Crista's Story

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Hi, I'm Crista, proud wife and mother to two wildlings.

Prior to becoming a mom I did some pretty rad stuff too; from CEO, to developing and selling a fundraising app specifically designed for the non-profit sector, doing for others is a priority. I've mediated rival gangs, tutored homeless children, volunteered in children's hospital's, doing all I can to create safe spaces for children.

Learning about the shortage of books in low-income areas, I knew I had to take action. We know that children who are surrounded by books have a better chance of becoming life long learners. The statistics show how low literacy rates correlate with higher drop out rates, and increased incarceration numbers. Too many low-income children live in book deserts, geographic areas where reading materials are difficult to obtain, or non existent.

Even before the pandemic upended instruction, only 35% of fourth-graders met the standards for reading proficiency set by the National Assessment of Educational Progress, an even lower number than in 2017.

So this is what I did... Before the pandemic I started collecting thousands of books and setting up free libraries at child care facilities and food banks in my city. We called it the 143 Book Club. It was a great start, but there's more work to be done.

So we're officially starting the 143 Book Club. Every purchase of a tee, hoodie or accessory helps get books to the children who need it most. Reading to our children is one of the most important things we can do, your support makes it possible, welcome to the club!
