Among them is this blue and manganese chimisteric proset por and cases, c. 1695-1705, marked SWE T. The Sin (23cm) high pot is priced at \$36,000 for £22,500.

Left: well known as a specialist in Renaissance and medieval manuscripts and jewellery, Sandra Hindman of Les Enlaminares will also take this c1300 Gothic chair from Castille in Spain to the Winter Show. The wooden chair retains the original red polychrome paint and measures a diminutive 2th (62cm) high, and is priced at \$38,000.

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TOP dog in the New York antiques scene is the Winter Antiques Show; now just a year short of her 60th birthday and still going strong.

The 59th Winter Antiques Show takes place from January 25-February 3 as usual at the Park. Avenue Armory, and you can be sure that the great and the good from across America will be flying in for the event, not least the glitzy opening right party where tickets can set you back an eye-watering \$2500.

All proceeds from this night go to East Side House Settlement, a charity that helps immigrants and low-income families in the South Bronx. Hoping to encourage the next generation, the Young Collectors Night on January 31 is also a builty society evening, with tickets a touch more affordable at \$175 a head.

This year's show welcomes eight new faces among the 73 exhibitors of American, English, European, and Asian art and antiques. Three are New Yorkers Glass Past, specialists in Italian glass from 1870-1970; Carlton Hobbs, a British dealer in 17th-19th century British and Continental familiare and works of art, and Magen H with French post-Vitar design. Meanwhile, from Connecticut come Cove Landing, with 18th and early 19th century English and Continental decorative objects and American folk art and Americana specialist Allan Katz Americana, while Delaney Antique Clocks travel from Massachusetts for the first time.

The remainder are London dealers – the artist's jewellery dealers **Didlier** and **Old Master** specialists **Derek Johns** and **Theo Johns Fine Art**, who will share a stand.

They join other UK exhibitors for whom the Winter Show has become an annual pilgrimage, among them **Roger Keverne**, **Rupert Wace**, **Daniel Katz** and **Peter Finer**.

One London-based dealer in this field with a strong US clientele is Robert Young, who has exhibited at the Winter Show for the past decade. While not strictly folk art, his stand this year will feature this pair of c.1820 Regency-style hand-wrought metal chairs, with sabre-form front legs and original painted details. Robert thinks the chairs might be American, although they were discovered in France as a set of six and then split up—two of the chairs bore labels for Perins' Pasadena. The chairs are priced at £8500 for the pair.
