

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




### 1. ARAI, Katsufusa. Closed Gas Station.







# 2. AZAR, Caroline, Jena von Brücker, G. B. Jones, Johnny Noxzema, and Rex [Boy]. Double Bill [Issue No. 1].

Toronto: Bitch Nation/S.K.A.G. 2000, [1991]. [28] pp. 8vo. Saddle-stapled in illustrated self-wrappers. Photocopied with drawings, comix, and photocollages throughout. Minor rubbing along spine, else fine.

First issue (of five total) of this Toronto queer fanzine-cum-hatezine, co-created by a number of that scene's most notable figures, including G. B. Jones, Jena von Brücker, and Johnny Noxzema. The zine was devoted to the simultaneous denigration





of American writer William Burroughs and the rather unexpected championing as queer hero of William Conrad, an American actor perhaps best known for playing the lead in mid-1970s detective television series Cannon. The zine opens with surprisingly earnest (given the subject matter) introductions by Brücker and Noxzema; thereafter comprised of various texts, drawings, comix, photo-collages, etc. The centerfold is a swastika-shaped board game called "Nowheresville," whose stated object is to "land exactly on the 'LAWRENCE, KANSAS' space at the heart of the swastika," which features an image of Burroughs's face. Scarce; OCLC locates only three libraries holding any issues. (Bronson and Aarons, Queer Zines, 2nd Ed., p.56). **\$350.** 





### 3. BARTHES, Roland, et al.

Wilhelm von Gloeden: interventi di Joseph Beuys, Michelangelo Pistoletta, Andy Warhol.

Naples, Italy: Amelio Editore, 1978. 59pp.; bibliography; sepia-toned photo reproductions and b&w illus. 4to. Signature-bound in glossy printed wraps. Barthes' introduction in French, Italian, and English; else all text in Italian. Binding a little stressed in the gutter between signatures at pp. 24/25. Moderate wear and softening at spine ends and tips. Light soiling to covers. Very good.

A selection of photographs by the German photographer Wilhelm von Gloeden (1856-1931), presented along with three distinctive "interventions" on his works by Joseph Beuys, Michelangelo Pistoletto, and Andy Warhol, and introduced by French cultural theorist Roland Barthes. Beuys contributes eight pencil drawings made on original postcards of Gloeden's architectural works; Pistoletta a single serigraph; and Warhol eleven charcoal line drawings of Gloeden nudes, presented opposite the corresponding photographs. **\$100.** 









Inscribed copy of this lavishly illustrated monograph covering the year-by-year artistic development of American abstract expressionist Helen Frankenthaler (1928-2011). With an illuminating study by longtime MOMA curator John Elderfield running throughout. An impressive and rather definitive work, uncommon signed. **\$1000.** 








Kyoto, Japan: Kyoto Shoin, 1989. [48]pp.; color illus. 4to. Glossy pictorial boards as issued without jacket. Quite minor bumping to rear board corners, else fine. With a laid-in promotional postcard listing current and forthcoming titles in the ArT Random series.

A lushly illustrated bookwork consisting of reproductions combining collaged elements with red and green gouache and black sumi ink. By the American pop artist Keith Haring (1958-1990), whose introduction outlines the





book's mode of production as being "about the mysteries of love, life, death, and art (not necessarily in that order)." Issued as No. 6 in the extensive ArT Random series, which according to the laid-in postcard was a "comprehensive attempt to represent the true energy, breadth and achievement of the world of contemporary art in the '80s." **\$125.**

# **10. HILL, Steve.** The Dicebox Family Album.

Laid in are a *TLS* in which Hill presents the book to a non-specified gallery and a copy of his CV, both folded twice horizontally and dated February 2, 1981.


A photobook, drenched with mordant deadpan, consisting of ten black-and-white images (plus title page) with accompanying captions. Though not explicitly stated, the titular family was a fictional creation. Hill, currently a New York-based photographer, recalls on his website: 'The book—semi-autobiographical—was my take on growing up in Midwestern suburbia. The name "Dicebox" was chosen more or less at random, and the people portraying the Diceboxes were actual family members.' Produced with the support of the Ohio Arts Council. Scarce both in the trade and institutionally; OCLC locates just five copies, including at MOMA and the Tate Library. **\$250** 





A collection of transcribed interviews conducted by electrical engineer Billy Klüver with eleven artists—Jim Dine, George Brecht, Jasper Johns, Roy Lichtenstein, John Wesley, Robert Watts, Tom Wesselmann, Andy Warhol, Claes Oldenburg, Jim Rosenquist, and Robert Rauschenberg—and originally issued as an LP in 1963 with cover art (here reproduced) by Andy Warhol. The record was issued to coincide with the Popular Image Exhibition at the Washington Gallery of Modern Art, April 18-June 2, 1963, in which all eleven artists featured. This book




version was published by Experiments in Art and Technology (E.A.T.), a non-profit facilitating collaborations between artists and engineers, which Klüver co-founded in 1966 with fellow engineer Fred Waldhauer and artists Robert Rauschenberg and Robert Whitman. A cassette tape of the interviews, referenced by Klüver in his introduction, was produced simultaneously with the book, although according to one anecdotal source in much smaller numbers. A scarce title both in the trade and institutionally; OCLC reports just three library holdings. **\$250.**



Book documenting an exhibit about censorship by American conceptual artist Joseph Kosuth (b. 1945). "Using artworks drawn from the permanent collection of The Brooklyn Museum, "The Play of the Unmentionable" showed graphically how public and institutional ideas of obscenity and artistic value have changed throughout history—and continue to change today" (front flap). \$225.





Light toning to newsprint, a few very short closed tears to fore-edge of center leaves, else fine; an unfolded and remarkably well preserved copy.

Articles include: "A Vote for Kusama," by R. Melvin Brandon; "They Said It Couldn't Be Done Or A Gay Guy Tries It Straight," by Richard; "Bringing Up the Rear," by Robert Pauls; "Million Dollar Pussy" by The Executive; "Kusama's 'Garden of Narcissus'," an unattributed article covering Kusama's iconic installation of mirror balls at the Venice Biennale, with quotes from Kusama; and "Premises" by Yayoi Kusama, a column in which she discusses the public resistance to her nude happenings, the importance of publicity to her work, and her reasons for adopting polka dots as a motif. With photoillustrations and advertisements throughout, and four pages of classified ads at rear.



Second issue of this sex tabloid-cum-artist's periodical headed by Japanese artist Yayoi Kusama (b. 1929) and published at the height of her early notoriety; a subversive appropriation of the Screw-style porn rags then proliferating in New York, with a clear link to Kusama's (frequently nude) public happenings of the time—among them the 1969 performance, *Grand Orgy to Awaken the Dead*, in which she commandeered the fountain in the MOMA sculpture garden and painted polka dots on the naked participants. Though Kusama's fame waned in the 1970s and 80s, in part due to mental-health struggles, her work has undergone an intense renaissance in recent decades; she is currently the world's top-selling female artist, with countless high-profile retrospectives and gallery shows, and a permanent museum in Tokyo dedicated entirely to her work. Original copies of this counterculture and art world document are scarce, particularly in such condition. Not to be confused with the 2001 reprint published by Les presses du réel. **\$3500.** 









Debut issue (of a reported two total) of this queer riff on Valerie Solanas's 1968 feminist tract S.C.U.M. (Society for Cutting Up Men), which rather than just men takes aim

at all heterosexual reproduction, stating as its goal the "absolute obliteration of what is generally regarded as the American nuclear family," through "violence, pornography, abortions, castration, mindless sex, mass murder, and the



widespread destruction of private and state property." At once a tongue-in-cheek critique of heteronormativity and a vile humorless screed, unabashed in its extreme positioning. Though uncited in the text, *S.C.A.B.* was edited by Toronto-based artist, filmmaker, and zine publisher Johnny Noxzema, who notably co-edited queer zine *Bimbox*. Scarce; OCLC locates a scant three holdings. (Bronson and Aarons, *Queer Zines*, 2nd Edition, p.204). **\$300.** 





### **20.** SZUKALSKI, [Stanislaw]. Inner Portraits.

Laid in are the following: five 8.5 x 11 in. illustrated color sheets advertising other books and prints published by Bray, including works by Szukalski; one postcard illustrated with Szukalski's "Threefaced Moscovite Hyenagog"; a TLS requesting additional "products and services," presumably a letter sent by the original owner to Bray; all in fine condition.

A selection of sculpted, painted, and drafted portraits by Szukalski (1893-1987), with anecdotes and observations from the Polish-born artist on facing pages. Subjects range from the world-historical (Boleslaw Chroby, Bertrand Russell), to the archetypal ("Cynic"), to the fantastic ("A Centaur"). The second volume of Szukalski's work (following 1980's Troughful of Pearls / Behold The Protong) published by noted comic art collector Glenn Bray, who has been one of Szukalski's most ardent promoters since befriending the artist in the 1970s, and who recently starred in the 2018 Netflix documentary Struggle: The Life and Lost Art in Szukalski. Though reprinted with additional content in 2000 and again in 2019, first editions of Inner Portraits are uncommon both in the trade and institutionally, with OCLC locating just five holdings of this privately-printed 1982 issue. This copy with additional advertising materials from Bray, as itemized above. **\$250.**







Frontispiece by Andy Warhol, else contents consist entirely of (mostly New York School) poetry, with contributions from Allen Ginsberg, Ruth Kraus, Bill Berkson and Frank O'Hara, Barbara Guest, Joseph Ceravolo, Daisy Aldan, Ron Padgett, Stan Brakhage, Ted Berrigan, Kenward Elmslie, Diane di Prima, Jackson Mac Low, Charles Bukowski, et al. Uncommon. **\$250.** 



An unusually tender and revealing presentation copy of this book-length poem, originally written in 1971 (the date given by the copyright page), but unpublished until 1978. Berrigan's inscription is to his sister Kathy (and her presumed husband). **\$450.** 





First edition of this important collection of verse by the Black American poet, a "poem in three parts" about the 1968 Chicago riots that took place in the wake of the assassination of Martin Luther King, Jr. Notably, Brooks' first work after leaving long-time publisher Harper for the Black-run Broadside Press. **\$300.**

The deluxe signed edition of this collection of mesostic poems, which Cage delivered as Harvard's Charles Eliot Northern Lectures in 1988-1989. One cassette documents Cage's reading of Mesostic IV, the other a Q&A section from one of his lectures. Nice copy. **\$750.**



Uncommon issue of this avant-garde journal, consisting entirely of the titular work, a long lyrical poem by French Surrealist Robert Desnos (1900-1945), as translated by New York School poet Lewis Warsh. The Ant's Forefoot


was founded and edited by David Rosenberg and closely aligned with Coach House Press in Toronto, where Rosenberg spent time living while fleeing U.S. draft-dodging charges. Rosenberg edited this issue in New York, having returned there after charges against him were dropped in 1971, though like prior issues it was printed by Coach House. **\$150** 






An important early book by American poet Alice Notley (b. 1945), notable, in its frank treatment of maternal and feminist themes, as a striking corrective to the largely male-dominated purview of New York School poetry. 








A unique presentation copy of the second book of visual poetry by New York experimental poet N. H. Pritchard (1939-1996), a figure associated variously with the Umbra, Black Arts and jazz poetry movements. *EECCHOOEESS* takes an even more committed approach than its predecessor, *The Matrix* (1970), to the revolutionary deconstruction of syntactic and linguistic norms, reveling in a free-play of space, shape, and sound—a poetics of "transrealism," as once described by Pritchard, here nicely augmented by his colorful additions.


According to a 1978 interview, Pritchard continued working on new manuscripts, though he never published another book after this. His work over subsequent decades fell into relative obscurity, before undergoing an intense revival in recent years. A facsimile edition of this title was reprinted by DABA Press in 2021. Pritchard's practice of hand-coloring copies of his works to present to friends and peers has been established, though examples of such are understandably scarce in the marketplace. The identity of this copy's inscribee has regrettably eluded our efforts of discovery.



As part of a broader revival of Pritchard's work in recent years, *The Matrix* was republished in 2021 by Ugly Duckling Presse, in conjunction with Primary Information. **\$1100.** 





Phillip Emmons Isaac Bonewits (1949-2010) was an American Neo-Druid who served in the 1970s as leader of the Reformed Druids of North America, and in 1984 founded Ar nDraiocht Fein, "a specifically neopagan form of druidism" (*Melton's Encyclopedia of American Religions*, 8th ed., p. 842). *Real Magic* was published when Bonewits was twenty-two, a year after he'd garnered certain fame by graduating from UC Berkeley with a degree in Magic. The inscribee of this copy, Allen Spraggett (1932-2022), was a Canadian writer and television host, noted for his works on matters occult and paranormal. conman by most accounts, was more likely trying to capitalize on his wife's significant wealth as the daughter of Sheraton Hotel founder Robert L. Moore). Moore today is perhaps best known for her advocacy of the dissociative anesthetic drug ketamine, which she felt might be the secret key to past-life recall, and which was the subject of her final book, *Journeys in the Bright World* (1978), co-authored with her fourth husband, Howard Alltounian. A heavy ketamine user, she died in 1979 under mysterious circumstances, having disappeared in the woods near her Washington-state home. **\$150.**

A later state first edition; meets all first printing points save the orange cloth, which marks it as part of the "remainder" impression noted by Higginson, *A Bibliography of the Writings of Robert Graves*, A42.

This copy of Graves' historical novel of intrigue in the Roman Empire is notable for its interesting ownership history, having once belonged to English schoolteacher Kenneth Keast (1908-1971). Keast is best known for his central role in the April 1936 international incident known as the "Black Forest Tragedy," in which a group of twenty-seven English schoolboys lead by Keast were stranded in a snowstorm on the Schauinsland, a mountain near Frieburg im Breisgau, Germany, leading to the deaths of five boys. Though Keast had been warned that weather conditions were rapidly deteriorating, he maintained for the rest of his life that an unpredictable atmospheric change had been at fault—a claim that the Nazi Regime, desperate to ease their strained relationship with England in advance of the upcoming Olympic Games in Berlin, were happy to amplify. In

fact, the tragedy provided the Nazis with a fertile propaganda opportunity; photos of Freiburg Hitler Youth standing vigil over the boys' coffins were quickly disseminated in both German and British newspapers. Only in 2016 did a full account of the incident come to light, based in large part on the research of German historian Bernd Hainmüller. Keast dated this copy of *I, Claudius* "31st August 1936," suggesting that he purchased the book just months after the tragedy, at a time when he was surely in need of distraction. One can't help but find a cruel irony in his bookplate, which depicts a man striding across a map of Europe with a pair of skis clasped over one shoulder and a guitar in his right hand. **\$300.**

Coming at the height of the "white flight" era, Jacobs' book staked out a radical and influential position in defense of the complexity of the urban environment. **\$500.**



Jansson's 1959 letter graciously answers a previous offer from Nelson to translate the Moomin strips into English, informing him that English-lettered versions of the strips already exist and are distributed by her agent at Associated Newspapers in London. She notes that they have tried to place the strip in American papers, "but with poor result," and informs him about the strips' publication in book form and the Moomin novels' publication in English. Nelson is perhaps best known for having co-authored the 1967 science fiction novel *The Ganymede Takeover* with Philip K. Dick, a close friend of his from childhood. Nelson's 1963 short story "Eight O'Clock in the Morning" was adapted by John Carpenter in 1988 for the film *They Live*. As Jansson's letter predates the books in this grouping (and presumably the newspaper clippings), it appears that Nelson enjoyed a continuing fascination with the Finnish writer and illustrator's most beloved creation. Individual items as follow:

1) Comet in Moominland, Finn Family Moomintroll, Exploits of Moominpapa, Moominsummer Madness, Moominland Midwinter, Tales From Moomin Valley, Moominpappa at Sea, Moominvalley in November. London: Puffin Books, 1961-1974. 8 vols., mass-market paperbacks with illustrated wrappers. Four first Puffin printings (Finn Family Moomintroll, Tales From Moomin Valley, Moominpappa at Sea, and Moominvalley in November), else reprints thus. All very good or better, with occasional light crimping and creasing to corners. 2) ALS from Jansson to Ray Nelson. Both sides with autograph text, dated "4.3.59." With several folds, corner creases and light toning. Good or better. 3) 139 newspaper clippings of Moomin comic strips. 28 in Norwegian and 121 in English (from UK papers), with penned at base of one of the English strips: "Ray - one or two missing. And probably not in order. Still, I hope they're ok. -Ron [or perhaps Ren?]." Norwegian strips folded vertically at center. All toned to varying degrees. Good to good very good. In legal-sized envelope, heavily creased, addressed to "Mr. Walter H. Nelson," with "Moomin" penciled on front and rear; rear also features two lines of a musical score in pencil. \$900.

# **61.** KÜBLER-ROSS, Elisabeth. On Death and Dying.

NY: Collier Books, 1970. Later printing. Xi, 289pp.; bibliography. Mass-market paperback. Near fine, with mild edge-wear and light textblock toning. Signed by Kübler-Ross to the half-title. Mounted to the front cover verso is an Elisabeth Kubler-Ross Center address label containing a gift inscription to original owner from a woman "Jean" who hopes that "one day you will be able to meet Elisabeth or attend a workshop." Reprint edition of Kübler-Ross's groundbreaking study, in which she outlines the five stages of grief; an uncommon title signed. **\$150.**

Founded as a nonprofit in 1969, Lollipop Power was one of the first feminist presses to produce children's books that cast gender nonconformity in a positive light. These early titles decidedly uncommon in the trade.

Chapel Hill, NC: Lollipop Power Inc., 1973. First edition. Perfect-bound in printed red wraps, 11 x 8-1/8 in. 45pp. Printed on orange paperstock, with b&w drawings throughout. Former owner's address stamp on front and rear covers and title page. Light fading and a small spot of damage to spine. Very good. A girl who finds a magic hat at the dump and erases a fence that prevents girls from playing with boys' toys and vice-versa. **\$50.** 

### **63. DE POIX, Carol; Stephanie Sove Ney, illus.** Jo, Flo and Yolanda.

Chapel Hill, NC: Lollipop Power Inc., 1973. First edition. 32pp.; b&w illus. Saddle-stapled in printed red wraps, 7 x 7 in. Former owner's address stamp on front and rear covers and title page, else fine. A normal day in the life of three sisters: their father makes them breakfast after their mother leaves for work; their older brother walks them to school, and later cooks them dinner; one sister wants to be an explorer, another a baseball player, the third a restaurant owner. **\$50.** 







Some light moisture rippling to base of rear cover and final few leaves. Very good. A female penguin ignores reprimands for her curiosity and rescues a wounded human scientist; themes of gender equity and radical empathy. **\$50.**

Chapel Hill, NC: Lollipop Power Inc., 1972. First edition. 28pp.; orange paper stock; b&w illus. Side-stapled in purple printed wraps, 8-3/8 x 11 in. Former owner's address stamp on front cover and title page. Mild fading to spine. Light bumping and curling to corners. Very good. A day in the life of a young boy who has an angry episode at school and later cooks dinner with his mother, who helps him process his feelings. **\$50.** 







### 66. LONG, Richard B. Married Women and Masturbation.

San Diego, CA: Late-Hour Library, 1969. 159pp. Mass-market paperback. Toning to textblock, else fine. A nicely preserved copy of this uncommon faux-sociological piece of smut concerning the onanistic practices of married women. OCLC locates two holdings, apparently both of a 1972 edition published by Greenleaf Classics. **\$50.** 

#### **67. LONG, Richard B.** Suburban Phallic Cults.


San Diego, CA: Late-Hour Library, 1969. 158pp. Mass-market paperback. Mild fading to spine; slight crease to top corner of rear cover. About near fine, with the expected toning to textblock. A series of first-person narratives, ostensibly written by an "anthropologist of note," documenting his decidedly unprofessional interviews with phallus-obsessed suburban housewives, who recount their sexual exploits in pornographic detail. Scarce smut; OCLC locates but a single holding, at UC Los Angeles. **\$50.** 

### **68. LONG, Richard B.** Young, Tender and Taboo.

San Diego, CA: Late-Hour Library, 1969. 157pp. Mass-market paperback. Very near fine, with toning to textblock, light bumping to base of spine. More faux-sociological smut, this on the decidedly uncomfortable subject of the "Lolita syndrome." OCLC locates a single holding, at UC Los Angeles. **\$50.** 

# **69. NIETZSCHE, Friedrich.** The Gay Science: With a Prelude in Rhymes and an Appendix of Songs.


Translated with commentary by Walter Kaufmann. NY: Random House, 1974. First edition. Xviii, 396pp.; index. Black cloth stamped in gilt on spine; dust jacket. Binding strained between two signatures at rear; mild scuffing to textblock top. Very good or better in a like jacket, unclipped ("\$10.00"), with toning white portions, a few tiny nicks and tears at spine ends, and a bookstore stamp at base of rear panel. Attractive copy of the uncommon first edition of Kaufmann's lauded translation of what Nietzsche called "the most personal of all my books." **\$300.**

Fine in a very near fine jacket, unclipped, with a touch of wear at spine ends. **Signed and inscribed** by Wildman on the half-title verso to an unknown recipient: "Mort, we are going in there with hammers and saws, and when the revised-again correction book comes out, only you and I will understand it. Thanks, Gene Wildman."
