



ou're already busy juggling your jampacked schedule, but with the holidays just around the corner, you're bound to feel even more frazzled. If the added stress of shopping and socializing has you dreaming of an escape to a spa, take heart: A few simple additions to your bathroom can give you that wonderfully relaxed feeling right at home. "A spa bathroom is a sanctuary, a place where you can get away and catch your breatheven when you can't really get away," says Los Angeles interior designer Michael Berman. In fact, home luxury plumbing and spa fixtures have become a \$340 million industry, which Berman attributes to the country's rising stress levels. "Bathrooms are now dwelling areas, as finished as living rooms," he says. But it doesn't always take renovating to create your dream haven. Try a few of the ideas here and you can put your spa budget toward something—or someone else this year.

Turkish towels

Most high-end spas favor heavy cotton towels because they're extra plush and more absorbent. Each item in **Turkish Towels**' Spa collection (\$32 for a 34" x 66" bath sheet; *turkishtowels.com*) is made with 700 grams of cotton per square meter.

a bubbling bathtub mat

You love the feeling of soaking in a hot tub or whirlpool, but you don't have the funds—or the space—to put one in your house. Toss the Conair
Thermal Spa Bath Mat (\$120; conair.com) into your tub and save some cash. Its tiny bubbles ease tight muscles from your neck to your feet, and the remote control means you barely have to lift a finger to dial in a soothing soak.

A toasty hardwood urface is a luxury—espec

surface is a luxury—especially on chilly mornings-and if you're in the market to redo some old flooring, why not indulge? Contractors will lay down a fiberglass sheet woven with copper heating wire beneath your flooring surface of choice, such as stone, tile, or bamboo. Get a system with a timer so your toes get the warming treatment when you wake up. Expect to pay about \$400 to \$700 for a radiant system and control panel, plus another \$400 for installation (surface flooring is extra; warmlyyours.com).

5 color therapy

"Colored light patterns trigger different responses in the body, which can affect your energy, stress level, and mood," says Lea Eigard, owner of Lea Eigard Advanced Skincare in Beverly Hills. At the new Viceroy Anguillas spa, green LED lights are being built into lounge walls to enhance guests' relaxation experience. Red, on the other hand, can energize you enough to skip coffee in the morning, says Eigard. ThermaSol's Serenity Light & Music System (from \$1,599; thermasol .com) comes with red, blue, and green LED lights and

an FM radio for some

music therapy to boot.

"Low-level lighting is one of the
most important components of the spa
experience because
it immediately helps
to calm people

down when they enter," says Liz Ratcliff, corporate director of spa development for the Kor Hotel Group, which oversees Viceroy Hotel spas worldwide. If your bathroom is on the bright side, changing the mood is an easy fix: Just have an electrician install a dimmer switch. Contractors and designers favor Lutron's, which are available in a variety of styles from push-button to sliding switches (\$12 to \$40; available at Home Depot).

flowers and greenery

"Flowers play up the organic element of a spa environment by immediately connecting you to nature," says Shelby Taylor of the Spa at Four Seasons Hotel, in Westlake Village, California, where blossoms on treatment beds are always a finishing touch (orchids are the flower of choice). At home, a simple approach is best, says florist Van Huynh, owner of the Conservatory in Hollywood. He suggests floating single white These agate gardenia blossoms in bowls can double as shallow, square-cut soap dishes

Gardenias should last three days in a bowl

glass vases (4" x
4") and setting
them at each corner
of the tub. Or take
three stalks of largescale bamboo (about 3
inches each in diameter),
cut them at graduated
heights (5, 7, and 9 inches)
and stand them in a wide
square vase. Top each off
with a few stems of white
dendrobium orchid (or
another favorite flower) in

10 a steam
