Add costuming/head gear as desired.

At the right time in Jesus' story, children become that character.

Sleep In Heavenly Peace is rehearsed with familiar teachers. Gather children for a final dress rehearsal and this delightful preschool Christmas program is set to go!

Church preschool, day care center, Christian school or home school leaders! This is the fun, easy program for you.

It is a good idea to have enough children to fill the program. A little "cheating" on the upper age range is okay. Fill spots with Kindergarten or older students as needed.

Ask leaders to organize children with Nativity props and pajamas. For the most part leaders should be

able to handle their preparations. The result will be a simple Christmas presentation by the youngest among us, dressed in pajamas, with simply made posterboard face masks or head gear.

Be prepared to help.

This young version of the Christmas Story is read by the grown up Pajama Story Teller. No memorization. If memorization is important, lead time must be longer and intensive rehearsal is essential.

This on stage event is designed to last 20-30 minutes depending upon added music. WAKE UP, IT'S CHRISTMAS PARTY is not included in this time frame. The party is an optional gathering.

Small Church/School

Remove segments requiring more people than available. Combine parts so fewer children/leaders are needed. Eliminate what you cannot do. Involve children who are younger or older than the target group. Adults and teens are crucial to the small church/school program.

Some people may participate several times.

Medium Church/School

Adaptations are personal preference. Choose parts you like and eliminate the rest. Tell the Christmas story but don't leave out anything important! (Like the Baby!)

Keep It Simple!

PLArge Church/School

Speakers, snack makers, servers, props, video, audio and lighting staff, musicians, costume designers, art team and others make the program exciting.

Wake Up! It's Christmas! Party



Preschool Christmas Music

WORDS ONLY-No piano sheet music or CD available from our end!

Teach children the words. Place songs where you desire in the program. No piano accompaniment is required.

Eliminate preschool songs if time is an issue.

Special Music Options

Feature church and community talent. Special Music options are NOT in the existing program. Add as desired.



Stage and Props

Sleep In Heavenly Peace is a simple preschool presentation of Jesus' Birthday using a minimum of staging and props.



Set The Mood

Keep The Decorations! Christmas trees, nativity scenes, twinkle lights, poinsettias, candles and displays add to the festive atmosphere. **Leave holiday decorations in place.**

Staging

Nativity Props: Place an empty manger stage left or right. Add one small bench or stool near the manger. Add simple stable items as available Add a few large baskets, pottery and greenery in the scene.

Keep it

Simple: REVIEW PROGRAM ONLY

Story Teller's Chair: One large, comfortable rocking chair or upholstered chair placed center stage. Make room for all children to sit on the floor around the chair.

Option: End table and lit table lamp.

Lighting: Back light the chair with one small floor spotlight. Only the spotlight and holiday lights are lit. Turn off audience lighting even if program is performed during the day.

Create atmosphere with light.

Seating: Children and leaders enter from the back and move into place on stage. **No audience seating needed.**

Sound System

Use the existing sound system to its' best advantage. Provide a microphone. Attach a wireless microphone. This detail makes the difference between a frustrating experience and a delightful program. **Say It Loud!**

Pajamas and Masks

Children hear the Bethlehem bedtime story in their pajamas. The Nativity comes to life as simple character 'masks' are held in front of their faces.

OR consider placing Holy Land head gear on students to represent their character.

Clothes make a statement.

Costumes tell a story!

BASIC COSTUME: All students, assistants, leaders and the Story Teller wear their favorite Christmas pajamas, bathrobe and slippers.

Set The Scene: It is story time before bed. The little ones are ready to rest until Christmas morning breaks in all it's exciting glory! First, they hear the Bethlehem story of the day Jesus was born.

DIFA Bethlehem Guests

Eyewitness Guests enter the scene to tell their story. Teens/Grown ups dress in full Holy Land costume.

Simple Props

Children: Carry favorite teddy bears/animals.

Story Teller: Carry a large handmade story book with full script taped inside. Print SLEEP IN HEAVENLY PEACE in large black letters on the audience side. **HINT:** Brightly colored poster board works great. Big, bright and spray glittered is charming!

Bright Ideas!

Pajama Story Teller reads while sitting in the chair. Hand out poster board character masks. Students peek through their mask, holding it to become that character, animal or object as they are placed into the Nativity scene. The manger story springs to 'life'.

Needed: 'Art inclined' people who make the hand held masks. We offer simple patterns. Enlarge on posterboard and feature highlights with markers, acrylic paint, glitter, acrylic jewels, old jewelry, fabric (as desired).

Cut holes for faces.

Use these patterns or create your own. Enlarge the patterns just big enough for young students to hold with faces peeking through the holes! Each child holds their mask in front of their face and steps into the Nativity scene when the Story Teller hands it to them.

Adjust characters to the number of participants. Example: 1-2-3, etc. shepherds....you decide. 1-2-3, etc. wise men....you decide. Manger animals: as many as needed. Stars and angels: as many as possible.



Enlarge cardboard figures to fit the size of little people who will put their faces into character during the Bethlehem story. Add color, fabric, glitter or other fun materials to the figures as available.

More Angel Fun: Hand glo sticks to the little angels. At the right time, ask them to wave and shine 'For Heaven'.

Optional Extra Fun: Take a few minutes before the program to apply makeup-rosy red cheeks, big eyelashes and eyeshadow on willing students. Add spray glitter on angels and stars to guarantee they sparkle in the stage lights.



Publicity ~ Talk It Up!

Publicize SLEEP IN HEAVENLY PEACE through church/school communication channels. Announce it in your newsletter, the weekly worship bulletin and from the pulpit.

Bulletin And Newsletter

Print an announcement in November and December newsletters. If planning WAKE UP IT'S CHRISTMAS PARTY, tell families there will be a Christmas celebration following the program.

Local News and Social Media

Contact the local news source. Add a fun announcement with church holiday information. Talk to a reporter and photographer to see if a feature article is possible. Print several quick announcements on the church/school website and social media pages.

Talk it up with announcements and pictures on your private face book page and twitter.

PLEASE PURCHASE Television And Radio

Media. Advertise on your local television cable advertising channel. Radio stations often have free spots available as community service.

Christmas Card Invitations

Send family invitations home.

This is effective for families are not involved.

Use real Christmas cards with invitations tucked inside.

Daycare/Preschool children make paper Christmas cards as a project and tuck each invitation inside to be placed in their backpack.









Teachers! Helpers! Pray! Prepare! Present!

When you play with 'puppies', expect puppy tricks!



The Youngest Among Us! ~ On Stage!

Preschool children do NOT have individual speaking parts. They sing together. They dress in pajamas. They enter the Nativity scene. Add simple costumes/masks appropriate for their character during the program.

Story Teller ~ You're On!

Pajama Story Teller leads the way. Program material is written in an easily readable format. Preschool children responses are short and coached.

Optional 'grown up' monologues are inserted. Use as desired.

Practice Makes Perfect ~ Or Not!

Practice music and prepare children for the big event. Adapt and make changes as needed. Keep Calm. No one will care. **Memories are made!**

Communicate With Parents

Tell parents when to have children at rehearsal and performance. Little rehearsal is needed. Invite families to attend. Communicate specific props or costuming for their child.

Parents dress their child or arrive in pj's.





Don't Forget To... Smile!

Line up and Smile. Enter the performance area. Lead your group onto the stage. Perform your part with enthusiasm.

Coach students quietly as needed.

Write Your thoughts here.	Stage fright is not uncommon. Preschool children are notorious for saying and doing the unexpected. Keep your sense of humor! Go with the flow! The audience will love whatever happens.
	Stay For The Party! Stay for WAKE UP IT'S CHRISTMAS PARTY. Collect props before children attend the party. Mingle with party goers. Enjoy the experience with your children and their families. Children remain in pajamas OR dress for the party.
	l Still Need Help!
	Ask The Director. The program comes together at the last moment with little formal large group rehearsal. Don't sweat the small stuff!
	Teachers Just Wanna Have Fun!
	Enjoy your small part of the bigger picture. Bethlehem's Jesus Story is life changing. The spiritual experience is delightful! Enjoy this once in a lifetime opportunity to touch lives of young children and grown ups.

Stage Helpers

Sit with children on stage.

Wear Your Fave Pajamas!

Keep it simple. When guiding children or sitting with them on stage, wear pajamas. This is the time to bring out your 'footie pis'!

Have fun!

If assigned a short part, speak with enthusiasm. Memorization is <u>not</u> necessary.

PREVSing Along RAV

The suggested songs are short nursery rhyme tunes with Christmas lyrics repeated two or three times. Sing along and add to the over all sound.

Sing a capella!

On Stage/Off Stage

Keep children focused. Let them sit on your lap or place your arms around them as they sit near you. Guide them gently into position. Teen and adult leaders mixed with little ones is charming. It is an excellent way to keep order on stage.

Guide children and sit with them.

Music Makers Prelude

Play Christmas Carols as the audience gathers. Choose happy music suited to a children's program. A variety of instruments can be included as available.









Sleepy Time Procession

Gather children in an outer room. The audience welcome, introductions, first audience song, Narrator and offering (*If appropriate*) is completed before the little ones enter the performance area.

Dim the Lights. Existing holiday lights are left to glow merrily in the background. Leave stage lights, spotlights, twinkle lights shining.

Onvite Children to join the Story Teller On Stage. Create a dramatic entrance and photographic moments.

On Stage

Seat the children on the floor around the Story Teller as they arrive at the stage. As the story is told, place Mary and Joseph near the manger, angels in the back, shepherds on one side and wise men on the other side.

Hand out head gear or hand held masks (decided before program) as each child takes their place in the manger scene during the program.

Scatter angels along the edges.
Children dressed as 'stars' mingle with angels.
Children masked as animals, sit on the floor.

Insert preschool songs at the beginning, middle and end of the program. We suggest song options. Choose music as desired.

Options: Bethlehem Guest Monologues. Little ones may stand near the speaker at the right time. See Script and use as desired or eliminate if time is an issue.







Pajama Story Teller

Read the script Bethlehem story aloud, hand character props to children. Create a little ones, mini Nativity scene.

Follow Script Directions

Your gentle personality as *Pajama Story Teller makes child involvement* delightful as you place them in the scene. Prompt children to respond casually. Repeat their responses with them.

Whatever happens....happens!



Sing!

Songs we suggest and include with this event are short, Repeat melodies a couple of times.

Sing a capella.

NOT FOR USE

Choose Christmas Carols that the audience sings.

Decide where to insert traditional Carols.

Lead The Children!

Assign specific characters. Children do not have speaking lines. They become part of the visual Nativity scene. All children should be in pajamas with Nativity costume/mask options provided. Keep it simple.

Children sit on stage. They stand in the Nativity scene when their part of the story is told. Hand them their prop. Place them near the manger on stage.





Get Ready! Get Set! Go!

No Memorization! Carry the script inside a large story book. Dress in pajamas and bathrobe. Young children bring Jesus' story to life visually, standing in their stable places.

Be Flexible ~ Just Be Cool!

Relax! When young children say or do something unexpected this does not ruin the program. Their innocence, enthusiasm and curiosity make their first 'on stage' experience enjoyable.

And That's the Truth!

After their entrance, seat children on the floor around the chair. Once placed in the Nativity scene, they stay there. If a few children wander, keep your sense of humor.

Remind them of their important part!

It is helpful to have older helpers quiding the children.

Young children are most comfortable with people they know best. Visit their classroom, talk with them. Become an approachable friend. This preparation reaps great benefits.

The youngest children will not be afraid.

Preschool Participation

Encourage children to respond with joy. Focus on the manger, becoming their character.

Tis A Gift To Be Simple...and Childlike.

Easy songs with familiar melodies like "Away In A Manger" or nursery rhymes are well received by the audience.

Hand Signal Option: Consider a hand sign to signal it's time for the appropriate on stage group response.

Place one grown up in the front row

to guide the group.

Rehearse: Preparation lessens the 'deer in the headlights' look! Practice songs, include assistants.

Tip: Practice in the actual performance space.

Free To Be Three ~ No Matter What Happens!

Perfection? Pshaw! If one or two children cry, wave, greet 'mommy and daddy', comment or run off stage, don't panic. Handle the issue with humor and regroup. The more casual the effort, the better the result.

Don't aim for perfection.

"Because I'm Little"~ I Can't Tell You Who I Am

- **1. Fear:** Is there a shaking, clinging, crying child? Hold their hand. Ask a parent to 'come along', be supportive. The solution can be as simple as giving a mask on stage to hide behind so they can "dance like no one is watching"!
- 2. The Performer: Most little ones are ready to take to the stage. They are excited to be there and seem to know what to expect with big smiles. Can't predict ti!
- **3.** The Shy Wallflower: This little person wants to be in the show but stands at the edge and sucks their thumb. Let them be shy and comfortable.





- 4. The Observer: This child wants to 'just watch'. It takes a lot of guts for a three year old to be on stage in front of a crowd. Remind them how proud you are that they got out there!
- 5. The Joker: This child wants to 'steal the show'. They go off script and talk to parents from the stage, wave, say something funny or just start doing their own thing while everyone else follows the story teller. If this happens to you, you have a star on your hands!

Gently encourage any child that goes too far off script to come back to the story. As long as they are having fun and not being too distracting to the rest of their friends, it's all okay. The preschool program is meant to be loose, fun and super cute!

Secret Tips To Help Your Little Ones Succeed On Stage ~ Think On The Fly!

- 1. Get Them To Class: It is helpful when the children know each other, love their teacher and are familiar with the space. Getting to know the story and the staff that will be present on show day can go a long way.
- 2. Practice: Give the children every opportunity possible to stand in front of a group and get big applause. Let them get excited about the performance.
- 3. Let Children Teach YOU: Let them move and participate according to their size, age and attention span. It's okay if they don't do all the moves right, just help them along during the program.
- 4. Singing: Teach the songs and sing them often before the program. They will associate the moves and theme the more they hear their songs in class.
- 5. Get On Stage: If possible, take the group on stage. It gives them a sense of what to expect on show day. Talk about the crowds, the story, the lights, the backstage area. You can even tell them who they will become in the program.

Option For The Brave: Sing it in German.

Or: Ask two people to sing a duet in German.

Choose one/two teens or grown ups to speak as Narrator.











Introduction: One/Two Narrators remember how "Silent Night" became a favorite Christmas Carol. Tell the story with sweet assurance that the writer celebrated Christmas in 1818 with the same devotion we celebrate today.

Verses of the Carol will be sung during the program.

While the Narrator presents this segment, "Silent Night" is quietly played on quitar, organ or piano.

Narrator: It was a cold, snowy 1818 Austrian Christmas Eve. St. Nicholas Church in Oberndorf near Salzburg was chilly and empty. School teacher, Franz Gruber, walked along the aisle preparing for Christmas Eve. He must have left his coat, cap and scarf in place as he sat at the organ to practice the few songs he knew would be sung by choir and congregation.

To his dismay, the organ wasn't working. Of all times, Christmas was most inconvenient to have music silenced. It was a sad year for the shipping workers, boat builders and their families in the small village. War took a toll on the region. Depression, job loss and an unsure future troubled the people. Christmas was a rest from the fear of tomorrow.

As Franz turned to leave the cold church, the brand new musically talented pastor, Joseph Mohr, showed up with a hand written poem. "Write a melody for this little poem. If it sounds good, you and I will sing it tonight with the guitar. We must have some kind of Christmas music. The organ is lost to us."

Franz Gruber saw Mohr's handwritten German words, "Stille Nacht" and a simple melody flowed onto paper. That evening, the villagers gathered to worship Jesus and tell the Bethlehem story. Joseph Mohr sang tenor accompanied by his guitar. Franz Gruber joined in with his rich bass voice.

Christmas would never be the same. We still tell the story of that 'Silent Night, Holy Night'. We tell it again today. "Silent Night, Holy Night, all is calm, all is bright." Our little ones know it well. Let's remember the story of Bethlehem with the littlest among us.

Story Teller Introduction

The Story Teller enters from back in pajamas. Walk through audience to center stage, yawning and stretching.

(Surprised by Audience) Uh...Hello! Surprise! I am getting ready for bed. How did you get in my house? If I knew you were coming, I would have (ahem) dressed for the occasion, made tea, served cookies. Shouldn't you be getting ready for Christmas, or watching television or...sleeping?

(Sit in Large Chair) Come in. Sit down. Join the bedtime gang. Bath, brush teeth, comb hair, put on pajamas and meet me for story time.

Anyone who thinks the art of conversation is dead ought to tell a child to go to bed. (Whining) "I need a drink of water...I am hungry...he hit me... Why is the sky blue?...You forgot to hug me...I'm not sleepy." At bed time my children turn into dehydrated philosophers who need a hug. Sound familiar?

I looked up 'bed time' in the dictionary. Definition: 1. Playing, singing, making random noises, 2. Being scared in a perfectly safe bedroom, 3. Dying of thirst, 4. Making parents question their decision to procreate.

Some wise guy said, "If you read just one book a day to your child, they will have been read 1825 books by their 5th birthday." In my personal experience I will have read the same book 1825 times. You know the one. "Do you like green eggs and ham?"

It takes courage to raise children. Courage and a whole lot of love. That's why I'm here, in my jammies, waiting for children..living out the 'whole lot of love' part. Usually we tuck in tight and read one book...or ten... but this is Christmas Eve! I planned a surprise. I will read the Bethlehem story and the children will 'become' the Baby Jesus people. YOU get to sing once in awhile.

As long as you are here anyway...Watch! And be amazed! Children! Are you ready for story time? Come out, come out wherever you are!

Sleepy Time Entrance CHILDREN ENTER WITH HELPERS FROM BACK OF ROOM.

Option: Music accompaniment – "Away In A Manger"











Sleep In Heavenly Peace!

Sit in large chair. Invite children to sit on the floor around the chair.

Script is attached inside large story book. Costume parts or masks are beside the chair. Hand props to children just before their segment is read. **Example:** "I need some shepherds and sheep. Let me help you get ready."



It's Christmas Eve and all good children listen to stories with open eyes and quiet lips and hearing ears. If we are very good, we may see surprises with our eyes during our Christmas story.



Sleep In Heavenly Peace!

Back in the 'day', way back in the 'day, a sleepy little village snuggled in the hills of Judea was about to become the most famous city on earth. No one knew it that night. In fact, every village inn was bustling with business. When you go to sleep tonight, be thankful for your bed. That night travelers had no place to sleep. In fact, there was only one spot left in the whole village of Bethlehem.



Bethlehem Guest: "Sleep! It's My Business!" The Innkeeper Audience: Sing "Silent Night, Holy Night" Verse 1 **GIVE SHEPHERD AND SHEEP PROPS**

SHEEP AND SHEPHERDS: Meanwhile, in the hills of Judea some sheep and shepherds were walking and resting in the night. It was dark and quiet. The only thing anyone could hear was the sound of the happy, sleepy sheep.



PROMPT SHEEP: Baaa, Baaa

GIVE ANGELS PROPS/LIGHTS

ANGELS: Suddenly, the dark sky turned to bright light! Really bright light! (Wave Glo-Sticks) Angels from Heaven showed up all around the shepherds and the shepherds were really afraid!

PROMPT SHEPHERDS: Shake like you are scared...big time! PROMPT ANGELS: Wave Glo-Sticks...









The angels raised their 'wings': "Don't be afraid. I'm here to tell you about a great and joyful thing for everyone around the world! A Savior has just been born in David's town, a Savior who is our Messiah and Lord. When you get to Bethlehem, look for this: a baby wrapped in a blanket and lying in a manger."

PROMPT ANGELS: Raise your arms in the air and wave them like wings!

All at once there was a huge angel choir singing God's praises. "Glory to God in the heavenly heights, peace to all mean and women....and every child....(I added that part...) on earth who please him."

It was super terrific, terrifying, delightful and joyful all at the same time. And then? As fast as they showed up, the angels disappeared. You can imagine how confused those shepherds were. One minute camping in the neighborhood roasting marshmallows and the next minute God's glory blazed around them. The next minute, it was dark and quiet and the sheep said:

PROMPT SHEEP: Baaa

Well, after catching their breath, the shepherds said, "We better get over to Bethlehem to see what's going on. We have to look for a baby boy, in a blanket, in a manger." And that is just what they did! They took off for Bethlehem...fast!

PROMPT SHEPHERDS AND ANGELS: SIT WITH STORY TELLER

BETHLEHEM GUEST: Shepherds Quake ~ Shepherd Girl BETHLEHEM GUEST: Christ The Savior Is Born ~ Angel Audience: Sing "Silent Night, Holy Night" Verse 2

GIVE MARY AND JOSEPH PROPS

Meanwhile, two young people, Mary and Joseph, were looking for a place to sleep in Bethlehem. Mary was going to have her baby, the baby God promised would be the Savior of the world, that very night.

PROMPT MARY AND JOSEPH: Stand and walk to manger.











Mary and Joseph looked everywhere for a hotel. It was crowded that night because the leaders said, "Everybody in Israel, go to your hometowns and sign your names. We want to count you." That's weird. But that's what everyone did. They walked, they rode their camels and donkeys, they hitched up their wooden wagons and headed home.

Door to door, from 'Holiday Inn Bethlehem' to 'Best Eastern', Joseph and Mary asked the same question, "Do you have a place for us to sleep? We won't make any trouble. Mary just needs to have her baby." Again and again, the sign went up:

PROMPT SIGN HOLDER: THE INN is FULL! (Wiggle the sign)

Finally, one Innkeeper held up the sign and said, "My Inn is full but.....I can let you sleep in the stable with the animals. It's not much and it smells a little, but....." and Joseph said, "We'll take it!" And they did.

We really don't know how many animals or what kind of animals were in that stable but let's see if we can guess. Maybe there was a donkey, a camel, a cow, a sheep, a bunny. Who knows?

PROMPT ANIMALS: Hand out as many animal characters as available.

Animals sit in front of manger facing audience.

It was time for Mary to have the baby boy.

PROMPT MARY: "Ouch" Hand her Baby Jesus

The shepherds showed up all excited, jumping up and down! They talked all at once. "There were angels! They were from Heaven! The angels said to find you. This baby is our Savior! They said we should run to Bethlehem, right here to this manger! We should worship Jesus, God's Son.

PROMPT SHEPHERDS: Run to manger, jump up and down and be really happy. Kneel at manger.

I can imagine God let the angels peek into the manger and see Baby Jesus. I think the angels might have flown into the little stable and stood behind everyone and just smiled.

PROMPT ANGELS: Stand in the background





High in the sky, God's beautiful stars were shining like birthday candles on a cake. Every star that twinkled seemed to say, "Jesus is here. He is right here in Bethlehem. Come and see the King!" There was ONE very bright star that twinkled right above that little stable.

PROMPT STARS: Wear stars and sunglasses.
Stand all around the stage.
ONE Star stands just behind Mary and Joseph.
That Star has words printed on their star.
JESUS IS HERE! (Arrow pointing down to manger.)



In a far away Eastern land, some very wise men were looking up in the sky.

PROMPT WISE MEN: Look up in the air,

kneel at the manger with gifts.

"Wow", they said, "look at that bright star! We should follow it and see if it leads us to a king. We should take presents." And off they went, riding their camels and crossing desert sand all the way to the tiny village of Bethlehem.

BETHLEHEM GUEST: Radiant Beams ~ Wise Man Audience: Sing "Silent Night, Holy Night" Verse 3

Guess what those wise men found? Baby Jesus in the manger with Mary and Joseph and shepherds and animals all around him. Baby Jesus must have yawned, "Why don't these people go home? Can't a baby get some sleep here? You'd think it was my birthday or something. I need to 'sleep in heavenly peace'."

ALL CHILDREN RETURN TO THE FLOOR NEAR STORY TELLER.

Everyone went home. The shepherds went back to their fields, telling everyone what happened to them with the angels and the manger and the baby! The angels went home to Heaven, praising God and singing Glory to His Name. The Wise Men hopped back on their camels and went back to their country a secret way so the people who wanted to hurt Jesus didn't know where He was.

Mary and Joseph used the wonderful presents given by the Wise Men (gold, frankincense and myrrh) to pay for life in Egypt with Jesus. Those bad guys were really looking for them.





Conclusion

After that night at Bethlehem Inn, Jesus grew into a wonderful young man and showed everyone He is truly our Lord and Savior. But...that's a story for another night! Tonight we know that God sent His Only Son, Jesus, into our world to save us and make us ready to live with Him in Heaven. And that is Good News!

Time for bed! Off with you. There are big things happening Christmas morning and you need to be well rested. You look comfy cozy in your pajamas. Make your way up the stairs. Your soft beds are waiting.

Well, of course it was crowded. The Romans insisted every family travel to their hometown to sign the census. There were people coming from all over the kingdom. Yes, it was crowded. What could I do?

"Bethlehem Innkeeper is rude and doesn't comb his hair." Two Stars * *
Really? That's all you've got? I'm tired. Every guest has demands. "Get me 'this'. Get me 'that'. I don't like the bed. I hate the view out my window. Give me a discount." So I didn't comb my hair. One day! Get a life!

"Bethlehem Inn turns away customers. I'll never go there again." One Star * Now that is downright unfair. I DID NOT TURN AWAY customers! I made space. I put that young couple in the barn. It was warm, quiet and private. I gave what I had. A baby boy was born My staff welcomed scruffy shepherds and prepared for elegant wise men to visit. It was a good night.

The last time I peeked in, 'all was calm, all was bright'. Bethlehem Inn let them 'sleep in heavenly peace'. No problem! I'm going to bed! Good Night. Sleep Tight. ...and...uh...don't let the bed bugs bite.

Bethlehem Shepherd Girl: (Stand center stage.) I guess you think all shepherds are boys. Nope! Girls can be shepherds too! Shepherds are mentioned lots of times in the Bible. Abraham, Moses and King David were shepherds. Jesus is the Good Shepherd. Girl shepherds find water, fresh grass and guard the flock just like the boys.

Sheep are my favorite animal. Most people make me quiver and quake. Maybe that is why I love quiet nights in the sheep field. A cheerful campfire, warm wooly blanket and a little lamb to cuddle after a dinner of bread and cheese. The night Jesus was born our sheep were asleep and we were finally resting at the campfire.

I 'quaked', I shook, I screamed, I fell down...well, you get it... when the Heavenly hosts came to our hillside. Angels, thousands of angels, lit up our field. Did you see them? How could you miss them? I was so afraid. Not just because I am a girl! The guys were 'quaking' too! Personally, I thought we were going to die. Little did I know shepherds were going to hear the best message in the whole wide world!

Stand quietly in place while angel speaks.





BETHLEHEM ANGEL: (Standing mid aisle) Chances are, if you have seen a real angel you never knew it. That's one of God's rules, "Don't ever let them see you being an angel. Just surprise them!" Good rule. Any time I show up people are always 'quaking'. I don't mean to make them afraid. In fact, I start every conversation with, "Fear not". Never seems to calm anyone.

I will never forget the night Jesus was born. We got the word that our angel choir was assigned to show up in a quiet sheep field outside the village of Bethlehem. So we shined up our halos, fluffed out our wings, ironed our gowns and sprinkled our glitter. Not really. That's what YOU might think we did!

We were impressive. We scared those shepherds. Almost scared me. We sang, we spoke. We directed the tired shepherds to the exact place where Baby Jesus was sleeping. Mary and Joseph had no idea we were so close to their barn. We could only hope the shepherds remembered what we said when they were done being afraid. We lit up the place!

Heavenly Father had everything under control. It worked out beautifully. In case you forgot what we said, I remember it word for word:

"Don't be afraid!" See? Standard angel introduction. "I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people." Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; He is Christ the Lord. This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger."

We sang the prettiest song: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to men on whom His favor rests."

Not only did we see Jesus but we met Mary and Joseph AND told everyone we saw about angels and God's good news..We found a baby wrapped in clothes, lying in a manger! So much for keeping angels a secret. We told everyone!







Wake Up It's Christmas! Party With A Purpose

Assign party planning to one small group:

Specific grown ups or a Sunday School Class.

Preschool parents may set up the party area.

Offer delicious desserts,

Christmas music, casual fellowship.

Preparations Before Party Day

Menu: Prepare a Christmas Cake. Ask people to share their favorite Christmas dessert. If this is a Sunday morning event, serve a Continental Breakfast including ham and egg sandwiches or casserole, doughnuts. Provide favorite beverages: Coffee, tea, orange juice, fruit drink.

Seating: Decide the table and chair arrangement depending upon the size of the gathering. Serve buffet style with space for guests to move around the room. Place chairs in intimate circles for group conversation.

Music: Fill the air with Christmas music. This could be live music performed by local church/school musicians or favorite CD performances.

Centerpieces: Cover tables with white tablecloths overlaid with colorful baby quilts to represent bedtime. Add bedtime centerpieces: small pillow, stuffed animal, baby bottle, night light. Add one piece of a Nativity scene set to each table.







Preparations On Party Day

Decorate the serving table and guest tables. Plug in the coffee pot and boil tea water while the program is in progress. Set out desserts, cream and sugar. Make your favorite Christmas Punch and place on a nearby serving table.

During The Party

Assign specific people to serve desserts, pour beverages and refill creamers. Greet guests cordially as they wait in the serving line. Move around the group to be sure everyone feels welcome. Find seats for those who may not be familiar with your church. Introduce people.

Enjoy the compliments.

After The Party PROGRAM ON

Don't forget! The party is not over until clean up is complete. Ask everyone to help with dishes, removing tables and chairs and sweeping the area clean.
