Payment Methods Accepted

Signed Books

If you want to have books from your own collection signed by authors at the Mysterious Bookshop, you may bring them in or send them to us. There is a \$5.00 handling charge for each book. The fee is waived for each new book by that author that you purchase. Thus, if you send four books to be signed and purchase the author's latest book, there will be a \$15.00 handling charge. We take excellent care of all books, but please understand that we are not responsible for books lost or damaged in transit or on premises. It is essential that you call before delivering books here. Some of the authors are unwilling to sign out of print books, some are on schedules too tight to permit it, etc.


Aside from *Black Mask*, the greatest magazine of all time devoted to hard-boiled mystery fiction was *Manhunt*, which had a short but solid run of 15 years (1952-1967). This generous collection of stories, 39 in all, was wonderfully selected by the editor and includes all the authors I was looking for (except Raymond Chandler and Ross Macdonald, who wrote for *Manhunt*). What I learned from the richly informative introduction is that the original plan was to call the new publication Mickey Spillane's Mystery Magazine (following in the footsteps of Ellery Queen's Mystery Magazine) since Spillane was the best-selling writer in American when it was being created, but Dutton, his publisher, objected. They didn't want Mickey wasting his time with short stories when his novels were selling in the millions. Manhunt then bought "Everybody's Watching Me," a novella, from him for \$25,000 (today's equivalent of \$237,000) and serialized it in four issues—prominently featuring Spillane's name on the cover. He was not the only big name to be fea-

tured. Evan Hunter later became better known under his Ed McBain pseudonym but he was a national best-seller as Hunter first, and he has two stories in this collection. David Goodis, John D. MacDonald, Craig Rice, Harlan Ellison, Fredric Brown, Donald E. Westlake, and Lawrence Block, who wrote an interesting autobiographical foreword, are just some of the giants of the genre who will be found in these pages. *Manhunt* rose above the other digest-size magazines of the day—or any day—for tough, realistic stories. What elevated its contributors above the crowd of writers at other magazines who were trying to earn a living at two cents a word was that their hard-boiled stories also had heart. If you can read Hunter's two contributions to this collection, for example, without being moved, then *you* have no heart. Trade paperback. \$21.95

Cavanaugh, Steve, Thirteen, Flatiron Books.

When a famous young actor is accused of murdering his wife of two months and his business manager after surprising them in a compromising position, it seems an open-and-shut case. But with a potential blockbuster film due for release, the studio is desperate to salvage the situation and gain an acquittal, which will enable the film to be released on schedule and make a boatload of money according to plan. But the prosecutor is a telegenic, polished performer with a perfect record of convictions. Then the head of the defense team hires Eddie Flynn specifically to see if the NYPD was up to any shenanigans during the investigation and arrest, if so, so much the better for the defense, if not, they throw Eddie under the bus and carry on. But then the lead attorney for the defense quits! Eddie Flynn is convinced that Bobby Solomon is innocent, and uncovers new




and interesting facts that seem to contradict the overwhelming preponderance of evidence against Bobby. Flynn has a small supporting cast, but he's pretty much on his own in the courtroom. Can he convince a jury of twelve men and women good and true of Bobby Solomon's innocence? More importantly, how can you come out on top in a murder trial when the killer isn't out on the loose--but on the jury? \$26.99.
