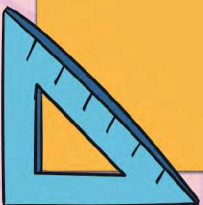

Print out the template. Cut out shapes.

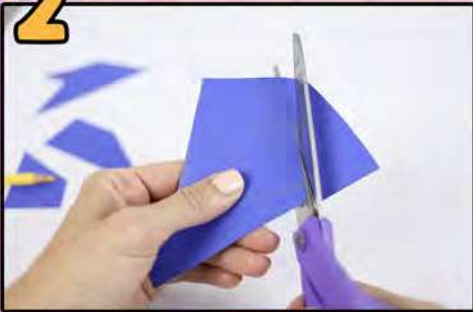

Geometric dissection puzzles can come in all shapes and sizes. The most popular dissection puzzle, the Tangram, was invented in China about 1,000 years ago. It involved arranging seven flat polygons into different shapes. Try making your own geometric dissection puzzle by cutting up a square, triangle, or circle into various pieces.

Can you imagine a world without video games? They weren't invented until 1952, when a British professor named A.S. Douglas created a version of tic-tac-toe called OXO. Since then, games have become way more advanced from multiplayer video game systems that could be played on TVs to the virtual reality games and headsets that are gaining popularity today. 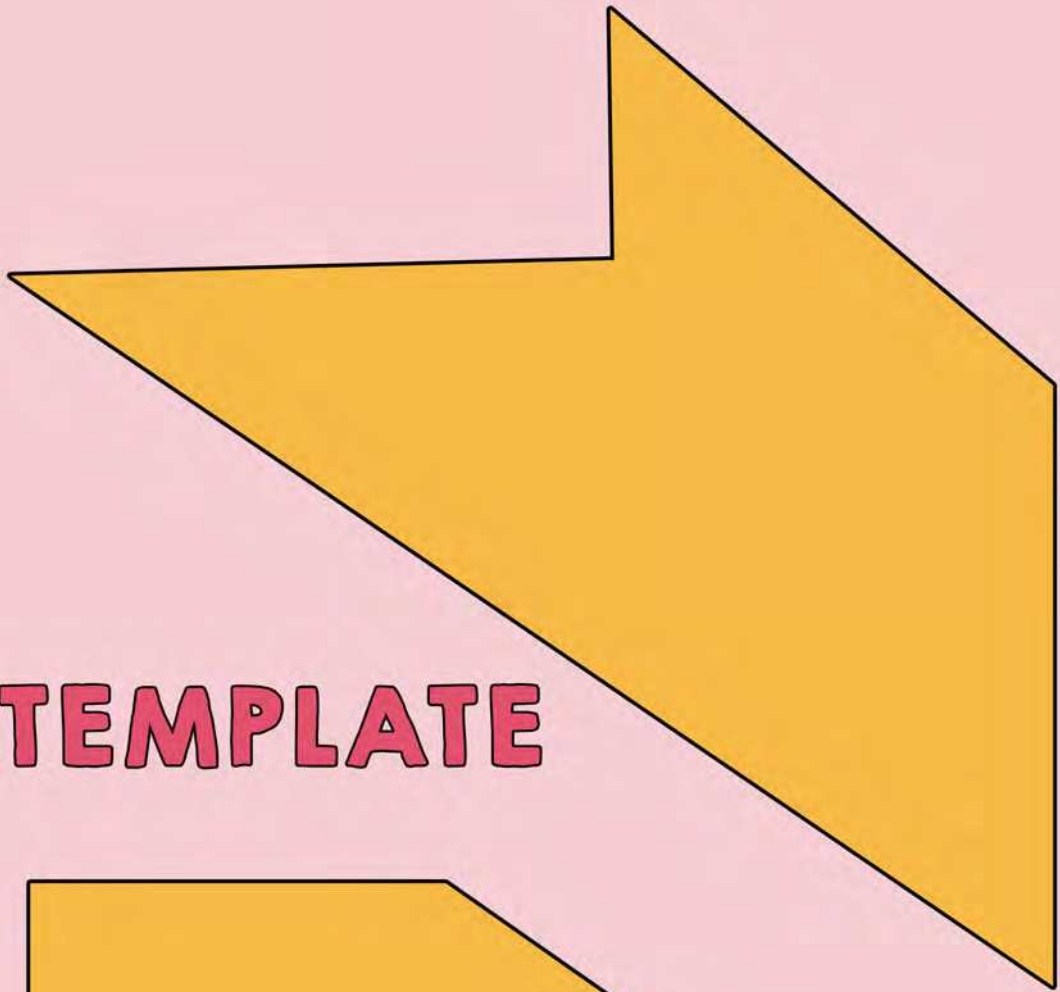
FUN FACT!
