

Sometimes we can lose sight of the remarkable nature of Jesus Christ. The teachings. The miracles. The presence. The writer of the Gospel of Mark reminds us of the beauty of Christ in a concise, thoughtful book. The smallest of the four Gospels, Mark doesn't waste time or words as he jettisons readers through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. More than anything, Mark wants the life of Christ to become our life.

Remarkable provides a 40-day journey into the Gospel of Mark. Each day is coupled with a devotional entry and reflection questions. Through the upcoming pages, you'll discover a better way to live through Jesus Christ.

Grab a handful of colored pencils, markers, or crayons to slow down as you read Scripture. Take time to circle the verbs, underline the names, and consider the details of the text as you doodle and reflect. Gather around the table. Invite a friend, your kids, or your grandkids to join.

My prayer is that during this time you'll awaken to Jesus and the wonder of Scripture, and you'll live out your faith in a more radiant and remarkable way.

Together, let's learn to know the Remarkable One.

THE COLOR METHOD

Creativity splashes in my readings of Scripture. I'm learning to let my inner doodler dance and play. I scribble like a 4-year-old, but the swirls and colors provide time for the words and the phrases to sink deeper into my soul.

Coloring slows our pace.

Coloring highlights the patterns, repeated words, and holy emphasis. Coloring invites us beyond reading the Scripture and invites the Scripture to read us.

Most days' readings in *Remarkable* take a handful of minutes. Adding the Color Method will double or triple your study time as you read through each portion of Scripture several times. The depth, the richness, the discoveries make this extra effort worth every moment.

Here is what I do with the different colors:

Circle verbs in **red** to highlight the activity of God and people.

Circle places in **brown** to note location.

Circle names in **purple** to identify people.

Mark numbers in **orange** to identify numerals and quantities.

Mark the Holy Spirit, angels, and the prophetic in **blue** to identify God's presence and handiwork.


Scribble observations in your favorite colors to record insights.

Bonus Challenge: The Gospel of Mark uses the word "euthus" over 40 times. "Euthus" translates as immediately, directly, straightway, at once, shortly, or forthwith. Star each occurance of one of these translations in **yellow**. Why do you think Mark uses this word so often?

Following the Scripture reading, you'll find a devotion that zeroes in on one concept from the passage. I wrote these to spur your thoughts and hearts Christward. Each day's reading closes with reflection questions designed for personal or small group use.

As you finish studying each day, consider how you can respond in an active way. You may be nudged to prayer, repentance, a generous act, or a kind word. Ask God how you can be both a hearer and a doer of the day's reading.

WHERE FREEDOM AWAITS Day 1 - Mark 1:1-13 NIV



- "I will send my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way"—³ "a voice of one calling in the wilderness, 'Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for him.'"
- ⁴ And so John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness, preaching a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. ⁵ The whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem went out to him. Confessing their sins, they were baptized by him in the Jordan River.
- ⁶ John wore clothing made of camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. ⁷ And this was his message: "After me comes the one more powerful than I, the straps of whose sandals I am not worthy to stoop down and untie. ⁸ I baptize you with water, but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."
- ⁹ At that time Jesus came from Nazareth in Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. ¹⁰ Just as Jesus was coming up out of the water, he saw heaven being torn open and the Spirit descending on him like a dove. ¹¹ And a voice came from heaven: "You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased."
- ¹² At once the Spirit sent him out into the wilderness, ¹³ and he was in the wilderness forty days, being tempted by Satan. He was with the wild animals, and angels attended him.

John the Immerser appears weathered. Sunburned crow's feet march around his eyes double time. Despite the ache in his back and pangs in his stomach, neither his voice nor his message waivers: Repent.

Wealthy men don wool and ornate belts. John's dress includes scratchy camel hair and a leather belt. He's enrobed in the clothes of the poor. John awaits to immerse any man, woman, or child willing to confess their failings to follow the law—the Torah—and live upright before God.


For John, only the Remarkable One is above reproach and has no reason for baptism. But Jesus insists, and all heaven tosses a party that day.

The Spirit nudges Jesus into the wilderness to face great temptation. That's a fast change from heaven to hell. Cool waters and descending doves are replaced with heat and hunger.

Jesus triumphs over temptation so we can too.

This grueling triathlon of temptation becomes the launching pad for Jesus' ministry. He did what we could not. And do you know the first message Jesus preached? Repent.

John set Jesus up well. And Jesus set us up well by teaching us that there's no temptation we will face that Christ has not overcome. That's really good news.

WHEN GOD INTERRUPTS YOUR DAY Day 2 - Mark 1:14-28 NKJV

¹⁴ Now after John was put in prison, Jesus came to Galilee, preaching the gospel of the kingdom of God, ¹⁵ and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the gospel."

- ¹⁶ And as He walked by the Sea of Galilee, He saw Simon and Andrew his brother casting a net into the sea; for they were fishermen. ¹⁷ Then Jesus said to them, "Follow Me, and I will make you become fishers of men."
- ¹⁸ They immediately left their nets and followed Him. ¹⁹ When He had gone a little farther from there, He saw James the son of Zebedee, and John his brother, who also were in the boat mending their nets. ²⁰ And immediately He called them, and they left their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired servants, and went after Him.
- ²¹ Then they went into Capernaum, and immediately on the Sabbath He entered the synagogue and taught. ²² And they were astonished at His teaching, for He taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes.
- ²³ Now there was a man in their synagogue with an unclean spirit. And he cried out, ²⁴ saying, "Let us alone! What have we to do with You, Jesus of Nazareth? Did You come to destroy us? I know who You are—the Holy One of God!"
- ²⁵ But Jesus rebuked him, saying, "Be quiet, and come out of him!" ²⁶ And when the unclean spirit had convulsed him and cried out with a loud voice, he came out of him. ²⁷ Then they were all amazed, so that they questioned among themselves, saying, "What is this? What new doctrine is this? For with authority He commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey Him." ²⁸ And immediately His fame spread throughout all the region around Galilee.

Simon and Andrew focus on casting their nets when Jesus interrupts, "Follow Me, and I will make you become fishers of men." In essence, Jesus says, "What you're doing is good, but I've got something remarkably better." With those words, *BAM*, two disciples begin following Jesus.

James and John focus on mending their nets when Jesus interrupts. Jesus calls them and, *BAM*, they follow Jesus, too.

Then, a tormented man appears in the synagogue. Jesus interrupts again by banishing the unclean spirit. Though these men are focused in different directions—casting, mending, being tormented—Jesus meets each one, interrupts their lives, and ushers them into greater purpose and freedom.

Unexpected interruptions are God's remarkable invitations.

No matter your focus of the day—in work or life—look for Jesus' interruption. They represent opportunities for God to display remarkable love and power in your life.
