WILDFLOWER SEED COLLECTIONS



FOR THE HUMMINGBIRDS WILDFLOWER COLLECTION

This collection includes spring, summer and fall bloomers to ensure a consistent nectar supply for hummingbirds throughout the season.



FOR THE MONARCHS WILDFLOWER COLLECTION

Common, Butterfly, Showy and Swamp Milkweed are the host plant of the monarch butterfly caterpillar, while Dense Blazingstar is a favourite nectar source for adult butterflies.



CUT FLOWERS COLLECTION

Assortment of 5 wildflower varieties that will make for beautiful bouquets from summer right through into fall. Includes Pale Purple Coneflower, Oxeye Sunflower, Boneset, Rattlesnake Master, and Anise Hyssop.



CONDO WILDFLOWER SEED COLLECTION

Wildflowers are for balconies too! This collection is curated with varieties that do well in pots, add colour and provide an important nectar source for urban dwelling pollinators.



FOR THE BEES WILDFLOWER COLLECTION

Bumble bees, honey bees, sweat bees, carpenter bees OH MY! This full to part-sun collection includes 5 wildflower varieties that provide an important pollen and nectar source for native bees.



WILD TEA SEED COLLECTION

This full sun collection is curated with 5 wildflower varieties that can be dried or used fresh to make delicious hot or cold teas. This collection includes wildflowers that belong to the Mint and Echinacea family.



SOIL AMENDMENT WILDFLOWER COLLECTION

This full sun collection is curated with 5 varieties that will improve the quality of your soil. Canada Tick Trefoil, Leadplant, Yellow Wild Indigo and Purple Prairie Clover are Nitrogen fixing legumes. Borage adds trace minerals to the soil.



FOR THE BUTTERFLIES WILDFLOWER COLLECTION

Common and Butterfly Milkweed are the host plant of the monarch butterfly caterpillar, while Cutleaf Coneflower, Black-Eyed Susan and Blue Vervain provide an important nectar source for adult butterflies.



CONEFLOWER COLLECTION

Add their distinctive cone shape and drooping petals to your garden. Popular with butterflies, their shape makes for easy access to nectar and a sturdy landing pad for larger butterflies.

WILDFLOWER SEED MIXES



PART-SHADE WILDFLOWER SEED MIX

This mix contains 14 types of seeds suited to shaded sites and will tolerate slightly acidic soil. The mix is ideal for fall sowing.





LAKESHORE WILDFLOWER SEED MIX

This mix is suited to full sun areas with medium to wet conditions. It can be applied to lakeshore, lowland and wetland sites.





DRY AND SUNNY WILDFLOWER SEED MIX

This mix is suited to full sun areas and sites with dry to medium conditions.





EASY TO GROW WILDFLOWER SEED MIX

Our mixes contain spring, summer and fall blooms in a variety of colours to provide a continuous nectar supply to a range of pollinators. The easy to grow mix is suited to full sun areas and sites with dry to medium conditions. It is ideal for spring or fall sowing and contains species that will often flower in their first year.







EASY TO GROW WILDFLOWER SEEDS



ANISE HYSSOP

A native culinary delicacy that is very easy to grow from seed and a breeze to maintain. The crushed leaves and flowers smell and taste like licorice and are immensely popular with bees.

Agastache foeniculum Blooms July to August



BORAGE

Borage is a naturalized annual. It may not be native, but it has other benefits. All parts of the plant are edible, it repels pests like hornworm and improves the soil by adding trace minerals back to your garden.

Borago officinalis Blooms July to September



BLACK-EYED SUSANS

Favourites among new gardeners- they are prolific and very easy to grow. Black-Eyed Susans have a biennial (2 year) life cycle, but often self seed, acting more like perennials once established.

Rudbeckia hirta Blooms August to October



COMMON EVENING PRIMROSE

Drought tolerant and thrive in a wide range of soils. Flowers bloom from early summer to fall, opening in the evening until late morning and are pollinated by moths.

Oenothera biennis Blooms June to October



BLANKETFLOWER

Blanketflower is drought tolerant and thrives in poor soil. It is native to Western portions of Canada and the United States, found in dry prairie habitats. This plant has a long bloom period and attracts butterflies. *Gaillardia aristata*

Blooms July to September



COMMON YARROW

It is drought tolerant, the fresh and dried foliage has a pleasant fragrance, and it is the host plant of many native moths and beetles. Yarrow spreads via rhizomes and will proliferate readily in the garden.

Achillea millefolium Blooms June to September





CULVER'S ROOT

A beautiful accent plant. Native to the southern-most parts of Ontario and Manitoba, where it is a threatened species. Does well in hardiness zones 3-8. Veronicastrum virginicum Blooms June to August



SQUARE-STEMMED MONKEY FLOWER

This plant grows best in wetter patches in the garden and occurs naturally in wet meadows, swamps, and stream and pond borders.

Mimulus ringens Blooms June to September



DOTTED MINT

Beautiful, undemanding and edible. The plant's leaves and flowers can be used to make an aromatic tea or as a savoury herb. Monarda punctata
Blooms August to October



SMOOTH BLUE ASTER

The beautiful purple-blue flowers attract many different pollinators and the plant is host for the Silvery Checkerspot and Pearl Crescent Butterflies.

Symphyotrichum laeve Blooms August to October



PURPLE PRAIRIE CLOVER

Grows well in a variety of soil conditions. A member of the clover family, it fixes nitrogen, enhancing the soil.

Dalea purpurea Blooms July to August



WHITE PRAIRIE CLOVER

White flowers start growing at the base, and continue to wrap upwards. This plant is part of the legume family, meaning it can fix nitrogen into the soil, improving growing conditions.

Dalea candida Blooms July to August



WILD BERGAMOT

A member of the mint family and its leaves and petals can be used to make a delicious earl grey tea. It is undemanding but does not like being crowded by other plants. Liked by butterflies and hummingbirds.

Monarda fistulosa Blooms July to September







BLACK COHOSH

Has whispy, white spikes that bloom from May to August. The white candelabrashaped flowers are fragrant, leaves are deep green, and the whole plant is generally deer and rabbit resistant.

Cimicifuga racemosa Blooms May to August



Adds a gorgeous punch of deep blue into the spring and early summer garden. The plant is long lived and slow to mature, so expect a floppy stem for the first years as the plant focuses on deep roots.

Baptisia australis Blooms May to July



BLUE VERVAIN

An eye-catching beauty in any garden. It grows quickly from seed and requires little care to maintain. Blue vervain will survive in dry sites, however the plant will be smaller and bear fewer flowers than wet sites. Verbena hastata

Blooms July to September



BONESET

Boneset has a long bloom period, and is the host plant to a number of butterflies and moths including Lined Ruby Tiger Moth, Three-lined Flower Moth, Blackberry Looper, and Geometrid Moth.

Eupatorium perfoliatum Blooms July to October



BOTTLE GENTIAN

Brilliant mauve-blue blooms appear just as the rest of the garden is winding down. In the wild it grows in wet areas, but will also do fine in average moisture of the garden. A favorite of bumble bees.

Gentiana andrewsii Blooms August to October



BUNCHBERRY

An excellent choice for shaded sites or as a ground cover in dense gardens. Its dainty leaves are some of the first to emerge on the forest floor in the spring.

Cornus canadensis Blooms June to July

CANADA ANEMONE

Excellent short, hardy native ground cover. Overcrowded clumps can be divided in the fall to maximize flowering. The spring flowers are whimsical and abundant and the remaining foliage is attractive into the fall.

Blooms May to June



CANADA GOLDENROD

Golden-yellow, cascading clusters of small yellow flowers that appear in late summer into fall, a great addition to pollinator patches! It is used in herbal medicine for overall immune system support.

Solidago canadensis Blooms August-October



CANADA TICK TREFOIL

This wildflower is a legume and hence makes nitrogen available, which enriches the soil for the rest of your garden. It is native to most of eastern North America.

Desmodium canadense Blooms July to September



WILDFLOWER SEEDS



CARDINAL FLOWER

Cardinal flower attracts hummingbirds. Overpicking of this flower has resulted in its scarcity in some areas, so it is an excellent choice for any garden.

Lobelia cardinalis Blooms June to July



CUP PLANT

Adds a lot of wildlife value to the garden. The plant's leaf bases form cups which provide water to birds and insects, and birds feed on their fall seeds.

Silphium perfoliatum Blooms July to September



CUTLEAF CONEFLOWER

adds a beautiful burst of yellow at the end of the season. This taller cousin of the black-eyed susan spreads via rhizomes.

Rudbeckia laciniata Blooms August to October



DENSE BLAZINGSTAR

The whimsical flower spikes of this Northeastern native are loved by hummingbirds, bees and butterflies. Blazingstar supplies a winter food source for birds and is deer resistant. Liatris spicata

Blooms August to September



FALSE SOLOMAN'S SEAL

A great choice for your home landscaping project in shaded areas. Clusters of starshaped white flowers appear mid-late spring, followed by red berries. Will spread from its roots but will not take over.

Maianthemum racemosum Blooms May to June



FOXGLOVE BEARDTONGUE

Has beautiful white to pink tubular flowers that attract long-tongued bees, including bumblebees, Miner bees, Mason bees, and hummingbirds. This plant can adapt to many light conditions.

Penstemon digitalis Blooms June to July



GOLDEN ALEXANDERS

Black Swallowtail and Ozark Swallowtails caterpillars will feed on its leaves. Golden Alexanders is an early bloomer, giving the garden colour for several weeks in late spring to early summer.

Zizia aurea Blooms April to June



GREAT BLUE LOBELIA

A great option for planting near ponds, along lakeshores or rain gardens. It prefers cool, moist conditions and does not tolerate drought at all. The dainty blue flowers are a lovely end of season addition to the garden. Lobelia siphilitica

Blooms July to September



GREY GOLDENROD

A great solution for dry soil, or poor, rocky, clay slopes with little organic matter. This is one of the shortest Goldenrod varieties, and it tends to bloom later in the fall.

Solidago nemoralis

Blooms August to September



WILDFLOWER SEEDS



GREY-HEADED CONEFLOWER

Loved by bees and host for caterpillars of the Silvery Checkerspot butterfly and Wavy-Lined and Common Eupithecia moths.

Ratibida pinnata Blooms July to September



HOARY VERVAIN

A gorgeous prairie native that is more compact and than its more popular relative Blue Vervain. It is the host plant of the Common Buckeye butterfly.

Verbena stricta Blooms June to September



LANCELEAF COREOPSIS

Easy to grow, and does well in rocky, sandy or poor soil. We collected our original wild seed crop off the edges of a cliff!

Coreopsis lanceolata Blooms June to August



LEADPLANT

Native to the central parts of Canada and the U.S. and is hardy in zones 3-8. Deep roots allow for drought tolerance and the ability to survive fires. Note that it may take up to 4 years for this plant to mature.

Amorpha canescens Blooms July to August



NEW ENGLAND ASTER

This under-valued, beautiful native provides an important nectar source for pollinators from late summer until frost. It is also the host plant of the Pearl Crescent and several checkerspot butterflies.

Symphyotrichum novae-angliae Blooms September to October



NEW YORK IRONWEED

Native to the eastern portion of the United States, this species is hardy up to zone 5. New York Ironweed's tall, narrow growth habit makes it ideal for placement in borders or to fill in tight spaces.

Vernonia noveboracensis Blooms August to September



NODDING WILD ONION

A native member of the Allium family, which includes onions and garlic, its stems can be used much like chives and the bulbs are also edible. A ball of white/purple star-shaped flowers blooms at the end of the summer.

Blooms July to August



OXEYE SUNFLOWER

Native to prairie habitats of central and eastern Canada. It is not a true sunflower, but rather the flowers resemble a smaller version of the yellow sunflower. Low maintenance and it does well in clay soils. Heliopsis helianthoides
Blooms June to September



PALE PURPLE CONEFLOWER

It forms a deep taproot which allows for great drought tolerance, but it resents being transplanted. It is a food source of the adult Ottoe Skipper butterfly, which is listed as endangered in Canada.

Echinacea pallida Blooms June to July

PRAIRIE CONEFLOWER

Native of the Canadian Prairies but grows well in zones 3 to 10. Deep taproot allows it to survive well in dry conditions. Flowers may exhibit yellow, red or mixed coloration.

Ratibida columnifera Blooms June to August



PRAIRIE DOCK

The plant has huge fan-like basal leaves that are a nice addition to the garden throughout the year, then in late summer sends up clusters of bright yellow flowers.

Silphium terebinthinaceum Blooms August to September



PURPLE CONEFLOWER

Native to the central and eastern United States and naturalized in much of Ontario, purple coneflower is hardy up to zone 3.

Echinacea purpurea Blooms July to September



RATTLESNAKE MASTER

Adds so much character to the garden! Rattlesnake master is native to Southern Ontario and the Central United States, but is hardy up to zone 3.

Eryngium yuccifolium Blooms August to October



WILD BLACKBERRY

Produces delicious soft wild blackberries that are nothing like the grocery store variety. The plant has a colony forming habit and will do well in acidic areas and will tolerate some shade and drought.

Rubus allegheniensis Ripe July to September

WILD LOWBUSH BLUEBERRY

Berries burst with their signature sweet flavour and ripen from June to August depending on region. Do best in acidic soils.

Vaccinium angustifolium Blooms June to August



YELLOW WILD INDIGO

Plants are shrub-like, perform well in unfavourable conditions and are long lived. Flower petals can be used to make a dye, which is functional but inferior to that of true indigos.

Baptisia tinctoria Blooms June to August



WILD COLUMBINE

A hardy, easy to maintain native plant and does well in a variety of poor soil conditions, from sand to rock gardens. The unique flowers are popular with hummingbirds.

Aquilegia canadensis Blooms June to July





MILKWEED SEEDS



BUTTERFLY MILKWEED

The bright orange blooms stand-out against any other colour in the garden. It is less toxic than Common Milkweed, has more of a shrub-like habit only reaching 1-2ft in height, and spreads less aggressively. Butterfly Milkweed does well in dry to medium sites and sandy soils .

Asclepias tuberosa Blooms June to August Also available in 2g, 5g, 10g, or 25g package.



SWAMP MILKWEED

Swamp milkweed thrives in moist sites and is an important species for wetland restoration. It is easy to grow from seed, will thrive in wet clay-rich soil, and is less toxic than Common Milkweed.

Asclepias incarnata Blooms August to September Also available in 2g, 5g, or 10g package.



COMMON MILKWEED

The blooms are incredibly fragrant. Common Milkweed sap is toxic, so growing it in areas where livestock graze should be discouraged.

Asclepias syriaca Blooms July to September Also available in 3g package.



SHOWY MILKWEED

Native to the western portion of Canada and the United States, this species spreads less aggressively than Common Milkweed. Note that Showy Milkweed will hybridize with Common Milkweed.

NATIVE GRASS SEEDS



CANADA WILD RYE

A cool-season grass with wispy nodding seed heads and a warm green colour that actively grows during the spring and fall when soil temperatures are cool. This is a great native cover crop as it is fast growing and will stabilize a site quickly. 5 feet tall. Elymus canadensis

Blooms July to October



FALL RYE (NURSE CROP)

An excellent nurse crop for fall sown wildflower mixes. It's a soil builder, prevents erosion, suppresses weeds and improves soil drainage and aeration. Should ideally be sown with your wildflower mix in the fall after a hard frost but when the soil is still workable. 2-3 feet tall.

Schizachyrium scoparium This is an annual nurse crop, not a native grass



LITTLE BLUESTEM

An important native prairie grass species, that is popular in restoration and ornamental applications. It forms bluegreen clumps in the summer and in the fall it turns red and copper, which remain throughout the winter. Little Bluestem has very high value for wildlife. 3-6 feet tall.

Schizachyrium scoparium Blooms September to October

PRAIRIE DROPSEED

A low-maintenance and stellar grass for landscaping. It is short, clump-forming and easy to grow but does not readily self-seed in the garden. Seeds provide a food source for birds and if the foliage is not cut back, it maintains its fountain shape throughout the winter. 1-3 feet tall.

SIDEOATS GRAMMA

A short prairie grass that is native throughout the temperate and tropical Western Hemisphere, from Canada to Argentina. It has hints of bright red and purple. It has a non-aggressive, semiclumping nature. 2-3 feet tall. Bouteloua curtipendula

KURODA CARROT

A large smooth, uniform Chantenay-type carrot. Stores well, excellent for juicing and known for their flavor and sweetness. 70-100 Days



WINTER LUXURY PUMPKIN

Perfect for pies, this 6-lb golden pumpkin is very sweet with a velvety smooth flesh and white netting appearance.



DOE HILL PEPPER

Sweet, crisp, and earlier to mature, makes this orange fruit a perfect selection for northern gardens. 60-70 Days



GOLDEN BANTAM CORN

This old-fashioned variety produces sweet flavourful golden kernels. An excellent producer for northern climates. 75-85 Days



SPAGHETTI SQUASH

Cooked flesh can be separated into strands and used as an alternative to pasta. Excellent for winter storage.

A medium-sized open-pollinated yellow onion, this variety is mild in taste and perfect for winter storage.

An early maturing beefsteak tomato from Florence. Fruit have balanced notes of sugar and acid and are intensely flavoured Indeterminate 80 Days



BLACK PLUM

Crack resistant, red flesh, few seeds, and smoky-sweet flavour. Great for sauce and pastes. From small organic farm in Ontario. Indeterminate 80 Days



GERMAN JOHNSON

Pink, juicy, beefsteak-type fruits are prolific on this workhorse variety in Northern climates.

PURPLEKEEPERS TOMATILLO

Tomatillos are similar in taste and culinary uses as tomatoes. Enjoy them fresh, cooked, or in a salsa to accentuate their citrus tones. Plants have a trailing habit and should be planted in pairs to ensure pollination.

MERVILLE ROCKET

A uncommon variety developed in British Columbia. An early, prolific producer of 3-4 oz round, sweet, tart fruit and a bush habit Determinate 60 Days



ROSE DE BERNE

Medium in size, this pinkish tomato is sweet and flavourful. Often compared to the Brandywine tomato.

Indeterminate 75 Days



GROUND CHERRY

This is a must-grow in every garden if you enjoy tropical, fruity flavours. Abundant, small, orange fruit enclosed in papery lanterns present on bushy plants. Ready for harvest when the fruit drops to the ground and their papery lanterns are a beige colour. 75 Days





PRINCIPE BORGHESE

Italian heirloom famous for sauces & sundrying. These bushy plants produce trusses of 1-2 oz red, plum shaped fruit.

CHOCOLATE CHERRY

A unique heirloom with a deep colour and complex flavour. 1-2 oz brownish-red fruit is sweet & juicy with a refreshing flavour. Indeterminate 65 Days



YELLOW PEAR

Produces sweet and tangy yellow pearshaped tomatoes that resist cracking and are wonderful in fresh summer salads. Indeterminate 80 Days



NAPPA CHARDONNAY

Fruits are pale yellow, but if left to ripen longer they turn darker with a slight pink blush, reaching peak sweetness and flavour. Indeterminate 65 Days



DARK TIGER

A rare blue tomato variety with meaty, tangy 1 inch fruit. A handsome and productive variety.

FARTHEST NORTH

Be the first with tomatoes in your garden with this early producer! Produces very early and abundant bite sized tomatoes. Determinate 45 Days



BING

Abundant producer of ruby red cherry tomatoes with a sweet, balanced flavour. From a small organic farm in Ontario. Indeterminate 65 Days



BLUEBERRY

Lovely 1-2 oz purple shouldered cherry tomato with high levels of the antioxidant anthocyanin. Very productive. Indeterminate 85 Days



CENTENNIAL ROCKET

Very early red "two-bite" cherry tomato with good flavour on bush habit plants. From a small organic farm in Ontario Determinate 50 Days





DOE HILL

Sweet, crisp, and earlier to mature, makes this orange fruit a perfect selection for northern gardens. 60-70 Days



HOT EARLY JALAPEÑO






