**Julie Benac** has been in the world of fiber arts since 2006, and has been in the cut & sew industry for over 30 years. She holds a degree in Fashion Design from Ray College of Design in Chicago (now a part of the Art Institute). Julie is a familiar face in sewing classrooms, as well as inner-city Detroit where she taught homeless mothers how to sew on industrial equipment. Now she is bringing fiber arts skills into the light, teaching carding and fiber prep, as well as artisan yarn spinning at various fiber festivals around the Midwest. Julie enjoys trying different ways to marry fiber arts with sewing to discover new directions in clothing accent and design. She lives on Lake Erie in southeast Michigan with her husband Patrick and three children...and a lot of weaving looms!



Kelly Brandt started on her wool craft odyssey in 1975 with four heritage horned Dorset sheep who came to her five acre homestead in Lake Odessa "just to keep the pasture down." As an accomplished seamstress, she first used her wool harvest in wool-filled comforters, but soon taught herself to locker hook, spin, and felt. She first got involved in FiberFest in Hastings in the early 1980s and has been teaching since 1985 in Michigan, Ohio, and Wisconsin. She is a published author and has won artistic awards for her work using wool and llama fiber from her flocks. Through her fiber based cottage business, Team Effort Artisans, Kelly has shown and sold fine wool craft at shows, galleries, and festivals. Case Runyan has been a fiber artist – knitter, spinner, pattern designer, weaver, dyer, processor – for 20 years, and is now the owner of Aoire Maith Fibre Studios, a small-scale fiber studio dedicated to helping promote the benefits of wool, working with small, local shepherds, and fostering the use and continued breeding of the endangered sheep breeds on The Livestock Conservancy's Shave Em to Save Em list (but really, she loves all the wool all the time). Case is dedicated to opening the fiber arts to everyone, offering affordable tools and techniques that can be practiced with ease and creating opportunities for anyone at any skill level to enjoy and make progress in the fiber arts.



Joan Sheridan is a weaver, knitter, spinner, fiber explorer and owner of Heritage Spinning and Weaving in Lake Orion Michigan since 2000. Trained as an educator and curriculum developer by the US Army, she is a natural teacher and leader. She attended College for Creative studies and graduated from Wayne State University. Since 2012, Joan has volunteered in The Henry Ford museums consternation department as a textile specialist. In 2020, Long Thread Media released a video of Joan's Turned Krokbragd on the Inkle class. She has taught at the Michigan League of Handweavers annual conferences, at guilds and fiber festival, and



at her shop in person and via Zoom. He has been published in Handwoven, Spin-Off, Ashford's The Wheel, Piecework, Little looms and other magazines.

Anette Skoog is a veterinarian, Gotland sheep breeder and professional Scandinavian skinnfell (sheepskin coverlets) maker. She learned the art of skinnfell making in her country of origin, Sweden, and has taught classes and exhibited her work in many locations in North America since moving to the USA in 2016. She has received recognition for her work at juried art and craft shows such as American Craft Council yearly show in Baltimore and Winter Park Art Festival in Orlando. Skoog has taught Scandinavian traditional handcraft at well known shows in the wool and fiber community including Maryland Sheep & Wool, Wisconsin



Sheep & Wool and Estes Park wool market. Anette left her corporate career in the pharmaceutical industry to establish a 500 sheep/200 cattle livestock operation and has bred Gotland Sheep for more than 15 years. Today, she and her family run a 100 ewe Gotland flock for meat, wool and pelt production and live on a farm in northwest Michigan. Annette's time is spent raising sheep, creating fiber arts and caring for the land on the family farm. She also competes on the national level in the sport of archery and has been ranked as top- 16th senior female recurve archer in USA 2020.

Her art and science backgrounds give her a keen understanding of learning and analyzing movement skills, composition, pattern recognition, and systematic exploration. She translates that understanding into practical approaches to spinning and knitting techniques. Having spent several past lives in other occupations—including bookseller, lawyer, and professional singer—Q now works fulltime towards earning her living as an artist and a creative. Q makes and sells one-of-a-kind art batts built from the Foldout Cat's unique Batt Buffet, featuring Merino wool, Angelina, bamboo, silks, and more. She also sells handspun yarn, hand-dyed microbatch yarn and fiber, finished fiber-arts items, and



simple fiber-arts tools. Q teaches freestyle weaving on approachable, easy-to-use two-harness floor looms;

art-batt carding on Howard Brush blending boards/hand cards and Strauch carders; and, basic exploratory spinning on her herd of wheels both analog and electric. She has taught, vended, or both at fiber events in multiple states, including Colorado, Kentucky, Indiana, Michigan, Mississippi, Missouri, North Carolina, Oregon, Tennessee, Texas, and Virginia. Q weaves, spins, dyes, and cards with the same philosophy that infuses her teaching: create from your heart and make what gives you joy!
