

INSTRUCTIONS FOR *Google Forms* COMPREHENSION & VOCABULARY CHECKS

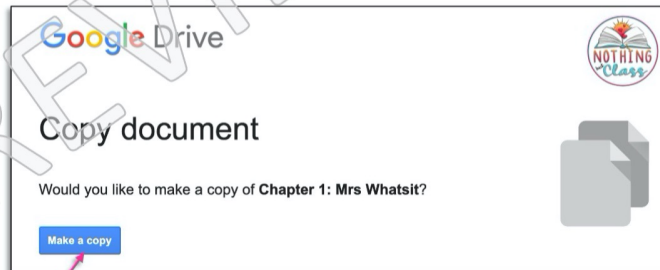
