

Culminating Project Choices

Now that you have completed the book, choose one or more of the final projects to do below!


- SUPERTEST: Write a test about the book. Include a variety of question types, like True/False, multiple choice, fill-in-the-blank, and written answers. Write an accompanying answer key. Have someone else in the class take your test. Grade their test.
- DEAR AUTHOR: Write a letter to the author of the book, Judy Blume. In your letter, include your opinion about the book, and any questions you have for her.
- DEAR DIARY: Choose a character in the book. Write about the events in the book from his or her point of view, in the form of several diary entries.
- NEWSPAPER: Create a newspaper that is themed around the events in the book. You might include articles, advertisements, comic strips, and an advice column.
- PLAYWRIGHT: Choose your favorite scene(s) from Superfudge. Write it in the form of a play. Either record it to show to the class, or perform it in front of the class!
- BOARD GAME: Create a board game which is themed around Superfudge. Be creative!
- PAPER BAG BOOK: Place ten items inside a paper bag that represent the story. Decorate the outside of the bag with an illustration, the book title, and the author's name. Present the ten items to the class, explaining how each item relates to the story.
- BIRD MAGAZINE: Do some research about birds. Write a magazine with several pages about your findings. Be sure to include a creative magazine cover.
- THEME POSTER: Design a large poster that communicates a lesson that you think can be learned from the story.
- CHARACTER ART: Create sculptures, puppets, or models of the characters using any material you choose. You could use a combination of paper, rocks, clay, poster board, old toys, sticks, or anything you can think of!

Teacher Instructions

Who Said It? & Character Quotes

- Give 1 copy of the "Who Said It?" handouts to each student. (These are the character cards on the next two pages.)
- Have the students color them (if desired) and cut them apart.
- Read guotes (things that the characters spoke aloud) from the book. Have the students hold up who they think said the quote.
- Do this whole group. Then, move to playing the game in groups or partners.
- When you are all done playing the game, have the students take the cards, and glue their 2 favorites onto the sheet called "Character Quotes." Have the students write their own choices of character quotes in the speech bubbles for each character.
- At the bottom of the "Character Quotes" page, have students write what their chosen quotes show about the characters.



Instructions

for Digital Version/Google™ Drive Document

- You will need Internet access and a Google™ account (which is free).
- Click on the blue link below. You will be prompted to make a copy of the Google™ document. Click on the blue button
 that says "Make a Copy." That copy will be saved to your Google™ Drive. (All of the screenshots below are examples
 only. The text may differ, but it will look otherwise the same.)



Note: If you have Google™ Drive accounts with multiple email addresses, make sure you take note which email address is selected in the top right corner of the screen, so you can easily find the document in the fature.

3. If you completed Step 2 correctly, the document just transferred to your Google account. It will contain the resource in its entirety. This includes Tables of Contents, student pages, answer keys, and everything else. You will also notice that the document has blue text boxes already placed everywhere that students will need to type.

MAKE ANOTHER COPY of this document by going to File>Make a copy. A window will pop up that says "Copy document." Rename it as you wish, and then click OK.

You will customize this additional copy in whatever ways you want, according to your students' needs.



Think through how you want to roll it out to your students. Decide what you want your students to have access to.

Obviously, you want want to share answer keys. Also, for example, do you only want to assign your students certain pages at a time? Once you decide, delete everything you don't want your students to have access to, and reorganize the remaining pages however you wish.

If you need to, make additional copies (as outlined in Step 3). For example, maybe you want to separate the assignments into smaller chunks, or withhold certain resources until a certain time. Just be sure to name all of your customized copies according to what they are, so it is not confusing when it comes time to share the documents with your students.

6. Once you're ready, share the documents with your students. Students will need their own Google™ accounts. To share, open the document you want to share in your Google™ Drive. Then, click on the blue button in the upper right corner that says "Share."



Note: Sharing with students can also be done through Google™ Classroom.
