
Ascending Qi Gives Rise to Earthly Harmony

2011 Autumn theme: The *I-Ching* on Feng Shui

The *I-Ching*, the *Book of Changes*, is said to have been created by the sage Fu Xi:

"In ancient times when Fu Xi ruled all under heaven, he looked upward and contemplated the images in the sky; he looked downward and contemplated the patterns on earth. He contemplated the marking of birds and beasts and their adaptations to the regions. He observed the changes of things near and far, he understood everything in nature; then he invented the eight trigrams to fully show the virtues of the deities and to classify the qualities of all things."

The *I-Ching* provides commentary on the *bagua*, or eight trigrams. But only the *I-Ching* of the early stages when the laws and content were much simpler.



The three basic principles of the I-Ching are: variability, simplicity and persistency.

Variability - everything in the universe is continually changing.

Simplicity - the fundamental law underlying everything in the universe is utterly plain and simple. some simple universal laws apply to various matters.

Persistency - while everything in the universe seems to be changing, among the changing tides there is a persistent principle, a central rule, which does not vary with space and time.

The entire universe, people, animals, plants and everything exist in *Taiji*, and in the change of Ying and Yang.



"I-Ching" was improved by Emperor Wen and called "Zhou I" during the Zhou Dynasty. It had the power of divination.

Confucius became the first person in the history of the *I-Ching* to decipher its contents at the end of the Zhou Dynasty (Spring and Autumn and Warring States Periods). After passing through Confucian view, the *I-Ching* became a philosophical text. Later, *I-Ching* scholars applied the text to the philosophy behind Traditional Chinese Medicine and it became the foundation for *qi gong* (a system of deep breathing exercise).

During the Qin Dynasty, Emperor Qin Shi Huang decreed all books to burn and scholars to bury. The *I-Ching* only survived because it was considered a book on divination and medicine.

People of the Han Dynasty advocated yin and yang and the five elements. They considered "balance" to be the most natural state in the universe. They also added yin, yang and the five elements to the foundation of the divination of hexagrams, as represented by key figure Jing Fang.



The *I-Ching* did not change in the remarkable culture of the Tang Dynasty, however both Song and Ming Dynasties were critical times for the *I-Ching* - it was during this time where two outstanding individuals appeared.

- 1. Scholar Shao Yong: greatly changed the traditional rules of divination. He proposed that "all things in the world though different share a similar phenomena". The "Plum Blossom Heart" method put forwards the idea of "Phenomena Produce Hexagrams" which is totally opposite to the traditional "Hexagrams Produce Phenomea". Shao is credited for reimagining the *I-Ching* and originating a new vision.
- 2. Zhu Xi: He paved the way for Neo-Confucianism during the Song and Ming Dynasties and developed a system of spiritual philosophical theory based in introspection. His influence is felt to this day.

Today, the *I-Ching* is more important than before.

"With preparedness comes success". This common idiom describes that only with preparation can one secure success and victory.



Understands the Rule of Nature, Understand All.

All things in this world are in constant flux. Thoughts are constantly evolving in an endlessly cycling world. The *I-Ching*, the *Book of Changes*, guides us to adapt to and grasp the myriad of changes in life - an illustration of ancient Chinese philosophy and view of the universe.

I-Ching is "Tao", the truth of consistency. It does not change with space or time. The "Xici Commentary" says "circle of life is simple, variable and persistent", the circle of life never ends. By learning the ways of heaven, earth and humans, we experience the beauty in life.

The *I-Ching* explores feng shui, the relationship between nature and humans. From a modern point of view, it is geophysics, environmental and landscape studies, eco-architecture, cosmology, aesthetics and meteorology in one.

Over seven thousand years ago, our ancestors discovered the laws of a good living environment, South-facing, backs on mountain, and surrounded by water.

For the past several thousand years, the Chinese also have strived for heaven, earth and people to coexist in harmony like the wind, like the water. How to survive? Our ancestors' priority.

Feng shui first appeared in the Fuxi Era; it was also called *kanyu*. It represents our ancestors' **observations of heaven and earth.**

Feng shui prevailed in ancient times. It was the key element guiding peoples' basic needs of **clothing, food, shelter and transportation**. What is the ideal way of life, the best feng shui in the minds of Chinese scholars?

With your back against the mountain, facing water, and close to a plain. Confined by hills left and right with welcoming hills in front of you.

In feng shui it is described as: green dragon to the left, white tiger to the right, red phoenix at the front and dark turtle to the back.

The ideal Chinese home is to be surrounded on three sides by mountains and by water on one side.

The mountains and hills offer protection and place the home in a favorable position.

Feng Shui and I-Ching

Feng shui is an important part of traditional Chinese culture. The core philosophy of feng shui comes from the *I-Ching*.

The *I-Ching* chronicles the relationship between heaven, earth and people. The idea of "heaven, earth and humans as one" is an ancient and formidable philosophy. Humans must coexist with heaven, earth, nature and all other living creatures to achieve harmony and balance. Comply with destiny and exist in peace for a life of happiness.

Both feng shui and *I-Ching* exist through careful observations of the natural environment. Adjust to nature to create a positive lifestyle and living environment. Achieve harmony between heaven, earth and people to reach a harmonious state.

Feng Shui and Qi


In the *Book of Burial*, an early source of feng shui doctrine, writer Guo Pu from the Eastern Jin Dynasty wrote: *Qi*, the Chinese notion of life force or energy, rides the wind and scatters but is retained when encountering water. So the ancient people accumulate qi by water, thus it is called feng shui.

According to feng shui, "*qi*" is the source of all life: the universe was born from *qi*, *qi* is omnipresent, all things are composed of *qi*, *qi* is ever-changing, *qi* determines human fortunes.

"From wind and water comes *qi*" - this is the core idea of feng shui. The theory and way of feng shui revolve around the critical idea of *qi*. Feng shui is the pursuit of "nurturing internal *qi*, creating external *qi* and the proliferation of internal and external *qi* for the creation of feng shui".

In the study of feng shui, *qi* is often referred to as "*qi* field, the field of energy". It is said that a certain place has good or poor *qi* field. What is "good" and what is "poor" is determined by more than the environment, it is also dependent on the people within the environment.

Qi field is an inner force; a powerful *qi* field is persuasive, irresistible and has the pull to guide the emotional climate and influence the mood of entire surroundings.



The internal human *qi* should be in harmony with the *qi* of the universe, heaven and earth.

A favorable *qi* field generates a positive force for the well-being of the human body and soul.

This Mid-Autumn Feng Shui series is the final act in LIULIGONGFANG's three part Classic Sinology Annual Theme.


Inspired by "qi", LIULIGONGFANG utilizes each stream of LIULI reverberates with the changes of life and elements of nature;

- 1. A cabbage with leaves layered and curled, bold and supple, green and lush; perched on the cabbage is a lifelike cricket. Nature is generous, its life force inextinguishable, this is a harmonious and wondrous world.
- 2. An ample cabbage with high polish bottom, the design as a whole recalls the shape of *taiji* truth and falsity, yin and yang; the hollow in the design represents the harmony and fulfillment of life. In entirety and in harmony, catch a glimpse of the multifaceted universe through the central opening.
- 3. LIULI flows through the roots to represent upward flowing *qi*. Vital and robust, they extend up to the heavens. This is a rich life force, an inextinguishable energy.
- 4. The design draws from a seemingly remarkable and common "cabbage". "Inactivity, non-competitive, non-greedy, content" describes a tranquil and everyday mindset; obtain extraordinary awakening through everyday objects.
- 5. Color is strategically applied to the limpid veins and crisp green of the cabbage leaves, the delicate roots and the spirited cricket, all create a multifaceted effect.
- 6. "Cabbage" is homonymous with "fortune"; it represents auspiciousness.

- 1. This piece is the special advance ordering piece to be released from the feng shui series. Two radishes, one big one small, leaves teeming with outstretched veins, roots reaching deep into the earth. Hardy roots absorb oxygen until its leaves break through the surface. Summoning the wind and spreading its leaves, it sings a song of a prosperous harvest.
- 2. The design portrays the radish at the time of maturity. In profile, each part and detail of the radish is displayed in complete and intricate fashion. Our sight is drawn deep into the depths of the soil, giving us a glimpse into life's greatest mystery.
- 3. The radish root and leaves form a perfect combination. Its beauty is an ode to the magnificent beauty of life. A gift from heaven and earth, the radish reminds us that sometimes life's simplest pleasures are the most remarkable.
- 4. Robust and hardy, the plump radish contains the *qi* of happiness and fortune. Place it in the home to receive the wonders of the natural world and all its *qi* with the most positive and fulfilled attitude.
- 5. The radish is commonly referred to as "cai tou", homonymous with "luck". Good luck begets great fortune.



- 1. This design shows a joyous and animated lion playing with *ruyi*, a modern take on the traditional image of the lion. In Mandarin, "lion" is homonymous with "matter". Introducing the element of "*ruyi*" symbolizes that all matters go well and the perpetual happiness. The complete circle alludes to the perpetual flow of *qi* and the abundance of strength; it is an offering of unparalleled encouragement and support.
- 2. The lion is animated and relaxed. From afar he appears spirited and mighty, up close he is charmingly innocent; he is the bearer of happiness.
- 3. The lion's tail curls up its back, his fur blows in the wind. Protector of great heights, he is prepared for anything. With wide eyes, a broad nose, and a wide open mouth, the lion is playful and assured, relaxed yet curious.
- 4. The lion has always been an auspicious symbol for the people and an auspicious beast according to Feng Shui. Representing the attainment of wishes, he is a warder of evil and bearer of fortune. Our ancestors believed the lion to be the king of all beasts and protector of all. This is why stone lions are often placed at the entrances of homes. He asserts his might while symbolizing fortune and authority.
- 5. It is fitting to place "Frolicking Lion Welcomes Auspiciousness" upon the office table. This placement represents attracting auspicious *qi* from all direction.

- 1. "Ambition" depicts a bamboo segment. The design creatively creates a landscape within the segment with separate views inside and outside.
- 2. Not only is the design visually inventive, the two views overflow with the sentiment of "doing good for the human heart and soul". The large outer notch of the bamboo and the lush inner landscape embodies a robust life force. Neither overwhelming nor too sparse, the exquisite and unique design recalls a scene from a bamboo garden, similar to the effect of classic Chinese painting.
- 3. New bamboo grows from the notch to represent confidence and assurance, abundant internal wisdom and open-mindedness. The bamboo is a formidable plant. It grows fast and endlessly upward, recalling the idea from feng shui that "ascending *qi* gives rise to earthly harmony".
- 4. Our ancestors considered bamboo to be one of the "Four Gentlemen" and one of the "Three Friends of Winter". Placed in the study or office, it serves as a reminder and elevates self-cultivation.
- 5. From the perspective of feng shui, the bamboo is of wise and exceptional character. The *qi* of wisdom will enter wherever bamboo is found. Its lush branches and leaves invite the *qi* of nature to instill the environs with culture. All is auspicious and harmonious, vibrant and dynamic; be confident and you will succeed.



- 1. "The Best View" combines the tortoise with an ammolite shell to fascinating effect. The upward climbing tortoise is filled with joy and narrative; the design itself reveals the designer's creativity.
- 2. One tortoise waits at the top with its head turned back to wait for the other.

 Collaboratively climbing, they are the perfect illustration of "partners" working together.

 The design also illustrates successfully reaching the peak where the best views can be found. Success is achieved through ascending confidence and a positive attitude.
- 3. Our ancestors considered the tortoise to be one of the four great beasts. It is representative of benevolence, longevity and auspiciousness.
- 4. Most people refer to the ammolite shell or ammolite stone as a fossilized conch. It is believed to have absorbed the essence and energy of this great universe and thus possesses extraordinary healing capabilities. In Feng Shui, it balances the five elements of metal, wood, water, fire and earth within humans and regulates the flow of qi to make one feel at ease. It can expel the toxins within the body and turn negative energy positive. An excellent amulet and auspicious object, it has the power to absorb fortune and contain it within its coils.
- 5. The combination of ammolite with the tortoise have the power to affect more people and to create a strong positive environment in life and work. Wealth and career are increased, returns are increased. "The Best View" is a fitting gift for a business partner or friend. It stresses opportunity, endurance and a prosperous and expansive future.

- 1. Riding in on a wave between heaven and earth is the dragon turtle. Although waves rush in, it remains calm and collected. With grand spirit, its influence is felt for miles.
- 2. Waves of golden red, a heavenly dragon turtle in amber, a depiction of magnificence and ease. The enterprising dragon tortoise sets its sights to the heavens and pursues the extraordinary in life.
- 3. Surging waves representing fulfillment form a semi-circle. Contained within is strength, the spirit of heaven and earth and the life force of all living creatures; it also symbolizes the fulfillment in life.
- 4. The design is the shape of a "yuan bao" or sycee. Golden red waves morph into copper coins; the dragon tortoise stands guard upon his fortune, symbolic of an eternity of fortune.
- 5. The dragon tortoise is an auspicious beast for Chinese. In feng shui it has the ability to ward against and dispel evil, contain the home and accumulate wealth; it also symbolizes authority and longevity. In Mandarin, "dragon tortoise" is homonymous with "prosperously return home" and represents a glorious homecoming. Give this to those striking out on their own to aid them in their prospects, to wish them great fortune and honor.

- 1. From the front, "Happiness Comes with Up-flowing Qi" shows an animated goldfish swimming leisurely and free. Appearing to leap out of the water, the intaglio fish is obscured by LIULI. As light fluctuates, the fish travels in and out of visibility.
- 2. The tail of the protruding goldfish flips energetically upward in lifelike rendering; refracted light passing through transparent LIULI crates a wavelike effect. Fluctuating LIULI streams drift freely like waterweed, concealing a gracefully swimming goldfish. Side by side, the elements complement each other and reveal the cleverness of the design.
- 3. A circle with a sloped opening for the acquisition of *qi* alludes to flowing water. The seamless marriage of the two goldfish and the circle is emphasized by the carefree and tranquil movement of the waves. An ample circle, the *taiji* shape conveys auspicious harmony, collecting *qi* and receiving fortune and an abundance of well-wishes. The cycle of heaven and earth, the elements of yin and yang, a life full of gold and jade.
- 4. The visual illusion creates the effect of real and virtual fish. From the front, the design shows a protruding goldfish; from the back, the goldfish is in intaglio. The two fish are separated by circular waves; they appear to be both independent and mirror images of each other. This illustrates the philosophy of the coexistence of yin and yang.
- 5. The goldfish is an auspicious symbol in Chinese culture. In Mandarin, it is homonymous with "gold jade" and for this propitious coincidence, popular with the people for its allusion to prosperity. Place this in your living room or within your place of business to invite security and ease.

- 1. In Chinese tradition the bamboo symbolizes vitality, longevity and happiness. "Endless Steps of Luck" takes a bamboo segment and creatively twists it into a semi-circle; the spanning design goes above and beyond to represent the idea of "flowing fortune".
- 2. The semi-circle bamboo breaks through our traditional notion and image of the plant. It conveys the idea of "growing outward", perpetuating life force and inspiration. The circular backdrop in "Endless Steps of Luck" emphasizes the spirit of the bamboo: it is all-encompassing, it is full of wisdom and more importantly, it is the genial and open-minded character of a true gentleman.
- 3. A circle is aggregation and integration, combined with a bamboo, it is as if the very essence of this great earth was assembled. Breaking through the dirt, the bamboo grows tall notch by notch, a metaphor for the resilience of life. By modern definition, it represents the virtue of being a genial and open-minded person.
- 4. From a feng shui perspective, a circle and a bamboo of fortune amass the *qi* of fortune and the *qi* of a wise gentleman; it is everlasting and perpetual.



- 1. Two lions, one big and one small, holding either end of the same ribbon with their feet resting upon a colorful ball. Their vivid and animated movements are caught in freeze frame.
- 2. The lion is the auspicious beast of the household in traditional Chinese culture. It embodies all mythical beasts and invites auspicious *qi*. Majestic stone lions have guarded our entryways since ancient time; in feng shui the lion has the ability to ward against and dispel evil.
- 3. The lion represents honor, authority and status. In mandarin, lion sounds similar to the term for "high official" used during imperial times. Here the lion becomes a metaphor for a professional promotion.
- 4. The lion is the king of all spiritual beasts, he amasses spiritual *qi* from heaven, earth and all living creatures. Two lions one big one small, one static one animated a perfect contradiction. The two lions also represent two generations, a metaphor for perpetuity.
- 5. The flowing ribbon appears as the number "8" because eight in Mandarin is homonymous with the character for "prosper". This alludes to fortune, auspiciousness and a deluge of wealth.



- 1. Flowers bloom for everlasting *ruyi*. A flower and a pair of birds are the three key elements of the design. Ruyi means "as one wishes"; the open design introduces the feng shui philosophy of accumulating *qi*. A constant cycle of *qi*, flowers bloom signaling fortune, all is beautiful.
- 2. A pair of birds: the bird on the top branch gazes down at its partner with deep sentiment. Home is wherever you are, my world is only perfect because of you.
- 3. The two circles in the design complement each other in congruity. Harmonious and all-encompassing, it represents the way Chinese people conduct themselves. The placement of the two circles also alludes to the number "8", a symbol of immeasurable fortune. Accumulating within, the consistent cycle of *qi* rises and escalates. This piece wishes for everlasting love, happiness in the home and a beautiful and harmonious life.
- 4. The magnolia is lightly fragrant and elegant. Flowers bloom for everlasting *ruyi* symbolizing peace, happiness and good fortune; flowers contain all that is good in this world.
- 5. Good blooms bloom often for frequent good tidings. Continually accumulate the *qi* of happiness and fulfillment by placing this design in your home.





- 1. Crisp green leaves, a ripe and full body; roots stretch silently into the earth accumulating life, waiting for the day when it breaks through the ground. *Qi* spreads through the veins of outstretched leaves, amassing in the body, robust and deep, waiting for the moment of maturity when it breaks through the ground.
- 2. The veins in the radish leaves are visible on the surface, its roots burrow deep below the earth. "Tomorrow is Mine" is a true depiction of the radish. Its radish leaves appear in crisp green through a precise color placement technique and the body appears concealed within a transparent LIULI block through the intaglio technique. Negative and positive, the co-existence of reality and illusion.
- 3. Without strife, without haste, the formation of the root vegetable is a transformative process created through unwavering courage. It represents the confidence buried deep within yourself and a resolute force; it is a relaxed confidence when facing the future.
- 4. The intaglio radish is buried deep within the earth; subtle, it exhibits a wordless beauty. It conducts itself like a gentleman, humble and compassionate, present but never overexposed. In the *I-Ching*, the *qian hexagram* says: conducting oneself and all matters with modesty (*qian*) and respect (*jin*), the outcome will always be auspicious and favorable.

Note: *qian hexagram* is the only hexagram of the 64 diagrams, whose 6 lines are all favorable, thus it conveys auspiciousness,

Accumulate

The Perfect Season

A year of great prosperity,

- 1. The fruit depicted in "The Perfect Season" is the loquat. The fruit of the loquat tree is often used medicinally and is said to have soothing and demulcent properties. It is also said to direct and increase the flow of *qi*.
- 2. In using the loquat as the key design element, we hope to introduce the *qi* of ease and harmony to people's emotions and environment.
- 3. Ripe fruit form a circle to represent courtesy and respect. From a feng shui perspective, it means "greater concealment"; flowing *qi* creates an enclosure of positive *qi*; the fruit also appear to surround a prosperous harvest, bringing even more fulfilled *qi*.
- 4. "The Perfect Season" represents a monetary profit as well as a spiritual and environmental profit. Place this piece in the fortune area of your home or place of business in order to increase the *qi* of profitability. When *qi* flows with ease, everything else will naturally follow.

Doorway

A critical location through which *qi* enters. The entryway can pacify the *qi* and spirit of one who enters. The right or wrong decor has a direct influence on the inhabitants' feng shui.

Key phrases: welcome qi, obstruct evil

The entryway is the first spot when entering a home. Do not store too many objects in this space, we recommend the hanging of larger objects and the placement of smaller objects in a plate, dish or basket. Objects should not lay scattered.

Placing plants at the doorway greenifies the indoor environment and increase qi.

Living Room

The key public space of a home, the area where the entire family convenes and where guests are received. The feng shui of the living room affects the luck of the entire home. The placement of the living room is vital, in traditional feng shui it was referred to as the "fortune area".

Key phrases: communication, welcome qi, summon qi

Placed in the living room, a fish tank or bonsai serves the purpose of receiving *qi*, thus increasing the energy within the home.

The living room is where friends and family congregate thus it is where a lively and amicable environment must be created. The addition of a circle can create an amiable and animated atmosphere because the circle represents positivity and dynamism.



Bedroom

The bedroom is a space for resting and nurturing the body and spirit. An average human spends 1/3 of their lives in the bedroom. Create a tranquil, inviting and harmonious sleeping environment.

Key phrases: emotion, rest, conceal wind and accumulate qi

Study

The study is a space for reading, writing and studying; it is a space for nurturing the mind. It holds an important role in the home.

Key phrases: wisdom, career, accumulate qi, summon qi

In a study set up specifically for children, attention should be placed on the wen chang (the god of examination for public service position and education) position as study and work is governed by the wen chang god and the related star. In a study set up for adults, attention should be placed on the professional and fortune areas in order to create a study conducive to one's profession and fortune.

Color: the study should be primarily in green and supplemented by oranges and browns. This is mainly because the five phases of the wen chang star belong to the wood element. The usage of these colors further enhances the star.

Office

Does the feng shui of an office have any influence on wealth? A public officer or professional tradesperson may have excellent qualifications but if their "public luck" and "wealth luck" are weak, it makes them no better than the next person. This is how the saying, "a hero without luck can not save himself." This is why an office in the correct location has the ability to influence situations and lead to accurate judgment and professional success.

Key words: ease, success, welcome qi, accumulate qi, summon qi

Colors: pure blue, vibrant gold, etc...

Position: objects depicting mountains and water or a landscape painting; lean your back against the mountain with water flowing beside you.

Luck: an abundance of sunlight, no mirrors.

Affinity: large leafy plants

The feng shui layout of the office differs from the rest of the house. The office should recognize the authority of its inhabitant and corporate culture. It should be conducive to strategic implementation and advantageous to business negotiations. Furniture, artwork and accessories must be chosen to reflect sophisticated and authority.

With a small mouth, all is absorbed.

It is Fortune

The word for *hulu* gourd is homonymous with "fortune"; the phrase for "ten of thousands of centuries" is homonymous with the word for a leaf's veins. This piece represents fortune, auspiciousness and longevity. Together, the *hulu* gourd and its leaves are called "generations of generations".

It is Prosperity

A small opening with a large reserve, a metaphor for the accumulation of wealth. Place it in your fortune area; once wealth enters the copper *hulu*, it is unlikely to flow out. The accumulation of wealth and fortune is the gourd's forte.

Be Healthy

It is the instrument in which doctors used to carry their "miracle medicines". In classic Chinese Taoism, the *hulu* was known for its retentive qualities and was believed to have the ability to amass *qi* - the essential energy. This is how the *hulu* came to hold medicines.

Come Fortune

The curves of the *hulu* form an "S" like the delineation between yin and yang in the *taiji* symbol. The ancient Chinese believed the *hulu* could ward off ghosts and evil so began the custom of hanging a gourd at the front and back of the house. Contain the positive energy within, dispel the negative energy away, restoring the balance and unblemished original state.

Emotions Convene

A perfectly round exterior represents harmony and fulfillment. Although small, the gourd can help enhance the emotions between the couple.

Green LIULI - ensures safety, harmony and happiness in life;

It is conducive to establishing positive relationships, bolstering courage and dissolving the malicious and deplorable thoughts of others. It possesses great cleansing qualities and can soothe toothaches and respiratory issues. It is suitable for those who travel often for business or pleasure.



Purple LIULI - elevates EQ and IQ. It represents elegance, refinement and progress; it is conducive to improving one's existing state of being and increasing confidence levels. It has the ability to dispel negative thoughts and protects the pulmonary system. Its properties can offer assistance in matters of the heart or professional situations and can be presented to celebrate an engagement or business promotion.



Clear LIULI - protector of the body and home, increases energy and vitality, maintains a positive attitude; represents purity, freshness and a relaxed attitude. Warder of evil, it has the ability to disperse the negative energy in one's immediate environment. It lessens the possibility of bodily harm and preserves a positive attitude. As protector of the body, no disease may intrude; as a protector of the home, no malevolence may enter. It is a fount that has the ability to bring fortune and happiness to one's life.



Blue LIULI - gatherer of fortune, bearer of luck, it represents freshness, tranquility and comfort; it has the ability to lessen pressure, balance emotions, elevating one's character and aid in creating friendships. It possesses healing properties for the joints, kidneys and can cure headaches. Suitable for all who need good luck.



Amber LIULI - symbolizes authority and wealth. It is bright, warm and innovative; it has the ability to encourage one's innate authority and increase one's decisiveness. It is highly relevant to the success of one's professional career and can improve one's nerve system. Suitable for those striving professionally and those yearning for success.
