EMBRACING AWKWARD

TIPS FOR MAKING THE MOST OF A TOUGH CONVERSATION

While hard conversations are never fun, we promise that sitting down, getting on the same page, and finding a solution or compromise is well worth embracing the awkward for. Here are a few of our tips for making sure your conversation is productive, fair, and as comfortable as possible. And the best part? After you're done, you'll be able to move to the next task on your wedding planning to do list with a clear head!

SET YOURSELF UP FOR SUCCESS.

Instead of ambushing your parents/fiancé/future in-laws/whoever with a potentially sticky conversation, give them a little bit of notice so they can start thinking about that topic too. Choose a comfy space to chat, bring a snack to share, and kick off the conversation with one of our "break the ice" questions on page 13.

CHOOSE YOUR TOPIC!



IF YOU'RE TALKING ABOUT

FINANCES AND THE BUDGET

HAVE AN IDEA AHEAD OF TIME OF HOW MUCH YOU EXPECT YOUR WEDDING MIGHT COST AND

WHY (this will require some research about how much your venue and any must-have vendors charge, as well as your estimated guest count). Being prepared will make your conversation much more productive!

GO INTO THE CONVERSATION WITH A GRATEFUL

HEART. Be ready to accept whatever someone may want to contribute, no matter what the dollar amount is.

AVOID THE COMPARISON GAME. Few things will sour this conversation more than bringing up what parents contributed to sibling weddings, how much friends paid for their weddings, etc.



THE GUEST LIST

TALK WITH YOUR FIANCÉ AHEAD OF TIME about the size of your ideal wedding, and be aware of how many guests your ideal venue(s) hold.

TRY TO STICK TO "ALL OR NOTHING" TERMS when deciding on questions like kids, plus ones, etc. Being clear about something like an "adults only" reception is generally fairer and easier to communicate than trying to take situations on a case-by-case basis.

BE RESPECTFUL AND LISTEN to the reasons someone may want a certain person invited, but don't be afraid to be firm if you have a legitimate reason for not wanting that person at your wedding



IF YOU'RE TALKING ABOUT

DIFFICULT FAMILY DYNAMICS

BE PROACTIVE. If you're trying to manage people who don't get along, it's often best to be as accommodating as possible. It's better to tweak your seating chart now than have to worry about diffusing tension on the big day.

SEEK COUNSEL FROM PEOPLE (perhaps your parents or grandparents) who may understand different family dynamics better than you do, and heed any advice they have to offer.



WEDDING PRIORITIES

CHOOSE YOUR BATTLES. If you can let someone else have their way on a detail you don't care as much about, they may be more willing to support you about a decision that matters more to you.

fiancé agree that something or someone is particularly important to include, don't be afraid to (very gently!) put your foot down. This day is about the two of you, and it's important to make sure you end up with a celebration you're both truly happy with.

If you and your fiancé are having a hard time agreeing on priorities, remember, **IT'S HIS DAY, TOO**. He needs to feel just as comfortable with your vendors, decor, etc. as you do, and the more places you can find to represent him well, the better. See it as an opportunity to creatively combine your two unique styles into something even more special!



IF YOU'RE TALKING ABOUT

WHO TO INCLUDE IN YOUR WEDDING PARTY

Remember, **THERE ARE NO RULES** that say you have to invite someone into your wedding party just because you were part of theirs. Decide what is best for you and your beau and trust that the people who love you will understand.

BRAINSTORM OTHER ROLES special people can play in your wedding. How about readers, greeters, or ushers? A house party, one of our favorite Southern traditions, is one particularly sweet way to include lots of your favorite ladies in your big day.

In some cases, IT MAY BE WORTH IT TO INCLUDE SOMEONE than to exclude them and risk hurting your relationship long-term. This is especially the case if your fiancé wants you to include someone like his sister in your wedding party—look at it as the perfect opportunity to bond with her!

WHEN IN DOUBT, KEEP IT SMALL. Sticking to siblings-only wedding parties is a gentle and graceful way to avoid hurt feelings or confusion.



CONVERSATIONS TO BREAK THE ICE
