

- You will need Internet access and a Google™ account (which is free).
- Click on the link below. You will be prompted to make a copy of a Google™ document called *Digital Version: Tales of a Fourth Grade Nothing Comprehension & Vocabulary," Click on the blue button that says "Make a Copy," That copy will be saved to your Google Drive. (All of the screenshots below are examples only. The text may differ, but it will look otherwise the same.)








