Sheep Fold Materials:

Pin Lover's Club Pin-Mini

Fabric:

Green print —

 $A - (4) 1\% \times 1\%$ "

B—(1) 2¾ x 2¾"

Back — $(1) 5 \times 5$ "

Gray print — C — (4) 15/8 x 23/4"

Batting — (2) 5½" x 5½" Wool Roving (for stuffing)

What does Sheep Fold mean?

This pincushion project is inspired by the traditional patchwork block known as the Sheep Fold block. It represents a fold (fenced area) that provides protection for a flock of sheep. The protected green-space in the middle of this block-inspired-pincushion is a perfect place for your special sheep pin to "graze"!

Sheep Fold Instructions:

- 1. Refer to the Sheep Fold patchwork block layout in Figure 1.
- 2. Sew the A,B, and C pieces together in three rows, following the layout. Press the seams toward the gray fabric.
- 3. Now sew the three rows together. Press the seams away from the middle of the block.
- 4. Press the block flat and trim to 5" square.
- 5. Now pin or fuse the block to the center of one of the 5½" squares of batting. (This is now the pincushion top)
- 6. Pin or fuse the 5" square of green "back" fabric to the center of the other 5½" square of batting. (This is now the pincushion bottom)
- 7. Quilt the pincushion top and bottom separately. I used straight-line and "along the seams" quilting on mine. When finished quilting, sew around the edges of each 5" square (1/8" from the edge). Then trim away the extra batting from both squares.
- 8. Pin the pincushion top to the pincushion bottom (right-sides-together) with the edges lined up.
- 9. Sew around the perimeter with a ¼" seam but leave a 2" opening to turn the pincushion right-side-out.
- 10. Trim the extra fabric and batting from the corners. Be careful not to cut the stitches you just sewed.
- 11. Turn the pincushion right-side-out through the opening. Poke out the corners and finger-press the side seams by reaching in to the inside of the pincushion through the opening.
- 12. Stuff the pincushion. Use a dull pencil to poke stuffing into the corners first. Then fill the rest of the pincushion.
- 13. Use a ladder stitch to sew the opening closed.
- 14. Add your Pin Lover's Club pins to your new pincushion and enjoy!!!
