

## Tips for Melbourne Mad-Libs

- If your grammar is a little rusty, follow this guide when choosing words. The story will make more sense and be even funnier!
- Noun An object or thing, such as doorknob, box or shoe.
- Plural Noun Many objects or things. Usually ends with an –S, such as shirts, pens or surfboards.
- Adjective A description word. Example are smelly, gooey and rough. Get creative with these!
- Superlative An adjective that is the MOST extreme. It usually ends in –EST, such as coolest, strangest, or busiest.
- Verb An action word. Examples include smash, drool and run. Change the ending so that the sentence make sense, e.g. drooling, smashed, runs.
- Adverb A word that describes a verb. It usually ends in -LY, such as lazily, slowly, or stupidly.
