
SUMMER Writing & Words Summer Theme Words


Print (enlarge to 11"x 17" if you wish) and cut along the center line. Provide each student with their own word.

Post the completed theme words in a pocket chart or on a ring in your writing center for easy reference during writing.


SUMMER Writing & Words summer sentences

Lesson Idea: Your students will practice their reading and writing skills with these sentence activities. The mini book is great for practicing letter formation, handwriting, and sentence structure.

other ways to use

These activities are great for morning work, work for fast finishers, or word work centers. These are also useful for sending home for homework.

These activities are useful as assessment tools to check your students listening skills and ability to follow directions.





Story board and writing paper and have them create their own creative story using the words on the board.




SUMMER Writing & Words Summer How-to Writing

other ways to use

SUMMER Writing & Words Summer Poetry Writing

Prepare your class for these poetry lessons by reading a non-fiction book about summer and brainstorming words and ideas about summer.

Lesson Ice Create a funny poem with your class with the 'In the Summer' poem template. Have your students writing down things they can do in the summer (e.g., wear flip flops, go to the beach, swim in the ocean), but can't do (e.g., jump in leaves, wear boots, build a snowman).

other ways to use

with the letters for SUMMER (e.g., S=sunshine) as a class to use for the Summer acrostic poem.



SUMMER Writing & Words Summer Non-Fiction Writing

Use non-fiction books to teach your class about the topic. Brainstorm ideas as a class, then have your students complete a brainstorming sheet.

Lesson Idea: After completing the brainstorming sheet or after coming up with ideas as a class, students can use the ideas to write a non-fiction story about the topic.

other ways to use

these writing topics connect well with science about animals and the weather.



SUMMER Writing & Words Summer Personal Writing


Have class discussions about summer and the summer activities that students do. Have your students share how they will spend their Summer Vacation.

SUMMER Writing & Words Summer Opinion & List Writing

other ways to use

SUMMER Writing & Words Summer Write-d-Story Picture Prompts

prompts make great, simple activities for your writing center or during your work on writing time.

Lesson Icles Have students examine the photograph and think of a story idea. They could come up with names of the characters, a problem, and a solution. Have them prepare for writing by sharing their ideas with a partner.

other ways to use
