A seminal work on the anthropology, geography and natural history of the Pacific, by the naturalist on the *Resolution*. Originally intended for publication with Cook's official account of the second voyage, it forms an important supplement to those volumes. \$2000-3000

Quarto, frontispiece portrait, engraved title with vignette, 6 folding charts and 47 plates, advertisement leaf at end; contemporary tree calf, spine panelled with gilt ornaments. First edition, a fine, clean copy in a finely preserved contemporary binding: rare thus. The title-page is in the first state with the medallion vignette including the name of the artist, Henry Webber. \$8000-10,000

WITH A LETTER FROM BANKS

100F [WILSON, William]. A missionary voyage to the Southern Pacific Ocean, performed in the years 1796, 1797, 1798, in the Ship Duff, commanded by Captain James Wilson. Compiled from the journals of the officers and missionaries . . . With a preliminary discourse on the geography and history of the South Sea Islands, and an appendix, including details never before published, of the natural and civil state of Otaheite. London, S. Gosnell for T. Chapman, 1799. Quarto, 7 charts (5 folding) and 7 plates; uncut in the original boards with printed label, folding quarter morocco box. Joints a little weakened but cords sound, backstrip and label largely intact: an exceptional copy.

First edition: the second, from an entirely different setting, was published in the same year in a smaller quarto format and with the large chart of the Fijis reduced.

This was the first missionary voyage to the Pacific, with the object of establishing a settlement at Tahiti. The seventeen missionaries who arrived there in 1797 met with continual difficulties because of civil war and were eventually forced to flee to Sydney, though some later returned.

With, loosely enclosed, a signed autograph letter by Sir Joseph Banks to the editor of the work, Thomas Haweis: small quarto, 2 pages and conjugate leaf with address, Soho, 12 November 1798, of about 300 words. He thanks Haweis for lending him and 'my friend Dalrymple . . . part of the MS of the Duff's voyage', asks whether he might also see the charts and offers any help he might be able to give towards preparation for the ship's second voyage. Letters of Banks relating to the Pacific now rarely appear on the market.
