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# Paper Stars

## What You Need:

- Kite or translucent paper
- Glue
- Scissors


## What You Do:

Cut the paper into 4" x 4" x 4" triangles.

- 1. Mark the center of each triangle.
- 2. Fold the first point up to the center of the opposite edge. Repeat for the other two points. Open the triangle.
- 3. Fold the first point up and then crease it down at the center point. Repeat for the other two points.



4. Tuck the left side of the bottom triangle under the right side of the point to the left.

- Thread
- 25 paper stars

#### What You Do:

Make a list of 25 holiday activities (see our ideas below.) Cut out each activity and fold it small enough to fit into a paper star. Using the needle and thread, hang each star from the tree branch. Remove one star a day and perform the enclosed activity. Refold the

# Pinecone Elves or Gnomes

## What You Need:

- Pine cones
- Scissors
- Felt pieces (for accessories)
- Wooden beads (various sizes for elf head and gnome nose)
- Wool (for beard)
- Cardboard pieces
- Embroidery thread or cord
- Glue gun or craft glue



Cut out felt pieces for the mittens, hats, scarves, and feet.

Make the hat by forming the triangle into a cone; sew (or glue) the straight edges together. Use the end of a paintbrush to turn the cone inside out.

For an elf - glue the wooden bead (hole side down) to the pinecone.

Glue the accessories into place. If you want your elf to have eyes, use a permanent marker and draw eyes on the wooden bead.



For a gnome - glue the wool beard on the pinecone. Glue the wooden bead (nose) in place before finally securing the hat.



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# **Christmas Gnome Family**

## What You Need:

- Felt pieces
- Felted wool
- Scrap material
- Dry rice
- · Bead or seed for nose
- Glue gun, scissors, small elastics, or embroidery floss

## What You Do:

Hat: cut a triangle out of felt. Create a cone and glue the ends together. The hat should be a little longer in the back where the points meet.



Body: cut a circle (a cereal bowl is an excellent size) out of the scrap fabric. Place rice in the center of the circle and gather the sides to create a pouch. Tie or band the pouch closed.

Beard/Braids: glue the wool onto the body in the shape of a beard or create two braids and glue them onto the sides of the body.

Decide how you want your gnome's hat to sit before securing the nose. Glue on the nose. Finally, glue the hat!



"Drink," said the old Gnome to the Seedling. "This pure, clear Little Drop of Water will help you to grow."

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
"I will carry him up to the beautiful Sun," answered Little Wheat Sprout.
