## CANEBERRIES



### **General Caneberry Care & Information**

- All raspberries are self-fruitful, so only one variety is needed for pollination.
- Raspberries grow best in rich, well draining soil, with full sun and ample water.
- Varieties with trailing canes need a strong trellis and ample space (5-6' apart) while compact varieties can be planted closer (3-4' apart).

#### Raspberries

- There are two classes of Raspberries: **Summer-bearing** varieties that produce one crop in the summer and **Everbearing** varieties that produce one crop in summer and another in early fall.
- **Summer-bearing** varieties produce fruit on two year old canes (like blackberries). After harvest, remove canes that bore fruit (floricanes) and train current seasons canes (primocanes) along the trellis.
- **Everbearing** varieties fruit on current season's growth (the fall crop) as well as two year old canes from the previous year (the summer crop). After fall harvest, prune fruiting canes back 1/2 way. After summer harvest, prune fruiting canes back completely.

### Blackberries

- Blackberry canes are biennial; they grow one year (primocanes) and produce fruit the next (floricanes).
- After harvest, remove canes that bore fruit (floricanes) and train current seasons canes (primocanes) along the trellis.

### Lingonberries

- Lingonberries are self-fertile, short, slow growing evergreen shrubs that make great groundcover, border or container plants.
- They have bright white bell-shaped flowers in spring followed by small dark red berries in the summer.
- They are a low maintenance shrub that require little pruning (fruit on previous years growth) and can be planted close together (2' 3' apart).
