

The Garden Of Weedin' ...Life Began In A Garden


"In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth." (Genesis 1:1)

Through The Garden Gate

"Weed 'em and Reap!"

Follow these tips and add your own creative touches to make your Spring event a unique banquet that will be remembered for years. Manage basic arrangements and then have fun developing the delightful garden theme.


A Garden Banquet

A banquet is a party with food as the main attraction. Add a short program, a speaker or entertainment. The occasion is enjoyable, comfortable and social. The most popular traditional spring banquet is the Mother and Daughter Banquet. There are other occasions when banquets are enjoyable. Ladies evenings, Women's program, Holiday gatherings, Annual Retreats, summer picnics and even father and child banquets.

A Garden Party

A party is a fun and games event where people mix for sparkling conversation, good food and laughter. Parties tend to be informal and hosts do not go to extra trouble to decorate. While party games were once wildly popular, there are groups who do not enjoy a lot of organized activity. It should be a highly enjoyable experience. The activities should fit the needs of the guests.

Sometimes parties do not have to be planned at all. A larger party requires good planning to handle the program, publicity, decorating, welcoming, refreshments and clean up. Delicious refreshments are offered and you know you have a great party if you had a chance to create your own fun and remember the event fondly.





Pay Attention To Details

Often it is the smallest detail that makes the biggest impression. Wild flowers on a table, small table gifts for each guest, background music, greeters at the door and other thoughtful gestures make individuals feel welcome, special and pampered.

Practice Christian Hospitality

In the middle of a fun activity, people should be growing in their understanding of the Lord. Everyone should be giving affection and receiving love from other Christians in the family of God. Begin friendly conversations, avoid gossip or mean spirited comments.

Set Realistic Goals

What do you want to see happen during the two hours your guests are with you? Be specific! Plans in this workbook are complete. However, you may have more fun if you change our details to fit your needs. Add creative ideas and change any activities as desired.

Work With A "Landscaping" Team

Choose a small leadership team to complete advance arrangements. The team may be as few as three or as large as ten or more. Divide tasks between team members and trust them to finish their tasks. While the leadership may be divided, one person should be in charge to keep the whole affair moving smoothly.



Organize

Follow our suggestions adding your own creativity at the beginning of the planning process. Write down exactly what will happen and when the jobs must be completed. Do not leave organization to the last minute.

Purchase Supplies As Needed

Decide what the banquet budget is and stay within the limit. Keep expense records. Use the church tax exemption number.

Practice A Positive Approach

Maintain a light and happy atmosphere during the planning process. If your attitude is right the rest of your team will catch the spirit. After all, this is a party! W MKUUKA

Pray for the event, the team and the guests. Pray as a team. Take each detail before the Lord and then-Relax!

Set Up

Provide adequate time to set up tables, decorations, props, food and other items necessary for the event. Reserve the church for the entire day and there may be situations when room arrangements must take place a day before the party.

Say Thank You

The behind-the-scenes team is the core of this event. Take time to write thank you notes, call and give small thank you gifts. Recognize your team publically at the banquet.

Clean Up

When the event is over, clean up begins. The party is not complete until the church is in order. Encourage the team to remove their props immediately. Stay to help with kitchen clean up.

Speaking Of...

A Delightful Speaker

"A dedicated gardener, dwells within."

Invite A Speaker

By all means invite a special guest to share inspirational thoughts. When scheduling a speaker, consider reducing program segments we provide that are best performed by the guests themselves. The speaker should conclude the evening festivities.

NOT FOR USE

The Perfect Person

A good speaker makes a faith connection with the specific group. Choose the speaker from a list of possibilities suggested by friends, relatives, pastor, other churches, community groups or national organizations.



Consider The Cost

Ask the speaker if she has a set fee. If not, give a generous monetary gift including traveling costs. Think about the time they invest in preparation, travel and presentation.

Specific Instructions

Send a letter, make a telephone call and stay in contact through the internet. Include information like highway directions, arrival time and place, group size, time limit, lodging information and other personal details.

Tell the speaker the type of program and details of what you would like their speech to include. Continue to make contact periodically until the speaker leaves home to travel to the event.

Care And Feeding

Be aware that it is disquieting for a speaker to enter a room of strangers, be expected to speak about personal and spiritual issues and leave still feeling as if everyone is a stranger.

Assign a pre-arranged hostess "friend" to handle introductions, sit and converse with the guest at dinner to give the speaker a sense of belonging.

The banquet budget should include payment of all expenses from the time the speaker leaves home until she returns. If more meals are required, host or pay accordingly.

After The Banquet

Pay promptly. Stay with the speaker until they leave to return to their home. Thank that person from your heart and always follow up with a handwritten thank you note!



Tell Everyone...

Publicize!

"Weeds! -All you can pick for free!"

Because you make the effort of preparing a lovely event, filled with fun, fellowship and fantastic food, go the extra mile to publicize. Let's face it, you need enthusiastic guests so do your best to convince them it will be a unique experience in fine dining and entertainment.

It's All About The Details

Invitations, posters, registration forms, programs, handouts and centerpieces should all relate to your theme. Use the same colors, scripture, picture or logo on every piece of publicity.

Invite Every Gal!

Send invitations. If a community wide event is desired, place posters in local restaurants, businesses, offices. Insert invitations in the weekly worship folder and in the monthly newsletter.

Don't forget...one of the best places to put posters is in the Ladies Room at church and in community businesses. If a local business hesitates to put another poster in their window, suggest their ladies' room as a great "out of the way" place!



Create Buzz!

Involve lots of people in the planning stages. They don't have to be on the team but delegate tasks or small parts. Ask as many people as possible to participate in the formal program. No memorization! They read their part. The benefit? Everyone who is involved will attend and will be more likely to talk about the event and invite others. Many hands make light work. Cut stress with more help.

There's Even More Fun!

Let guests know prizes will be awarded for various games. Enjoy the company of friends.

Be Creative!

If the banquet is around a holiday like Mother's Day, advertise the event to men of the church that this is a great Mother's Day gift they can give their wives and mothers. Find creative ways to make your banquet a "gift" to the women who attend.

Decorating...



In The Garden

"Plant kindness, gather love."

Create a simple garden. When guests enter the party area, they should immediately see and feel the theme. Discuss decoration at the beginning of the planning process. Follow our suggestions or invent your own "Garden Of Weedin'".

Our tips are meant to spark your own creativity. Read and follow directions but use items that are available locally. Not every decoration listed must be used.

PLEASE PURChoose the best and leave the rest!

How Complicated Is This Going To Be?

This event can be as simple or involved as desired. If there are folks in your church who love to decorate, give them the responsibility to turn the room into a work of art. If no one comes forward, decorate simply at each table.

What Should Be Decorated?

Decorate tables with centerpieces and theme related items. Consider decorating the ticket table, entry door, stage area and four walls of the large room.

Tasteful Elegance

Remember that less is more. Do not clutter any area with an overabundance of garden decor. Choose a few lovely pieces to make the room come to life. It is generally better to choose one suggestion rather than try to have all of these ideas on different tables-too confusing! So, pick one idea that works for your group and your budget.

Tables

- 1. Green On Green: This monotone color is just the thing to create a simple yet elegant garden feel throughout the entire room. Pale green table covers, clear glass hurricane lantern with green or white candle, crystal or clear glass accessories.
-Green Ivy swag draped around the centerpiece
-Green grass grown in terra cotta pots and clipped to look like mowed grass, tie a green print ribbon around the pot
-Dark green napkins tied around middle with matching ribbons, sprig of green ivy tucked in ribbon
-white dishes, clear glassware
- 2. Pastel Flower Garden: Choose pale colors for silk flowers. Mix the pastel colors so each table has every color. Pastel table coverings, flower basket centerpieces. Choose live green leaf plants and tuck pastel silk flowers into the dirt. Gerber Daisies are perfect for this arrangement. They are colorful and come in a variety of sizes.
- ...tea light candles at each place setting in small glass cups. Choose one pastel tea light color per table.
- ...white napkins tied with twine, pastel silk flower tucked in twine



- ...white dishes, clear glassware
- ...pastel colored pebbles scattered on the table.
- 3. Honeybee Garden: Choose bright yellow table coverings for all tables. Add potted yellow and orange flowers as centerpieces.
- ...The internet has lots of small bees for sale from a variety of companies. Check it out and scatter little bees on the table.
- ...Bright orange napkins or white napkins with black ribbon tied to each
- ...small jars or pots of honey with tiny spoons in the honey pots
- 4. Butterfly Garden: Choose pale blue and lavender table coverings. Add large, multi-colored flower arrangements as centerpieces.
- ...buy decorative butterflies at www.orientaltrading.com and tuck them all over the table. Lots of butterflies look terrific. Spray glitter them for that extra sparkle.

- ...white napkins with one large butterfly tied to a ribbon
- ...green leaves sprinkled on the table.
- ...one large helium balloon butterfly flying from the flower arrangements.
- 5. Gardener's Glory: Choose beige table coverings to resemble a potter's shed. Place one square of newspaper in the center of the table. One large terra cotta pot, tipped over with potter's soil coming from it is the centerpiece. Add gardener's tools and a straw hat.
- ...place tiny plastic starter plant containers with tiny plants on the table ...tableware should be tucked inside one inexpensive gardener's glove. Tuck the napkin in the glove behind the knife, fork and spoon. Tie the glove with rough twine or rope.
- ...make place mats from newspaper so it looks like a work area.
- 6, Rose Garden: Choose white table coverings and your choice of



rose colors. Red roses look beautiful but there are many lovely shades. Tip: It's much less expensive to purchase silk roses than to try to purchase live bouquets!

- ...Add accessories in the same shade of rose. Napkins, ribbon and other items should match the roses
- ... Make this decor about roses and candlelight and crystal
- **7. Garden Of Weedin':** Fill the table with wild flowers and weeds. Dandelions, Creeping Charlie and other lovely weeds or blooming flowers look wonderful.
- ...The centerpiece should be a vase, watering can or basket filled with a variety of leafy greens and wild flowers or weeds. Thin, leafy tree branches add bulk and look terrific.
- ...Add a hand weed hoe and garden gloves
- ...Napkins with brightly colored flowers tied with ribbon, tuck a leafy twig in each napkin
- ...Long before the banquet, plant tiny pots with grass seed. Let the grass grow and tuck one small yellow silk flower in each pot around the table. Tie a yellow ribbon around each small pot.
- **8. Build Your Own Miniature Garden:** Provide a garden container, small plants, sand or soil, ceramic garden decor, rocks, hand tool or spoon and other miniature garden items as available. Allow the guests to build their own miniature garden which becomes their lovely centerpiece. If desired, the centerpieces can be given as gifts at the end of the evening. This is a great ice breaker at each table!

There are many dazzling and fun options. Choose one that you know will delight your group. Stay within the same color family for a more pulled together appearance.

Serving Tables

If the dinner is a buffet, place items in the same colors on the serving tables. Scatter items along the length of the table. Flowers, ribbon, ceramic pieces, etc. follow through the Garden theme.

Table Gifts

It's always thoughtful to offer table favors. Choose something small to place at each place setting. Tiny white ceramic birds, candles, silver charms, candy, tiny flowering plants, chocolate rose shaped lollipops tied with ribbon or other items that match the theme.

More gift ideas: wooden paint sticks painted for garden stakes, small flower pot with live/silk plant and ribbon tied around pot, garden gloves tied with colorful ribbon and a seed packet, small terra cotta pots with candy and wrapped in netting with ribbon.

Garden Arbor -- Garden Gate

Set up a lovely garden gate at the entrance of the area. Trim an inexpensive metal arbor with lights, flowers and netting. Set a picket fence garden gate near the entrance so guests must walk through the gate.

Check out rental stores and garages of friends!

Stage Presentation

Feature a collection of garden items on the stage or at one end of the room. If the banquet area does not have a focal spot, scatter lovely items here and there along the walls or in corners.

Make a Topiary: Two styro foam balls of different sizes. Put them through a dowel rod to hold them together and stick in a pot of dirt. Cover with Spanish moss or ivy greens and place on stage, on tables or in the room.

GARDEN LIGHTING: Scatter twinkle lights along the floor and cover with fabric (sheets) to unify the look. Place floor lighting behind large objects and dim lights in the room or stage area.

Background Music

Play music as guests enter and throughout dinner. Take into consideration the fact that conversations will be taking place. CD/Cassette volume should be carefully controlled. Play music at the

end of the evening as guests are gathering their belongings.

Consider music from a specific time period. The big bands of the 1940's still offer beautiful sounds with an upbeat temp. Find a few favorites at www.amazon.com To find cool sounds like Artie Shaw, Frank Sinatra, smooth jazz, Christian jazz and even lovely classical pieces....Ahhh, Bach!

Live music is always appropriate. Ask a pianist, organist, harpist, small jazz group, classical string quartet, college or high school musicians to participate. A guitarist sitting in the garden scene strumming quiet Christian songs makes quite an impression! Be prepared to feed the guests and offer a small honorarium.

Art Supplies, Decorations, Small Gifts

Check out craft shops, party stores, discount stores and rummage shops. Make table decorations, programs and table gifts. Check the internet for affordable items.

Door Prizes: Ask if business and restaurants are willing to donate gifts or gift cards. Buy small items like picture frames, note holders, lamps, make up bags, pill organizers, tea cups, key chains, potted plants, candles, stuffed animals and costume jewelry.

Find inexpensive items that appeal to the feminine eye. Gifts are not necessary but often make the event special for those who attend.

If children are present, include charming toy gifts. Stuffed animals, coloring books, jewelry and books are great choices.

Down The Garden Path!

"Bless My Bloomers!"

Consider crowd psychology. No one enjoys going to a party where everyone remains a stranger, little conversation occurs and a subdued mood becomes awkward. Everyone enjoys an event where people are talking and laughing, light and temperature are controlled, music sets the mood, strangers are just new friends and tables are inviting.

When The First Person Arrives, The Party Has Started

Greet guests cordially, give them a name tag and direct them to the party area. If special items are on display, encourage guests to travel from spot to spot as the crowd gathers. They may take a look at table decorations. Help them choose a seat or find their assigned table and specific seat. Point out rest rooms and conveniences within the building. Keep guests out of the kitchen!!!

Get Acquainted

Put people at ease with smiles and hospitality. Help them get acquainted with simple table activities. Place conversation starters under each plate. Scatter pens or pencils at each table and place paper puzzles or short games in obvious places so guests can work together to win a table prize.

Getting Together

Help the guests "sense the whole". Enthusiastic group singing encourages togetherness. Play a few table games as ice breakers.



Small Groups

Place guests in small groups and offer opportunities to make more intimate contact with others. Devise an activity that could be done in pairs or fours. Dividing by birth months is an effective way of creating smaller groups across all lines: age, race, sex.

Alternate the Pace

Some activities might be interactive and some quiet. Have some activities requiring a mental challenge with pencil and paper, group skits and sometimes activities for the whole group.

Build Toward A Conclusion

Complete a few exciting activities just before dinner and continue the fun after the meal. REVIEW PROGRAM ONLY


Close With A Whole Group Activity




Clean Up

Leave the church cleaner than you found it. Often those enjoying the fun are asked to help clean up. That can be fun and don't forget "many hands make light work".

Tip: Keep the music playing through clean up. Take a moment to sing and dance with other workers!

Welcome Garden Of Weedin' guests in an area where they are warmly welcomed and treat to delicious chilled punch. (Make our recipe or serve your personal favorite beverage) while coats are removed and table seating is confirmed.

Make this a delightful garden treat by serving a delicious cold beverage in crystal punch bowls with crystal cups. Consider serving small appetizers in small baskets rimmed with silk flowers. Add color coordinated beverage napkins.

Cover the punch table with a white table cloth. Scatter silk flower heads and green leaves along the table. Light a few pillar candles wrapped in twine and tied in a bow.

Play soft background music as guests begin arriving one half hour before the banquet begins. Encourage them to enter the hall where they roam from table to table and enjoy the garden table decorations and staged display.

Green Grows My Garden Punch

2 Cans Ecto Cooler Hi-C (Green)

1 large bottle of 7-Up

Generous scoops of Vanilla Ice Cream or Lime Sherbet


Maraschino Cherries

Pour Hi-C into punch bowl, scoop vanilla ice cream on top of punch. Add 7-Up and watch the punch foam. Sprinkle cherries on top of the ice cream. They will eventually sink but look lovely in a fresh bowl of punch. Serve with punch bowl ladle.

Garden Gate Menu!

"Bless the flowers, the weeds, my birds and my bees."



Plan accordingly! Use the Garden theme!

Plan the menu and assign a kitchen team to prepare the meal. Since this is a special event for the gals, it doesn't seem fair to ask them to cook their own party food. Ask the men of the church to cook and serve or consider local caterers! Ask a local Boy Scout troop. They often look for community service projects.

Want to have some fun? Ask the servers to serve cold beverages from watering cans. It will certainly spark conversation! And...freeze plastic bugs in ice cubes! What's a garden without a bug! More fun...award one prize to the gal who's ice cube contains a special bug or flower.

Since this is a Garden party, consider serving foods that come from a garden. Fresh fruit and vegetables make wonderful complements to the full meal. Serve a homemade soup and fresh salad bar!

(While Guests Mingle) Carrot and Celery Sticks, Cherry Tomatoes With Dip Stuffed Mushrooms (sausage) Eggplant with melted cheese **Cucumber Sandwiches**



Salads

Garden Salad with Ranch and Raspberry Vinaigrette
Fresh Tossed Caesar Salad with Herb Croutons
Spinach Salad/grated eggs,
sliced mushrooms, warm bacon dressing

DANDELION GREEN SALAD

4 slices bacon, cut in small pieces
@ 2 C. Chopped new Dandelion leaves
2 hard boiled eggs, sliced or chopped
1/4 C. Butter 2 T. Chopped onion ½ C cream or milk
1 egg, beaten ½ t. salt Dash of pepper
1/4 C. Cider Vinegar 2 T. Sugar 1 T. Flour

Toss together: chopped dandelion, chopped onion and fried bacon pieces. Set aside.

In Skillet: warm butter and cream until butter melts.

Beat egg and then add salt, pepper, vinegar, sugar and flour. Blend the egg mixture into the slightly warm cream mixture. Increase heat and cook, stirring constantly until the mixture thickens.

Pour hot dressing over the greens and toss gently. Add eggs before tossing. Serve at once. Gather the dandelion leaves early in the spring before the plants flower or they will be bitter.

Include an assortment of pastries, bagels with cream cheese, fresh fruit tray, orange and cranberry juice, coffee, tea, milk

Option #4-Formal Luncheon

An assortment of wraps and classic sandwiches served with a tossed salad, pasta salad and bowl of chips. Iced Tea Cookie Tray

Option #5-Dinner

Salad of Choice
Stuffed Pork Chops Roasted Red Potatoes
Vegetable: Carrots and Peas
Rolls/Butter Dessert



The dessert makes the meal! Pull out all the stops and make dessert delicious, beautiful and fun.

Consider offering a Dessert Sampler with an array of delicious delicacies served from rolling carts. Guests choose their favorite dessert at the appropriate time. Replenish beverages as needed.

Here are suggestions to get you started. Add your own creations too! Notice there is no lack of wonderful choices:

Chocolate Cake Topped With Cherry Pie Filling/Whipping Cream
Angel Food Cake With Sliced Strawberries
Cheese Cake With Berries
Pie: Apple, Peach, Cherry, Pecan
Cobblers: Peach, Apple, Cherry, Blueberry
Assorted Mini Fruit Tarts
Brownies and Vanilla Ice Cream
Tropical Fruit Kabob
Frosted Cupcakes Topped with Berries
Strawberry Shortcake/Whipping Cream

Of course, charm is in the presentation. Squirt ribbons of chocolate or fruit topping across the plate before placing the dessert on it. Add a live flower on the side. Cut fruit and place on plates as accessories. Drizzle warm toppings just before placing the dessert on the cart.

DIETARY RESTRICTIONS: While it is not possible to prepare totally separate foods, it may be possible to accommodate those who have restrictions due to health or allergies.

There are many wonderful recipes for this delicious and fun dessert. Choose your own favorite to serve table by table. Each table should receive one container of "Dirt" and a small garden spade. Add dessert dishes and allow the guests to serve their own portions.

Make a day ahead for a great party centerpiece. You will need a large (10") flower pot (no hole) and some artificial flowers.

2 (8 oz.) Cream Cheese
2 (3 oz.) Instant vanilla pudding
3 C. Milk
2 (16 oz.) Cool Whip
2 t. vanilla
2 large packages Oreo Cookies
Gummy worms (optional)

Cream sugar and cream cheese. Beat milk, pudding and vanilla until thick, then add to cream cheese mixture. Fold in Cool Whip. Grind Oreo cookies in blender.

Layer Oreo mixture and creamy mixture, hiding gummy worms in flower pot, ending with cookie mixture on top. Chill overnight. Put flowers into "dirt" and surprise your guests when you serve your centerpiece for dessert! Makes enough for 2 pots.

Does your community have amateur/professional musicians willing to perform? Think about asking a violinist, guitarist, harpist, pianist or ensemble to perform as guests arrive and as they enjoy dinner.

Sing fun songs and Christian choruses after dinner.
Ask a pianist to accompany the group.
Choose familiar songs.

Consider This!

Provide a strolling violinist or guitarist during dinner. The musician wanders from table to table playing lovely pieces of music as desired.



Printed Information

Include the menu, committee members, kitchen crew and servers.

Be sure to use garden titles.

Adapt the material as desired.



Yes, I think the Earth laughs in flowers. When you listen hard enough you will hear God in the laughter.





Stars In The Grass





Look by the poppies! How many do you see? Five, six or SEVEN, count along with me....


Sitting in a row on the garden gate, All smiling brightly...How many worms? EIGHT!
