

With Hollywood being home to a plethora of highly original artists and artisans, from imaginative

photographers to fanciful designers of jewelry and accessories, finding a super-special something that was created locally shouldn't pose too great a challenge for city shoppers, who won't have to shell out a fortune either.

"Everyone always wants

to give and receive gifts that are special and unique," said Kristi Huddleston, 32, vice president of Hollywood-based J.D. Linder Designs,

Linder says she hopes to open a retail shop of her unique merchandise in downtown Hollywood sometime in 2004. For the past year, Linder, whose earlier designing efforts focused on clothing, has been selling her jewelry and accessories through such venues as the salon, spa and gift shops at the Weston Diplomat Resort and Spa, 3555 S. Ocean Drive, as well as the firm's Web site, at www.idlinder.com.

decorated with crystals. It allows a woman to hang her purse from a table's edge rather than risk the bad luck associated with putting a purse on a floor.

Linder - like other locals who strive to create unique gifts - is quick to point out that one-of-a-kind items can be custom-made.

Another local artisan, Dawn Pilpel, commented, "Pieces can be custom-made to suit anything."

Pilpel's unusual work consists of jewelry and accessories made from items found on the shelves of Home Depot at 3401 Oakwood Blvd. Many of the pieces, which start at \$28 for a pair of earrings, are embellished with jewelnke crystals or cubic zirconia.

"I'm taking the regular and making it irregular, taking the norm and adding some spice to it, with anything you might find, taking the experience of building something and turning it into a fashion accessory," said Pilpel, whose firm goes by the trademarked name of "iWEAR ...do you?"

"People have always told me I'm nuts," she said. "Now, I've taken those nuts and put them to good use."

Linder and Pilpel are among artisans who also regularly sell their creations at gift shows at local schools, places of worship and businesses.

Carole Shannon, receptionist at Hair Industry, 2000 Harrison St., the site of a recent show in which both Linder and Pilpel participated, commented, "We have so many creative people here in Hollywood, and we are happy to help them share their creations."
