



A presumably unpublished 1965 manuscript detailing the foundational psychedelic and spiritual

experiences of hippie social activist Charlie Brown Artman (1939-1991). Writing in the first person, Artman colorfully recounts his experiments with peyote¹, LSD², marijuana, and other psychoactive drugs. Other topics include his early life and disillusionment with college³, arrests on drug-related charges⁴, thoughts on American drug laws⁵, and synthesis of various spiritual and mystical beliefs, including mentions of Subud, the Great White Brotherhood⁶, and Scientology.⁷ Also discussed at several points is Artman's belief that he lived a past life as a Native American.⁸ Throughout, Artman makes several references to a woman whose name he (mis)spells variously as "Chyril," "Shyril," and "Shril," which we believe refer to his then-girlfriend Sherrill Hodges.⁹

Altogether a unique and captivating document that sheds invaluable light on one of the more colorful personalities of the hippie era.


Though unsigned and undated, we strongly contend that this manuscript was written by Artman in 1965. The first leaf, which consists of numbered notes that constitute a sort of drug-biographical overview of Artman, opens with "[Circled 2] 26" which we believe refers to his age, thus dating the manuscript to 1965. This is corroborated by a reference on "C.B. 2" to Artman's first LSD trip: "First time LSD salt lake city 4 years ago, with the same girl who turned me on to pot." That would place Artman's Salt



Lake City visit in 1961, which matches the following timeline from a remembrance written by Joseph Bauman and published in the *Deseret News* after Artman's death in 1991:

"When I met him in 1961, that was in the [Salt Lake City] area that is now known as Reservoir Park," said [close friend John] MacPherson. "... He was sitting there playing on his autoharp, 'Life is Like a Mountain Railway,' which I found out later was his favorite song."

"Charlie Brown" had dropped in to visit a girl he'd met when he lived in Iowa."




This manuscript from the collection of

American cartoonist and science fiction writer Ray Nelson (1931-2022). Though unable to establish a clear link between Nelson and Artman, our conjecture is that they may have crossed paths socially in Berkeley, and further that Artman may have penned this manuscript specifically for Nelson; in discussing the consciousness-changing power of LSD on "C.B. 20," Artman writes "Your book is part of it." That reference is perhaps to the science-fiction novel Nelson was to co-write with Philip K. Dick, *The Ganymede Takeover*. Though not published until 1967, Nelson and Dick had been developing the book since 1964, and according to Nelson's own recollection had frequently brainstormed it with others during Bay Area social events. As to the manilla envelope with Playboy return address, we surmise that the manuscript may have been housed there as a matter of convenience; to imagine Nelson having submitted it to Playboy on Artman's behalf strains credulity, given the unedited and rather uneven quality of writing.



Born to a Methodist minister in Cedar Rapids, Iowa in 1939, Charlie "Brown" Artman briefly attended Cal Berkeley, where he was one of more than 700 students arrested as part of the Free Speech Movement. Having christened himself the "Boohoo of the Berkeley Bag," he was arrested again in 1965—the year of this manuscript—for his public declamations of foul language as part of the so-called Filthy Speech Movement. While in Berkeley, Artman also taught a class at the Free University titled "The New Age Consciousness and Various Paths to Enlightenment." Meanwhile, he had already begun his peripatetic

ways, traveling the country both by freight car and in a bus which he named "Yellow Submarine" and later "Temple of the Rainbow Path." In 1966, he released an album on Folkways Records, *Teton Tea Party with Charlie Brown*, which featured folk songs and anecdotes based on his travels. He spent much of the mid- to late-60s in Salt Lake City, where his counterculture lifestyle and outlandish garb (he frequently affected Native American clothing) both shocked and endeared him to the local population, and where despite constant harassment by the police he set up the Alameda Street Church, an outreach center and shelter for transient teenagers and poor. Surprisingly, given his iconoclastic tendencies, Artman found solace in the Mormon Church, and for well over a decade petitioned in vain to be baptized. By the 1980s, his whereabouts were unknown. Only in 1984 was he tracked down by *San Francisco Sunday Examiner & Chronicle* staff writer Lyn Ludlow, who found the 45-year-old Artman living on Supplemental Social Income and working towards an undergraduate degree in anthropology at the University of Florida in Gainesville; her profile of him in the first of her six part article, "The Free Speech revolutionaries, 20 years later," is one of the few




sources of information about his later life. In 1985, the Mormon Church finally agreed to baptize Artman, and, apparently having returned to the Bay Area, he spent the last six years of his life regularly attending services at the Oakland Temple. He died in 1991 of chronic hepatitis; according to the anecdotal report of a friend, cited in a remembrance of Artman in *The Daily Herald* of Provo, Utah, Artman contracted the disease from injecting heroin to prove to an addict that the natural high he got from meditation was as good as that of the drug.

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- ¹ "Wildest trip, the first peyote trip the most fantastic. I was here in Berkeley 21/2 years ago. Various hallucinations, sit in friend's car 4 in car I was only [one] high in the dim light I saw only eyes and fangs, but they were my friends so I wasn't afraid. I saw black things fleeing across the street and hiding under the cars. The cars were alive their grills were mouths and their headlights eyes, and they knew."
- ² "On an LSD trip, about this time, I got in touch with beings without bodies. I knew they had watched over and protected me in this lifetime, and it was for them I was working. They were silent, just watched and were there, and when help was needed, they would help. They were known only as "The Council.""
- ³ "I pretty much accepted the ways of my folks, mainly to avoid inner conflict. But things were never really right. So when I went to college and got away from home and didn't have to stay in agreement with it, I had an awakening, became disillusioned with the farce of college, so I took off to bum around the country. First place I ended up was the ranches, the Texas panhandle, working as a ranch hand."
- ⁴ "I spent 2 mo. in jail (I didn't pay any bail) It was a truly fantastic education. I had no conception of what it was like behind bars. I learned what a hellish thing society does when they put men in jail."
- ⁵ "I was able to see with the time I spent in jail that about 90% of those in jail used narcotics in some form or another. 25% of them were there on narcotics charges. Another 10% were there because of accessory crimes they had to commit to support a \$100 a wk. habit. I think LSD could serve as a substitute for addictive narcotics. In England one can buy a fix of H for about 18¢, at a clinic for addicts. Here a fix is \$10. The bottom would be cut from under a lot of organized crime and syndicalism in this country [if herion was de-criminalized]."
- ⁶ "Last summer when I traveled mostly by freights all over the country a girl in texas told me about the Great White Brotherhood, something to do with mysticism. This spring, when I was in FSM a guy came in who came on very strange. The question came into my head: "What does the Great White Brotherhood mean to you." He said, "Yes.""
- ⁷ "When I first got into Scientology one of my first past life memories was of being a wino freezing to death in the streets of St. Louis complete and total failure the end."
- ⁸ "I think my name in my last lifetime was "Peyote John." I was a member of the Native American Church. In fact, had been a road-chief, and had tried to carry the word and the healing power of peyote to the indians, but when I saw how the white man was taking everything from the indians that sort of blew my whole thing."
- ⁹ The following from an illuminating series of 1965 articles about Artman by Harris Vincent in *The Daily Utah Chronicle* (September 24, 1965): "Charlie is stopping over in Salt Lake on his way from Berkeley to Central Park. In New York he will be reunited in spiritual marriage to Miss Sherrill Hodges. She is an 18-year-old graduate student at the New School for Social Research. No legalities have been performed between them, nor will there be."

The text, set in black rectangles on versos only (with blank rectangles on facing pages), slips between psychological jargon, period drug-speak, and pragmatic plaintalk, instructing readers on the steps necessary to "turn off a particular device, the Gestalt Depressor" and thus allow themselves to exist in a self-directed state of permanent high. We have been unable to turn up any further information about Laverne, and are indeed





inclined to believe that his seeming absence from the historical record may stand as proof of the effectiveness of methodologies here laid out. At any rate, OCLC locates only a single holding of this mysterious and unusual work, at Howard University. **\$500.**





The Peace and Freedom Party originated in New York State, where candidates first appeared on ballots in 1966; in 1967 the party organized at



a national level. Its California chapter—the most successful, still active today—had registered enough members to qualify for ballot status by January 1968. Most of the present documents were issued in the immediate aftermath of that success, and offer a striking window into the party's early efforts to expand its base and nominate candidates for state ballots. Others lay out key positions, including the party's opposition to the Vietnam War, support of the Black Liberation movement, and concerns with issues of economic and environmental justice. From the collection of American cartoonist and science fiction author Radell "Ray" Faraday Nelson (1931-2022), best known for having co-authored The Ganymede Takeover (1967) with Philip K. Dick, a close friend of Nelson's from childhood.





A statement at the rear of the volume places explicit emphasis on the story's relationship to psychedelic drugs, calling it the same "kind of journey described by Aldous Huxley in The Doors of Perception," and making clear that the artistic genesis of the book was rooted in Schäfer and Cuz's post-war experiments with synthetic mescaline. Schäfer (1926-1991) was a German painter, poet,



and early enthusiast of the burgeoning psychedelics movement, having participated in




experiments with LSD-discoverer Albert Hofmann in the 1940s and 50s. Nan Cuz (1927-2019) was the chosen name of Irmgard Cuz Heinemann, a painter born in Guatamala to a German father and a Mayan mother; Schafer's first wife. The success of In the Kingdom of Mescal within the hippie subculture lead to Schäfer increasingly embracing his newfound role as a counterculture figurehead, ultimately driving a rift between he and Cuz, according to an account of their relationship in Guatemalan magazine Revue. The authors' inscription here is to Dr. Margaret Ann Storkan (1919-2000), an American dermatologist, whose relation to Schäfer and Cuz we have been unable to determine. Cage (1912-1992), as inscribed by him to American photographer and philanthropist Betty Freeman (1921-2009), who was noted for her extensive patronage of new musicians—Cage prominent among them. In addition to being one of his most generous financial supporters, Freeman and Cage enjoyed a close relationship for many decades, prompting him to write to her in a 1989 letter: "One of the great pleasures of my life is our friendship" (Silverman, Begin Again, p. 281). Cage first approached Freeman in 1964 while fundraising for his and Merce Cunningham's upcoming world tour, which Freeman agreed to help finance. That undertaking ended somewhat disastrously, with a number of Cunningham's dancers quitting mid-tour, and Cage returning to America at the end of the year to face a mountain of debt. His California tour of January 1965—during which he inscribed the present volume was in large part a fundraising endeavor to pay off those debts. Whether Freeman provided direct financial assistance at that time is unclear; that same year, however, she set up an annual grant to cover Cage's living expenses until his death. In 1977, she commissioned him to compose a series of solo etudes for violin, which he named the Freeman Etudes in her honor. A significant association copy marking a pivotal moment in the career of one of America's preeminent postmodern composers. \$1,500.



With five essays* elucidating various aspects of the scene, a section of headshots of notable figures (including David Wojnarowicz), and, principally, full-page profiles of the neighborhood's many art galleries, including

lists of their represented artists and a map at rear of their locations. Panned by the Village Voice on its release as a "high school yearbook with pictures of the cool kids,"

Hagenberg's guide now offers a revealing window into a vibrant cultural moment in the city's history. A second guide followed in 1986—apparently the only two produced. 


