The kids also learned some Swedish songs, and listened to Swedish stories and folklore.

On Tuesday we headed over to the Midway Village Museum to tour the new "Many Faces/One Community" Exhibit featuring storefronts and rooms replicating immigrant communities in Rockford at a Swedish parlor and furniture company. The tour also included the story of Bert Hassell and the restored plane that he flew in an attempted flight from Rockford to Stockholm in 1928.

Each afternoon we went outside to the backyard and relaxed on the lawn for a Swedish lesson with Mr. & Mrs. Gredenius. Bertie Holmgren came one day with his guitar to sing and share memories of his time at home in Sweden when he was a young lad. Our SHS president Michael Lunde even stopped by to teach us how to play Kubb. On our final day we enjoyed a scavenger hunt and Fika with parents and friends. KUBB WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP

LIDKÖPING STUDENT & TEACHER EXCHANGE:

Swedish Nurse Students and Teachers from the City of Lidköping were in Rockford for close to three weeks as part of an international health care nurse program. The group has a program at SwedishAmerican Hospital and also spent time in the class room at Rock Valley College and Rockford University. Other plans include visits to Crusader Clinic, the Resource and Intervention Center as well as a tourist visit to the Erlander Home. The program was funded by the SwedishAmerican Foundation and the City of Lidköping. The group was in Rockford March 27 to April 12.



PEACE POLES:

The Rockford Peace Coalition Commission has been working actively for several years to promote peace in Rockford. A key event has been the International Day of Peace in September at the Puri-Keeling Peace Plaza. Over 1,000 students gather to partake in activities including learning about Borgholm, Rockford's Swedish Sister City, in the Sister City Tent.

The Swedish Historical Society's Board has chosen to "plant" a peace pole in their gardens. This pole has the message "May Peace Prevail on Earth" in four languages, including: English, Swedish, Norwegian and Danish.

TRIP TO BORGHOLM:

On August 13th, Damaris and Dave Sutton and daughters, Britt, Shannon, and Kirsten, traveled to Sweden visiting Damaris' relatives. While there, they visited Borgholm with cousins, Mats and Urban Gustafsson



and families, meeting Borgholm's Mayor Lisbeth Lennartsson.



They also saw the tree donated by Rockford to Borgholm's City Square in July 2011, and later visited Borgholm Castle and Solliden's Palace Garden.

JACOB'S WELL ("BRUNN"):

In the collection at the Erlander Home Museum is a key. This key opened the well located at the northeast corner of 7th Street & 6th Avenue and it was used by Swedish families in that neighborhood from 1860-1870 to obtain good drinking water for 25¢ per month. 'Jacob's well, was for many years the only water supply in the 7th Street district. The well was located on property owned by Gustav Floberg, who came to Rockford in 1866. He started the well that year with assistant Johannes Stensrom, who came to Rockford in 1862 and settled on the northwest corner of 7th Street and 6th Avenue. Others who helped were Stenstrom's neighbor to the north, Sven Flygare and Lewis P. Anderson who became one of the owners of the well.

The name of 'Jakob's Brunn' as a well was given when Gustave Floberg sold the property to the Jacobson family in 1871. Mrs. C.J. Lundberg, Evans and Julian Jacobson are grandchildren of the Jakobsons, after whom the well was named. Mrs. Henry W. Doebereiner, daughter of Lewis P. Anderson, who lives at 7th Street and 6th Avenue, still has one of the original keys used for the well.

In 1948, East High School Swedish classes presented a skit based on the well. By this time, the key had been presented to the Swedish Historical Society by the Henry Doebereiners, who continued to own the land. In May of 1948, the Burpee Art Museum mounted an exhibit of Swedish Arts and Crafts which was part of a series of programs to celebrate the centennial of Swedes in America.

Now, in 2014, we celebrate over 375 years of Swedish influence in America and 75 years of the Swedish Historical Society. It is fitting that we recognize donors and sponsors of our organization for their vision to keep history alive for future generations. Presently, we can grow further by working globally with Sweden to improve our local economy.

BERGSTROM:

Our founding industries were started by Swedish, German, Italian, and Irish immigrants. They have had a substantial impact on Rockford's economic success and the country's history. Some companies have remained for 50 years or more, but it is not the norm for many companies to continue into their sixtieth year, much less their sixty-fifth.

Bergstrom Manufacturing has been celebrating this milestone, their 'Sapphire' anniversary in 2014 with world-wide presentations and tributes. June 27th, here in Rockford, was the local celebration with an event at the BMO Harris Bank Center for over 1000 attendance. The Rockford in Symphony Orchestra, Kantorei Boys Choir, Mendelssohn Chorale, and Rockford Dance Company all performed onstage during a catered meal. Special video presentations were created to rally patriotism to our country (This is America), loyalty to our city's history (This is Rockford), and an informational reflection on Bergstrom Manufacturing (This is Bergstrom).
