2. Plain Tissue

Plain Tissue fabric is crafted by interlacing silk threads with shimmering metallic threads, giving it a shimmery texture. This fabric is lightweight and offers a subtle elegance with a lustrous appearance. The fabric will feel great against your skin, like a cool caress.

For those who prefer a less ostentatious look, plain tissue sarees or kurtas are ideal. Enhance your look with traditional accessories like jhumkas or bangles to add a splash of colour.

3. Embroidered Tissue

Taking the plain tissue a notch higher, embroidered tissue features intricate needlework on the shimmery base. The embroidery can range from floral patterns to geometric designs, often in vibrant colours that contrast beautifully with the base fabric.
