

### <u>CULMINATING</u> PROJECT <u>CHOICES</u>

Now that you have completed the book, choose one of the final projects to do below!

- 1. **SEQUEL**: Write a sequel to *Runaway Ralph*. What happens to Ralph next?
- WHO'S THE AUTHOR?: Use the Internet to do research about the author, Beverly Cleary.
- **3. DEAR DIARY:** Choose a character in the book. Write about the events in the book from his or her point of view, in the form of several diary entries.
- **4. NEWSPAPER:** Create a newspaper that is themed around the events in the book. You might include articles, advertisements, comic strips, and an advice column.
- 5. **PLAYWRIGHT**: Choose your favorite scene from *Runaway Ralph*. Write it in the form of a play. Either record it to show to the class, or perform it in front of the class!
- BOARD GAME: Create a board game which is themed around Runaway Ralph. Se creative!
- 7. NEWS INTERVIEW: Imagine you are a journalist that is interviewing one of the characters from Runaway Ralph. Write a script for it. With a partner, either record it to show to the class, or perform it in front of the class!
- 8. MORE ABOUT RALPH: Read another book about Ralph. (There are two: The Mouse and the Motorcycle and Ralph S. Mouse.) Write a book report about it in the form of your choice. You may create a poster, write an essay or create another type of presentation.
- **9. MOVIE POSTER:** Design a movie poster advertising a movie based on *Runaway Ralph*.
- 10. CHARACTER ART: Create sculptures, puppets, or models of the characters using any material you choose. You could use a combination of paper, rocks, clay, poster board, old toys, sticks, or anything you can think of!

Reople think Garf took Karen's watch.	*Aunt Jill talks to Garf and encourages him to take ownership of Ralph and to do some things that he enjoys. *Aunt Jill gives Ralph back to Garf when he is captured again, which makes Garf happy.
Karen	*To get her watch back.	*She waits for it to be returned, but it doesn't appear for a long time.	*Raiph puts it in her sleeping back and she is glad to see it back.

# **Instructions**for Digital Version/Google™ Drive Document

- You will need Internet access and a Google™ account (which is free).
- 2. Click on the blue link below. You will be prompted to make a copy of the Google™ document. Click on the blue button that says "Make a Copy." That copy will be saved to your Google™ Drive. (All of the screenshots below are examples only. The text may differ, but it will look otherwise the same.)




Note: If you have Google<sup>M</sup> Drive accounts with multiple email addresses, make sure you take note which email address is selected in the top right corner of the screen, so you can easily find the document in the future.

If you completed Step 2 correctly, the document just transferred to your Google account. It will contain the resource in its entirety. This includes Tables of Contents, student pages, answer keys, and everything else. You will also notice that the document has blue text boxes already placed everywhere that students will need to type.

MAKE ANOTHER COPY of this document by going to File>Make a copy. A window will pop up that says "Copy document." Rename it as you wish, and then click OK.

You will customize this additional copy in whatever ways you want, according to your students' needs.



Think through how you want to roll it out to your students. Decide what you want your students to have access to. Obviously you want to share answer keys. Also, for example, do you only want to assign your students certain pages at a time? Once you decide, delete everything you don't want your students to have access to, and reorganize the remaining pages however you wish.

If you need to, make additional copies (as outlined in Step 3). For example, maybe you want to separate the assignments into smaller chunks, or withhold certain resources until a certain time. Just be sure to name all of your customized copies according to what they are, so it is not confusing when it comes time to share the documents with your students.

6. Once you're ready, share the documents with your students. Students will need their own Google™ accounts. To share, open the document you want to share in your Google™ Drive. Then, click on the blue button in the upper right corner that says "Share."

\*Note: Sharing with students can also be done through Google™ Classroom.\*
