

# TATE PATTERN

#### MATERIALS:

340 yards of Paintbox Yarns Simply Chunky (or an equivalent bulky weight yarn with 7 wpi)

L/8mm crochet hook Stitch marker

Tapestry needle

GAUGE: 4"x4" = 13 stitches x 14 rows in SC

KEY: Instructions are written in US terminology, and the UK equivalents are provided below for your reference

CH: Chain

SC: Single Crochet (UK: Double Crochet)
SC DEC: Single Crochet Decrease (UK: Double Crochet Decrease
HDC: Half Double Crochet (UK: Half Treble Crochet)
DC: Double Crochet (UK: Treble Crochet)
Bo: Bobble Stitch

sk: skip

st. Stip st: Stitch sts: Stitches BLO: Back Loop Only FLO: Front Loop Only YO: Yarn Over

#### measurements

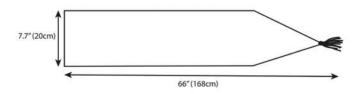
The Tate Scarf is one size only, and measures 66" x 7.7" (168cm x 20cm)

#### notes

In this pattern, we use the Bobble Stitch. During the Bobble Stitch sections (and any other sections that this may apply), the chain stitches across the row DO count as stitches - don't forget to include them in your row stitch count.

There are no increases in this pattern. During the Bo rows, you will see "3 HDC". This simply means to work three HDC sts before doing the bobble stitch. Do NOT place all three HDC in one stitch, we will not be increasing.

#### bobble stitch



YO, insert into st. [YO, pull back out of st. YO, pull through first two loops on hook (2 loops on hook). YO, insert into same st] Repeat [] until you have a total of six loops on your hook. YO, pull through all six loops. Note: It helps if you gently tug on your working strand to tighten the stitch a bit more. I've noticed that this helps keep the bobble shape in stead of potentially allowing the stitches within the stead of potentially allowing the stitches within the bobble to loosen and become more flat.

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#### pattern

CH 26
Row 1. Starting in 2nd CH from hook, SC in first st. [CH 1, sk 1, SC] Repeat [] across. (25 sts)
Row 2. CH 1, turn. SC in first st. [SC in CH-1 sp, CH 1, sk 1] Repeat [] across. SC in last st. (25 sts)
Row 3. CH 1, turn. SC in first st. [CH 1, sk 1, SC in CH-1 sp] Repeat [] across. (25 sts)
Row 4-16. Repeat Rows 2 & 3 a further 7 times.
Row 17. Repeat Row 2, one more time.
Row 18. CH 1, turn. SC in first st. [SC in CH-1 sp, SC in next st] Repeat [] across. (25 sts)
Row 19. CH1, turn. SC in each st across. (25 sts)

You will now work your first Bobble Row:
Row 20. CH 1, turn. HDC in first two sts. [Bo, 3 HDC] Repeat [] across. (25 sts)
Row 21. CH 1, turn. SC in each st across. (25 sts)
Row 22. CH 1, turn. DC in first st. [Ch 1, sk 1, DC]
Repeat [] across. (25 sts)
Row 23-51. Repeat Row 22 a further twenty-nine times.
Row 52. CH 1, turn. HDC in first st. [HDC in CH-1 sp, HDC in next st] Repeat [] across. (25 sts)
Row 53. CH 1, turn. HDC in FLO across. (25 sts)
Row 54. CH 1, turn. HDC in BLO across. (25 sts)
Row 55-60. Repeat Rows 53 & 54 a further 3 times.
Row 61-80. Repeat Row 22, a further 20 times.
Row 81. CH 1, turn. DC in first st. [CH 1, sk 1, DC]
Repeat [] across. (25 sts)

You will now work your second Bobble Row: Row 82-83, Repeat Rows 20 & 21, one more time. Row 84-95. Repeat Row 22, a further 12 times. Row 96. Ch 1, turn. SC in first st. [SC in CH-1 sp, SC] Repeat [] across. (25 sts) Row 97. Ch 1, turn. SC in first st, [CH 1, sk 1, SC in next st] Repeat [] across. (25 sts) Row 98. CH 1, turn. SC in first st, SC in CH-1 sp, [CH 1, sk 1, SC in CH-1 sp] Repeat [] across. SC in last st. (25 sts) Row 99-100. Repeat Rows 97 & 98, one more time.

### pattern continued

You will now start decreasing, to shape the point of your scarf: Row 101. CH 1, turn. SC DEC, SC in CH-1 sp. [CH 1, sk 1, SC in CH-1 sp] Repeat [] across. SC DEC. (23 sts) Row 102. CH 1, turn. SC in first st. [CH 1, sk 1, SC in CH-1 sp] Repeat [] across. SC in last st. (23 sts) Row 103. CH 1, turn. SC in first st, SC in CH-1 sp, [CH 1, sk 1, SC in CH-1 sp] Repeat [] across. SC in last st. (23 sts) Row 104-133. Repeat Rows 101-103, a further 10 times, until you have 3 sts remaining. (3 sts)

You will now finish off the point of your scarf: CH 1, turn. YO, insert into first st. YO, pull back through st (three loops on hook). YO, insert into next st, YO, pull back through st (five loops on hook). YO, insert into last st, YO, pull back through st (seven loops on hook). YO, pull through all seven loops. Finish off, weave in ends.

#### tassel

You will now make a tassel for your scarf: Cut 10 strands of yarn, 12" long (you may cut more strads for a more "full" tassel), Using one of those strands, tie a knot in the middle of all of the strands to hold them all together. Weave one end of tying strand through the last st of triangle side. Using other end of tying strand, tie a knot. Let strands lay with others, do NOT trim excess.
