Follow our tips and add your own creative touches to make your Spring Banquet a unique event to be remembered for years. Manage basic arrangements and have fun developing the wonderland theme!

PREA Banquet

A banquet is a party with food as the main attraction. Add a short program, a speaker or entertainment. The occasion is enjoyable, comfortable and social. The most popular traditional spring banquet is the Mother and Daughter Banquet. There are other times when banquets are enjoyable. Ladies evenings, retreat weekends, holiday gatherings, summer picnics and any gathering where laughter and inspiration should meet in the middle.



An Informal Gathering

A party is a fun and games event where people mix for sparkling conversation, good food and laughter. Parties tend to be informal and hosts do not go to extra trouble to decorate.

ALL RIGHTS RESERVED

While party games were once wildly popular, there are groups who do not enjoy a lot of organized activity. The event should be a highly enjoyable experience. The activities should fit the needs of the guests.

Sometimes small parties do not have to be planned at all. A larger party requires good planning to handle the program, publicity, decorating, welcoming, refreshments and clean up. Delicious refreshments are offered and you have a great party if you had a chance to create your own fun and remember the event fondly.

Pay Attention To Details

Often it is the smallest detail that makes the biggest impression. Wild flowers on a table, small table gifts for each guest, background music, greeters at the door and other thoughtful gestures make individuals feel welcome, special and pampered.

Practice Christian Hospitality

In the middle of a fun activity, people should be growing in their understanding of the Lord. Everyone should be giving affection and receiving love from other Christians in the family of God. Begin friendly conversations, avoid gossip or mean spirited comments. Make this banquet the happiest evening in the year!

Set Realistic Goals

What do you want to see happen during the two hours your guests are with you? Be specific! Plans in this workbook are complete. However, you may have more fun if you change details to fit your needs. Add creative ideas and change any activities as desired.



Work With A Team

Choose a small leadership team to complete advance arrangements. The team may be as few as two or as large as ten or more.

Divide tasks between team members and trust them to finish their tasks. While leadership may be divided, one person should be in charge to keep the whole affair moving smoothly.

Organize

Follow our suggestions adding your own creativity at the beginning of the planning process. Write down exactly what will happen and when tasks must be completed. Do not leave organization to the last minute. Reserve the last minute for a deep breath and excitement in the sharing of a special time.

Purchase Supplies As Needed

Decide what the banquet budget is and stay withing the limit. Keep expense records. Use the church tax exemption number.

Practice A Positive Approach

Maintain a light and happy atmosphere during the planning process. If your attitude is right the rest of your team will catch the spirit. After all, this is a party!

Pray!

Pray for the event, the team and the guests. Pray as a team. Take each detail before the Lord and then-Relax!

Set Up

Provide adequate time to set up tables, decorations, props, food and other items necessary for the event. Reserve the church for the entire day. There may be situations when room arrangements must take place a day before the party.

Say Thank You!

The behind-the-scenes team is the core of this event. Take time to write thank you notes, call and give small thank you gifts. Recognize your team publically at the event.

When the event is over, clean up begins. The party is not complete until the church is in order. Encourage the team to remove their props immediately. Stay to help with kitchen clean up.

Invite A Speaker

By all means invite a special guest to share inspirational thoughts. When scheduling a speaker, consider reducing program segments we

provide that are best performed by the guests themselves. The speaker should conclude the evening festivities.

The Perfect Person

A good speaker makes a faith connection with the specific group. Choose the speaker from a list of possibilities suggested by friends, relatives, pastor, other churches, community groups or national organizations.

Consider The Cost

Ask the speaker if she has a set fee. If not, give a generous monetary gift including traveling costs. Think about the time they invest in preparation, travel and presentation.





Specific Instructions

Send a letter, make a telephone call and stay in contact by email. Include information like highway directions, arrival time and place, group size, time limit, lodging information and other personal details.

Tell the speaker the type of program and details of what you would like their speech to include. Continue to make contact periodically until the speaker leaves home to travel to the event.

Care And Feeding

Be aware that is disquieting for a speaker to enter a room of strangers, be expected to speak about personal and spiritual issues and leave still feeling as if everyone is a stranger.

Assign a pre-arranged hostess "friend" to handle introductions, sit and converse with the guest to give the speaker a sense of belonging.

The banquet budget should include payment of all expenses from the time the speaker leaves home until she returns. If more meals are required, host or pay accordingly.


After The Banquet

Pay promptly. Stay with the speaker until she leaves to return home. Thank that person from your heart and always follow up with a handwritten thank you note!

Option

With this program, a speaker is indeed an option. There is enough program material to omit a speaker if desired. Using members of the church gang is fun and less expensive so...you choose!

Tell Everyone...



Publicize!

It's All About The Details

Invitations, posters, registration forms, programs, handouts and centerpieces should all relate to your theme. Use the same colors, scripture, picture or logo on every piece of publicity.

Invite Every Gall

Send invitations. If a community wide event is desired, place posters in local restaurants, business, offices. Insert invitations in the weekly worship folder and in the monthly newsletter.



Don't forget...One of the best places to put posters is in the Ladies Room at church and in community businesses. If a local business hesitates placing another poster in their window, suggest their ladies' room as a great "out of the way" place!

Create Buzz!

Involve lots of people in the planning stages. They don't have to be on the team but delegate tasks or small parts. Ask as many people as possible to participate in the formal program.

No memorization! The benefit? Everyone who is involved will attend and will be more likely to talk about the event and invite others to be involved. Many hands make light work. Cut stress with more help.

There's Even More Fun!

Let guests know prized will be awarded for various games. Enjoy the company of friends.

Be Creative!

If the banquet is near a holiday like Mother's Day, advertise the event to men of the church that this is a great Mother's Day gift they can give their wives and mothers. Find creative ways to make your banquet a "gift" to the women and girls who attend.

Tea Cups ~ Just For Fun!

Ask all guests to bring their favorite, lovely teacup. These are great decorative items for the tables. Prepare a 'Teacup Table' for overflow. Everyone will enjoy looking at family treasures and the

teacups certainly fit the exciting 'Alice In Wonderland' theme!


Decorating...

Creating Alice's Wonderland

"In my world,

the books would be nothing but pictures."

Make the banquet space colorful, joyful and inspirational. When guests arrive they should feel the anticipation of an evening of fun and a time apart being in the presence of Christ. Can you do it? Oh, yes! And we are going to help you!

Fill the room with bright color reminiscent of Alice In Wonderland. Our tips are meant to spark your own creativity. Read and follow directions but use items that are available locally. Not every decoration or idea listed must be used.

Choose the best and leave the rest!

How Complicated Is This Going To Be?

Your banquet can be as simple or involved as desired. If there are folks in your church who love to decorate, give them the responsibility to turn the room into a work of 'Wonderland' art. If no one comes forward, decorate each table simply.



What Should Be Decorated?

Decorate guest tables with centerpieces and theme related items. Consider decorating the entry door, stage area and each corner of the room. Add Wonderland decor to the buffet table and dessert table.

Tasteful Elegance

Less is more. Do not clutter any area with an overabundance of 'Wonderland' decor. Choose whimsical items and tea party accessories to make the tables and stage come to life.

Which Way to Wonderland is a banquet event based on the classic story of Alice In Wonderland. Girls of all ages will relate to the fanciful tale and the nonsensical journey Alice experienced. Along the way, they will catch on to some interesting spiritual truths for Christian gals.

Everything in the room, from table decorations to displays to staging should revolve around the Merry Unbirthday-Mad Hatter Tea Party visual.

The most fun is when guests arrive and place their own treasures on their table or on a display table. The theme begins to come to life. "Oo's" and "ahh's" will be your reward as people move from place to place around the room to view the decorations and teacups.

TEACUPS: Ask guests to bring one special teacup for display. The cups may be from special heirloom collections, children's cups or modern teacups used every day.

TEAPOTS: It is also fun to ask guests to bring a special teapot from their own collection. Display teapots on a separate table to keep them safe. Provide small cards and print the owner's name to display near their teapot.

Tables

Count the number of tables that need centerpieces. Each table can be a bit different depending on items available. Consider colors and themes based on Alice's Adventure.

COLORS: Remind the group of Alice's sweet pale blue dress by covering all tables with pale blue fabric or plastic tablecloths. Her pinafore was white so white fabric or crochets doilies may be featured in the center of the table. Or, cover tables with colorful fabric to create a more whimsical theme.

CHAIRS: Most churches have standard chairs. This theme lends itself well to adding odd chairs here and there around the tables so people have to sit at different heights. Place a large armchair at the head of the table. Use what is available and fun.

HATS: Provide hats for guests to wear at the tables. Not every guest must wear a hat but it is fun to scatter a few throughout the room for willing participants. They can be old fashioned, silly, serious, light up...anything you can get donated will bring a laugh and enjoyment!

Centerpieces

A VERY MERRY UNBIRTHDAY: Celebrate an Unbirthday Party by making each table look like a whimsical tea party. One large wrapped box with lots of bows and ribbon can be featured in the middle of each table. The boxes can be empty or, if you want to be sneaky, put a small table gift inside each box to be opened by the lucky winner at each table at the end of the event. (*Place a mark under the chair or plate of the winning place at the table. Sshhh, keep it a secret!*)

One large teapot may be placed near the box and when guests add their teacups the table is complete.

CUPCAKE TOWER: Instead of a gift box, make a short tower of colorful cupcakes on crystal plates. If 8 people are at the table, place 8 cupcakes as the centerpiece. Each cupcake should have twine wrapped around it with a small printed sign attached stating: Eat Me! Or attach Eat Me to a toothpick with is stuck in the top of the cupcake.

Print small signs attached to twine and tied to water glasses that state: Drink Me!

KEY: Add one large key anywhere on the table...the bigger the better.

UNBIRTHDAY GIFT: Wrap a small box and top with a ribbon bow for each guest. Each plate should have their Unbirthday gift placed carefully on top when they arrive. Purchase party favors to place inside the box. www.orientaltrading.com Check out their choices!

Glass Table Top: Lay a mirror or clear glass in the middle of the table. Place a large clear glass bottle in the middle of the table labeled DRINK ME. Place a large cookie nearby with EAT ME printed on it. Add a large key to the scenario. Place one small wrapped gift on each plate at the table as an Unbirthday table gift.

ALICE IN WONDERLAND PAPER DOLLS: There are online web sites that have colorful paper dolls ready to print. What fun to make colored copies and use them as place mats.

CLOCKS: Place small clocks on the tables that are stopped at teatime.

www.papercraftprintable.com Is a good place to start your search.

TISSUE PAPER FLOWERS: An inexpensive party decoration that is so much prettier than streamers. Most people made these in elementary school but have forgotten how beautiful they are.

Supplies: tissue paper (an 8 sheet package will make 2-3 flowers, scissors, wire (floral or pipe cleaner work well).

See <u>www.ehow.com</u> "How to Make Tissue Paper Flowers" for a visual lesson.

Unfold the tissue paper. Take the 8 sheets and cut them in half (leave full size for bigger flowers). Now you have 16 sheets. Take 6 to 8 sheets and lay them on top of each other making sure all corners match up.

Fold tissue paper accordion style folding it over ½" to 1" then folding it back the other way. It should look like a fan when you open the folds.

To make rounded petals and a prettier flower, take a pair of scissors and round the edges at each end. To make petals that look like Dahlias cut a small slit in the middle of the round edges about 1" deep.

Tie the middle together with floral wire, pipe cleaners or twisty ties from your garbage bags. Keep in mind how you will be displaying them. Are they going to be tied to something or put in a vase or placed on top of a colorful birthday wrapped gift. If you are simply setting them on tables, a small piece of wire will do.

To open the flower, carefully separate the tissue layers. Make sure to separate the left and right side towards the center to make your flowers shape more apparent. Be very careful not to tear the tissue.

ALICE IN WONDERLAND ITEMS: Because this is a classic story theme, consider finding items to bring Alice to life. Check www.amazon.com and www.ebay.com to find a wonderful collection of hats: Mad Hatter, White Rabbit, Queen of Hearts, Tweedle Dum. They look wonderful as table centerpieces.

Amazon and other web sites sell the Cheshire cat, white rabbit and other characters from the story. There are many choices when it comes to finding Alice dolls. Ebay sells them and private online companies also have wonderful options to complete your decorations. There may be someone who has a doll that resembles Alice in your church or community. Ask!

People may have books they are willing to lend. Disney books are available. "Alice's Adventures In Wonderland" by Robert Sabula is a beautiful pop up book which can be featured on one table.

Fun Optional Props

CHESS PIECES: If available, place large chess pieces here and there in the room.

RED AND WHITE ROSES: Vases of roses with artistic paint brushes in the bouquets fit the Queen of Hearts theme and look great.

PLAYING CARDS: To represent the Queen's guards, scatter playing cards here and there.

FLAMINGOS: Display pink lawn flamingos on the stage or in corners of the room. <u>Www.orientaltrading.com</u> offers several choices of inflatable flamingos. They even offer fun flamingo sunglasses and straws. Check out their site!

MIRROR: If a huge mirror is available, place it near the entry so the guests must actually go "through the looking glass".

PLEASE PURCHASE Background Music

Quiet music is best while guests gather and enjoy conversation. Choose CD's that are easy listening, instrumental only.

Want a fun option? Purchase the Disney Original Soundtrack "Alice In Wonderland" at www.amazon.com or similar web site. There are 23 sound tracks from the animated movie that sound amazing for any event!

If local talent is available, ask a pianist, guitarist, harpist or other talented musician to provide live music through the dinner hour.

Art Supplies, Decorations, Small Gifts

Check out craft shops,, party stores, discount stores and rummage shops. Make table decorations, programs and table gifts. Check the internet for affordable items.

Door Prizes: Ask businesses and restaurants to donate gifts or gift cards. Buy small items like picture frames, note holders, lamps, cosmetic bags, pill organizers, tea cups, key chains, potted plants, candles, little dolls and costume jewelry.

Find inexpensive items that appeal to the feminine eye. Gifts are not necessary but often make the event special for those who attend.

If children are present, include charming toy gifts. The "Alice In Wonderland" theme is perfect for whimsical, colorful toys.

A Real Live 'Alice'

One fun option is to ask one person to become Alice for the evening. There are many great costume suggestions on various web sites. (Www.wikihow.com Try www.ebay.com Or, just Google information.)

Design a costume with items available: Buy or make a light blue dress. Tie or sew on a white pinafore apron. Optional: white pantaloons with lace edging. White nylons or tights, black flat shoes, long blond wig (if not a blond), Black hair band!

Alice may be one of the program speakers or she may be used for picture opportunities, moving from table to table and greeting the guests in character.



Table Cones

Here's an idea that may make your tables sparkle! Instead of wrapped Unbirthday gifts, make a paper cone that is wrapped with ribbon or twine, stamped with an 'Alice' character and filled with candy or a small gift. Tuck matching colorful tissue paper into the top of the cone to complete the look.



This quote may be printed inside the tip of the cone so it can be easily read as it rests on the table. If you cannot figure out how to print each piece of paper on an angle, print the quote, cut it out and glue it in the tip of each cone.

COLOR: All table cones should be the same color. It is effective to make the cones from brown paper, printed with rubber stamps in black and wrapped with brown twine and a bow or blue ribbon with a bow. Or, choose a pale blue with blue or black satin ribbon.

Consider crowd psychology. No one enjoys going to a party where everyone remains a stranger, little conversation occurs and a subdued mood becomes awkward. Everyone enjoys an event where people are talking and laughing, light and temperature are controlled, music sets the mood, strangers are just new friends and tables are inviting.

NOT FOR USE

When The First Person Arrives, The Party Has Started

Greet guests cordially, give them a name tag and direct them to the party area. If special items are on display, encourage guests to travel from spot to spot as the crowd gathers. They may look at table decorations. Help them chose a seat or find their assigned table and specific seat. Point out rest rooms and conveniences within the building. Keep guests out of the kitchen!!!



Get Acquainted

Put people at ease with smiles and hospitality. Help them get acquainted by providing simple table activities. Place conversation starters under each plate. Scatter pens or pencils at each table and place paper puzzles or short games in obvious places so guests can work together to win a table prize.

Getting Together

Help the guests "sense the whole". Enthusiastic group singing encourages togetherness. Play a few table games as ice breakers.

Small Groups

Place guests in small groups and offer opportunities to make more intimate contact with others. Devise an activity that could be done in pairs or fours. Dividing by birth months is an effective way of creating smaller groups across all lines: age, race, sex.

Alternate The Pace

Some activities may be interactive and some may be quiet. Provide some activities requiring a mental challenge with pencil and paper, and sometimes activities or quizzes for the whole group.

Build Toward A Conclusion

Complete a few exciting activities just before dinner and continue the fun after the meal.

Close With A Whole Group Activity

Do **not** end the evening with food. Instead, bring everyone together with a whole group activity. It could be singing, listening to a story, letting people tell what they enjoyed or an inspirational spiritual closing with a serious skit or talk, songs, hymns, praise choruses, sharing and a benediction featuring a fellowship prayer circle.

Clean Up

Leave the church much cleaner than you found it. Often those enjoying the fun are asked to help clean up. That can be fun and don't forget, "Many hands make light work".

Tip: Keep the music playing through clean up. Take a moment to sing and dance with other workers!



Welcome! Which Way Do We Go?

Welcome guests in a medium sized area where they are warmly greeted. Serve a delicious chilled punch. Make our recipe or serve your personal favorite beverage while coats are removed and table seating is confirmed.

Make this a delightfully formal treat by serving a delicious cold beverage in crystal punch bowls with crystal cups. Consider serving small appetizers on beautiful plates. Add color coordinated beverage napkins.

Cover the punch table with a pale blue table cloth. Add silk greenery and a small stuffed rabbit. Light white candles to complete the scene.

ALICE BLUE PUNCH

- 1 pkg. Unsweetened blue Kool Aide drink mix
- 1 (2 liter) bottle lemon-lime carbonated beverage
- 1 (64 oz.) Bottle white cranberry juice
- 8 scoops vanilla ice cream
- 1 Cup white sugar (or to taste)

Options: If you cannot find blue Kool Aide, use one jug of Blue Hawaiian Punch and white grape juice if the cranberry juice is not available. Sugar may not be needed if substituting sweet drinks.

In a large punch bowl, stir together the drink mix, lemon lime soda and white cranberry juice. Taste and stir in sugar to your liking. Float scoops of ice cream on the top. The ice cream melts somewhat and turns the punch a beautiful baby blue color with frothy white clouds floating on the top.

The menu is the most important detail of the banquet event. Choose food your group enjoys and will remember fondly! We make suggestions but you know your group best.

Plan Accordingly!

Use the Which Way To Wonderland' Theme!

Plan the menu and assign a kitchen team to prepare the meal. Since this is a special event for the gals, it doesn't seem fair to ask them to cook their own party food. Ask the men of the church to cook and serve or consider local caterers! Ask a local Boy Scout troop to help. They often look for community service projects.

What Should We Eat?

There are food choices that are delicious and appropriate. We'll give you a few ideas to get you started. Consider the cost, the theme, the effort involved to make the food and the tastes of the group.

Sometimes it is appropriate to design a separate menu for the children under age 12. If so, be sure to let people know the choices when they are making their reservations.

Think about various fun foods served in creative ways. Favors can be displayed in small Table Cones as discussed in the Decorating segment. Small candies like Hershey Kisses can be scattered across the table for easy access.

Beverages: Serve a variety of beverages and be sure to include a wide array of teas. Coffee, Milk, Cold Juice may be added as desired.







As groups arrive, encourage them to get to know one another by playing games provided on each table. Guests may team up to answer the questions.




Use games we suggest or find others to fill the need. Copy as many as desired on colorful paper.

Would you rather be stranded on an island with a survival expert who is a stranger OR your best friend?







Welcome to WHICH WAY TO WONDERLAND! It is our sincere desire that you delight in fun and whimsey as we bring the classic tale of "Alice In Wonderland" to life in our own unique, creative way. If you don't remember the story, we'll remind you with snippets of the story here and there. After all, it was a dream that happened long ago.

Sit tight! You are on your way to a grand adventure as we travel "Down The Rabbit Hole"! This is how Alice's story begins:

"Alice was beginning to get very tired of sitting by her sister on the bank and of having nothing to do. Once or twice she had peeped into the book her sister was reading but it had no pictures or conversations in it, "and what is the use of a book" thought Alice, "without pictures or conversations?"

"Suddenly a white rabbit with pink eyes ran close by her.... "Oh dear! I shall be too late!" She didn't think much of this... (when she thought it over afterwards, it occurred to her that she ought to have wondered at this, but at the time it all seemed quite natural) ...until he pulled a pocket watch out of his waistcoat pocket and popped down a large rabbit hole under the hedge.

"...Alice suddenly found herself falling down what seemed to be a very deep well. Either the hole was very deep or she fell very slowly for she had plenty of time to look about her. The sides of the hole were filled with cupboards and bookshelves...maps and pictures hung upon pegs





SPEAKER #2: Well, you 'counted' wrong. Did you bring your GPS?

SPEAKER #1: All I know is we're supposed to go down a rabbit hole. So, let's look for a rabbit.

SPEAKER #2: Nuh-uh, not me! I'm not following rabbits or going down any rabbit hole. You go down the rabbit hole and tell me all about it when you get back.

SPEAKER #1: Alice made it home okay and SHE went down the rabbit hole. I bet we can do it too. After all, at the bottom of the hole we will find Wonderland!

SPEAKER #2: Look at the directions on the sign post. That will show us how to get there!

SPEAKER #1: But the sign post also reads "Here", "There" and "Over There". I'm totally confused.

SPEAKER #2: Does this remind you of something we have talked about in church?

SPEAKER #1: Ohhh, you mean the day we talked about how to get to Heaven! We said people try every way they can think of to find the path to Heaven.

Tell Me About Wonderland! ~Just For Fun

SPEAKERS: A small group of children eagerly gather around one person dressed in crazy clothing. Everyone walks through the maze of guest tables, following the friend to the front of the room.

Friend: Dress in mismatched colors and wear a crazy hat. The children ask the questions. The friend (teen or adult) answers them...ham it up and become a person who may have spent time in Alice's Wonderland!

CHILD: What is Alice's Wonderland like?

FRIEND: Alice's Wonderland is a delightful place although visitors often find it puzzling and confusing at first. At least that's what the story says.

CHILD: What would be useful to know about Wonderland?

FRIEND: I am told that in other lands objects stay where you put them. Do not expect this to happen in Wonderland. Objects may vanish and then reappear in different places. You must be ALERT!

CHILD: Could you draw me a



map so I can go there?

FRIEND: It is not possible to draw a map of Wonderland, since the places do not join up in the usual way. You must be FLEXIBLE!

CHILD: Tell me about the animals in Wonderland!

FRIEND: As a general rule, assume that all animals can talk there. **Be POLITE!**

CHILD: Animals TALK? Do they do anything else?

FRIEND: Well, they might understand more than one language.

CHILD: I have never heard of anything like this. Are you sure Wonderland is a real true place?

SPEAKER: One older woman with a soft voice and sense of wonder reflecting on the world she has experienced as she reads parts of the story.

PROP: She holds a golden key to show the audience.

"Curiouser and Curiouser"! Do you remember Alice said that soon after she fell down the Rabbit Hole following the very late White Rabbit?

"There was not a moment to be lost, and away went Alice like the wind. She followed the Rabbit around a corner and found herself in a long, low hall. The Rabbit was nowhere to be seen. There were doors all around the hall, but each one was locked. 'How shall I ever get out?' Alice wondered."

I have often felt like I've been locked in a long hallway of troubles with no way out. Like Alice, I couldn't seem to come to terms with the world around me. It was an interesting place but also unnerving at times. The world around me was something I wanted to understand but it became 'curiouser and curiouser'.

PROPS: Miniature candy bars given to each runner at the end of the

COACH: (Blow whistle....) I need all Caucus Race runners to gather around for the pep talk. You know the routine! Come, come now. Hurry along. There is no time to waste in Wonderland. The pep talk is the best part of the race because you have to listen to ME!

You DO remember what a Caucus Race is, don't you? Maybe I should refresh your memories:

"As Alice scrambled onto the bank, she saw that the long hall with the glass table had vanished completely. The creatures gathering around her were all dripping wet, angry and uncomfortable.

SPEAKER #1: The rattling teacups would change to tinkling sheep bells and the Queen's cries would become the voice of the shepherd boy...


SPEAKER #2: And yet, as long as
