also a few in England and Continental Europe, and many of its aficionados are among the most sophisticated readers in the crime genre. Having said that, I am constantly baffled by the fact that a number of those readers don't seem to know what noir fiction is. When they begin to speak of their favorite titles in the category, they invariably include a

preponderance of books and short stories that are about as noir as strawberry ice cream.

Look, noir is about losers. The characters in these existential, nihilistic tales are doomed. They may not die, but they probably should, as the life that awaits them is certain to be so ugly, so lost and lonely, that they'd be better off just curling up and getting it over with. And, let's face it, they deserve it.

Pretty much everyone in a noir story is driven by greed, lust, jealousy or alienation, a path that inevitably sucks them into a downward spiral from which they cannot escape. It is their own lack of morality that blindly drives them to ruin. They couldn't find the exit from their personal highway to Hell if flashing neon lights pointed to a town named Hope.

Noir fiction has its roots in the hard-boiled private eye story that was essentially created by Dashiell Hammett in the pages of *Black Mask* magazine in the 1920s. There are tough guys in his stories, and lying dames, and violence, double-crosses, murder, and nefarious schemes.

But—and this is where the private detective story separates itself from noir—it also has a character with a moral center. Sam Spade knew that when somebody kills your partner, you're supposed to do something about it. Raymond Chandler, whose splendid prose illuminated his novels and stories, compared his private detective to a knight, someone who walked the mean streets but was not himself mean.

The private eye story is optimistic, even if the detective is not. A client needs help and believes that a generally shabby guy in a rundown office with a bottle of bourbon in his desk drawer will somehow find a way to solve the problem. Can you get more optimistic than that?

Furthermore, this rather cynical figure—underpaid, disrespected, threatened, shot at, beaten up—has a code of ethics that guarantees he'll do the best he can for his client, who's probably lying to him anyway. A heroic figure stands at the center of the private

eye novel; there are no heroic figures in noir fiction.

Not only are these two sub-categories of crime fiction not the same, they are philosophically diametrically opposed to each other. One is dependent on its hero maintaining the ethical high ground while most everyone with whom he interacts lies, cheats, steals and kills. The other features people who wallow in the sty that is their world. The machinations of their lust, whether for money or love (which, in noir fiction, is a four-letter word for sex), will cause them to be blinded to rudimentary decency as they become entangled in the web of their own doom.

Happy endings are not required in a private eye story, but the reader will generally have a sense of justice being done as the lone hero overcomes all the forces that have been arrayed against him. This is a uniquely American sensibility, deriving from the lone, stalwart sheriff cleaning up a town.

The noir story with a happy ending has never been written, nor can it be. The lost and corrupt souls who populate these tales were doomed before we met them because of their hollow hearts and deprayed sensibilities.

What, then, are we to make of the large number of private detective novels and stories that have served as the inspiration for noir films? Motion pictures are a different medium than books, and it is cinematic style that takes over and becomes the medium that noir demands.

The Germans inadvertently invented film noir with their devotion to Expressionism's motifs, and the French gave it the name by which we think we know it. But it's the Americans who created the lion's share of the fiction that found its roots in the despair and casual—or desperate—criminality of the lower classes during the Great Depression. It is this literary form that fed Hollywood the material that it masterfully turned into the films we came to love once we got old enough to understand that, yeah, I guess I'd do pretty much anything to get Lana Turner.

Noir novels and short stories tell good stories. All happy fam-

ilies, as Tolstoy wrote in his noir novel *Anna Karenina*, are alike, but—to adjust to the subject at hand—killers. schemers, and villains of all types are different and interesting, in a repugnant sort of way. And good stories make good films.

Like lifting a rock and finding ourselves unable to not watch the slimy, blind, ugly critters that scurry away from the light, noir is fascinating because of its repugnant characters, not in spite of them. For a while, our sympathies are with them, and we hope they succeed. We almost want the bad girl to change and fall in love with the poor slob who just murdered for her so they can live happily after. But there are no happy endings in noir fiction. We can take some comfort in our own moral superiority and breathe a sigh of relief that we are not them.

Here is a cornucopia of the books that inspired the films that created and popularized this classic genre. Some are famous and familiar, some are obscure. Some of the books are for collectors, some are for readers, though I like to think they're the same.

Other peculiar events occur, often violent, before the truth is revealed. Corners lightly bumped, trivial wear to spine tips, else fine in dust jacket, which has light wear to spine tips and corners, as well as light rubbing to spine ends. \$125.00

Complications inevitably arise when Nick picks up the sexy Cassy, broke and desperate for a job, and takes her to Los Angeles. About fine in dust jacket, which has a short, closed tear to back panel. An exceptionally fresh, bright copy. Very scarce. \$1,000.00

He flaunts his affair with Nicole Horner, a teacher at the school, but he also become physically violent with her and they decide to kill him. Their elaborate

plot takes a wrong turn when his body disappears. A very good, near-fine copy in the original wrappers, with a dust jacket that is rubbed along the front flap fold and trivial wear to spine tips and corners. \$250.00
