Hot for spring

Area jewelers outline what's in style this season

ring is here — the trees are sprouting their green buds, the air is starting to turn balmy — and as you shed your coat and unearth your skirts from the depths of your closet, there will be just one question on your mind: How should I accessorize for spring?

The answer is here. Area jewelers weigh in on what's hot for the season, detailing the latest trends and must-have pieces. Here's what they have to say.

Pastels and soft palettes

Pastels - like soft pinks, blues, greens and yellows - are in for spring. Amy Rumley, owner of Merle Norman Studio in Greensboro, points to Chamilia's new Garden Party Collection, which takes its inspiration from the floral prints and blushed, pretty palettes of the 2012 runway looks.

"Chamilia delivers a fresh look this spring with innovative designs," she says. "Each piece is intricately designed to represent the season's most popular trends: pastels, lace, sparkle, feminine floral, cotton-candy pink, sun-kissed yellow and casual denim."

With its delicate beaded bracelets and necklaces, the collection's pieces are perfect accents for any fashionista's look.

Meg Strader, owner of Simply Meg's in Greensboro, also is seeing pastels and

soft colors in her jewelry. An apt example is ready-to-wear Mollybeads necklaces and earrings. The necklaces' thick gold chains and oversized colored pendants make a flirty, playful statement for spring. Connie Kissel, a buyer for Greensboro's Splurges Boutique and designer of Liquid Time and CO. Jewelry, confirms the look.

"Gold continues to be important, with enormous chains being desirable," she says.

In Winston-Salem, Michelle McMinn of Windsor Jewelers agrees that color is big for spring, McMinn cites the Ippolita Rosé Sugar Kissed Collection in Orchid, with amethyst, green amethyst, rose and clear quartz.

"The rose gold and colored stones really make these a must-have for spring," she says.

Opaque stones

The season's colored stones will not be confined to soft pastels, however.

"A continuing trend for spring and summer is unusual natural colored diamonds, including opaques in colors ranging from white, yellow, and green to black," says Deborah Wishon, owner of Deva Fine Jewelry in Winston-Salem.

Deva Fine Jewelry is highlighting these diamonds in a group of exclusive stones set in white and yellow metal for the season. These singular stones — with their glossed surfaces and elegant, almost ornate settings

- make for chic and sophisticated pieces for spring.

"Whether in stacking bangles or long chandelier earrings, these stunning stones are colorful and romantic." Wishon explains. "Opaques are a great choice for any fashionforward woman's signature piece."

Pearls also are seeing a comeback for

"Pearls are always a classic and standard piece of jewelry," says Kathie Yamamori, co-owner of Yamamori Ltd. at State Street Station in Greensboro. "There is a renewed interest in all pearls, including the traditional Japanese Akoya and the wide range of Chinese offerings that are now available, which can accommodate every budget."

Vintage selections

Vintage has been a fad since it was old enough to be called vintage, and it continues this spring.

"The trend of antique, vintage and retro jewelry remains strong with anything accessory-wise that can spark a conversation," Kissel says.

"Rose gold has seen a comeback because of its reminiscence of vintage jewelry and romantic feel, but it can be made into more modern styles," adds Taylor Kimsey, a sales associate at Wade's Jewelers in Gibsonville.

Inherent to this modern style is individualism, uniqueness and exclusivity.

"Pieces that are really unique and more artful appeal to those not wanting to look exactly like everyone else," she says.

Ironically, the modern sensibility plays right into the vintage look, which is anything but mainstream.

Striking and dynamic

If you're not into the quiet, feminine look, then there are edgier, sleeker and bolder design options for the season as well.

"Upcoming trends tend to be leaning more toward bolder jewelry, with pieces that offer versatility and things that have a lot of sparkle to them, whether they be cubic zirconia or diamonds," says Angie Hutchins, who co-owns Kernersville-based Ellington

Jewelers with her husband, Bruce.

To that end, the shop has added bolder pieces like Hershey's Kiss licensed jewelry in a variety of colors and interchangeable Kameleon jewelry.

"Women seem to enjoy having the option to change their iewelry to match their wardrobe," Hutchins says.
