








THE BIRTH OF A CAPSULE CANDLE LINE







WHY CANDLES AND WHY NOW?

I remember in my early teens, as I was about to start my homework in the evenings, I would lay out all my books and assignments. I would sharpen my pencils and find my coloured highlighters. But the best part of my preparation would be getting to light a candle on my desk. It was as though that small flame somehow focused all my energy in

this small space that I could claim as my own, if only for a short period of time.

Over the years, the candles got larger and nicer, but this small act of lighting a candle continues to conjure up feelings of escape from the outside world. I scatter flickering tea lights around a bath

laced with aromatherapy oils, or light a luxurious scented candle while nursing a glass of wine, engrossed in a book. I love that such a small object can hold the power to instil warmth and calm.

So I starting thinking about making candles years ago at a time when our London pop-up







shops were starting to gain traction. In between customer conversations and managing the store, I would try to sit down and work on this project, but there was never enough time to devote. During the months when the store was not open, I was focused on our main handbag collections, developing new colours and styles. Unfortunately, the candle project fell by the wayside as I fell into the rhythm of our stores and building our accessories collections.

And then 2020...this year has proved to be challenging for all of us in so many different ways. Despite these setbacks, I

am grateful that in addition to the health of my family and friends, it has also given me the time to slow down and therefore find the creative space to work on and develop my love of candles. And there couldn't be a better time, as I know we need a bit of comfort and escape now.

WHERE TO START?

I wanted to create unisex candles that were unique, personal and, staying true to my brand ideals, the highest quality. So as it is with all my projects, I decided the most important place to start was with education.



I enrolled in a fine fragrance creation course which first trained my nose to learn a host of scents both familiar and unfamiliar to me over the span of several weeks. Then I learned to write my own fragrance briefs and use this to create, mix and refine my own formulas. The whole course was a wonderful 2-month journey of discovery, and when it was finished, I was excited to apply my new knowledge.

Although my handbags are all made in Italy, I wanted to produce my candles closer to home. I spoke with a number of UK candle makers and at first, I looked for an existing fragrance that would fit into the briefs that I had developed. However, my search proved in vain, as nothing was quite right. I decided to take my learnings and develop my own formulas to create fragrances that are more personal.

I felt as though I was back in chemistry class weighing, measuring and tweaking my scent formulas, but it has been such a rewarding endeavour. I then found a perfect partner in a small East London candle-maker who was extremely honest, knowledgable and dedicated to making a premium quality product.

WHAT GOES INTO MAKING A PREMIUM CANDLE?

Many commercial candles are made from parraffin wax as it allows them use less fragrance to achieve a good "scent throw". The downside is that you are burning a derivative of petroleum oil, which can give off harmful fumes in your home. In addition,

some lower-end candles may contain a lower percentage of fragrance and only focus on one or two ingredients like vanilla or peach.

Our hand-poured candles are made from 100% vegan wax, which is a natural blend of rapeseed and coconut waxes, and use a cotton wick to ensure a clean burn. Additionally, we contain a higher percentage of our fragrance to ensure a strong, lasting scent throw. Each of the formulas I have developed is a combination of 10 to 15 different scents that I hope will take you on a journey.

WHAT WAS YOUR INSPIRATION?

With our accessories collections, most of my inspiration comes from shapes and colours that I see, whether on buildings or in nature. However, my candle inspirations came not from something that I saw, but from feelings and memories. I am an avid traveller and I love how a smell can conjure up so many things and transport us to another place. The first places I wanted to bring to life are the two places in the world I have been lucky enough to call home.

I am so proud of the capsule candle line that I have created. Our two unisex fragrances feature luxury, minimalist packaging and an insert with a summary of inspirations for each candle. I hope you will love them and that you will allow them to transport you to another place, another feeling...




WEST VILLAGE


a quiet evening amidst the bustle of NYC

Those of you who have been long-time supporters will know that I said goodbye to Charlie in April this year. Almost every morning, we walked together on Primrose Hill where she would happily bound after tennis balls and offer them to strangers.

A few years ago, Charlie had surgery to remove a brain tumour, and following her successful operation, I made a conscious effort to not take for granted the moments we had together. From then on, I walked with her so many mornings, rain or shine, inhaling the fresh air, and feeling grateful as I saw her smiling face, knowing that each day we shared was a gift.

You breathe deep and feel the green grass underfoot, small flowers just beginning to appear as you climb to the top of Primrose Hill. Drops of dew clinging to leaves while the sun begins to warm the air and light up the skyline stretching out before you.

In memory of Charlie, 15% of the net proceeds of our Primrose Hill candle will go to the Royal Veterinary College's Animal Care Trust which has been improving animal health and care for over 30 years. 

THE NORTHERN LIGHTS & FINNISH LAPLAND

I opened my eyes and all I could see was white. I didn't feel any pain, which meant nothing was broken and my initial panic subsided. Luckily, I had completely forgotten the safety instructions about what to do if our snowmobile overturned. If I had remembered, my left leg would probably have been trapped between the vehicle and the hidden tree trunk that derailed us.

We were on the first full day of our trip in Finnish Lapland and halfway through our snowmobile safari when my partner managed to get our tracks caught on a hidden fallen tree, causing us to veer 10 metres off the path before flipping us on our side. As our guide circled back to check both us and the snowmobile for damages, he was shocked that we all emerged





unscathed. Luckily, this was the only danger we encountered on our adventure in the Arctic Circle.

THE NORTHERN LIGHTS

As soon as I saw the stunning photos of the glass igloos under the Aurora Borealis in an article about the Kakslauttenen Resort, it was immediately added to my travel bucket list. What could be more

picturesque than drifting to sleep with the Northern Lights dancing overhead. After months of planning and anticipation, we finally arrived at the resort. We took an early flight from London to Helsinki and another short flight up to Ivalo before spending a chilly hour in a van. It was well into the evening when we arrived cold and exhausted, and we were more than ready to fall into bed.

However, as we made our way through the snow to our glass igloo, the night sky was glowing with two long green waves of light moving almost imperceptibly. We passed many visitors excitedly taking selfies and others with professional camera equipment to capture this phenomenon. I steered us quickly past the groups though, as I had done my research -

the coming days would see an even more impressive display of lights from increased electromagnetic disturbance in the sky. So I happily prepared for sleep after exploring our cozy glass dome and watched the private light show that I was sure would be even better the next few days. As luck would have it, this would be our only night under the glow of the Northern Lights as the remainder of our stay would be under deep cloud cover and snow.

As a dog lover, our trip to Lapland would certainly not have been complete without a husky sled safari. Each couple was assigned a sled with six beautiful and exuberant dogs. We learned about their training, how they were paired based on compatibility with each other and placed






Is there a better time to snuggle up with a good book than when the weather turns? The virtual book club I set up at the beginning of the year continues to select really interesting stories that moved me, worried me and educated me. But if you're looking for something a bit more light-hearted, I've included some suggestions for that as well.




It is shocking to me that Parable of the Sower was written in the early 1990s and its sequel only a few years later. The story begins with a teenage girl in dystopian California born with "hyper-empathy" which forces her to feel the physical pain of others. While this is a key feature in the book, the main themes are a product of the harrowing breakdown of society resulting from climate change.


The story speaks of racism, class divisions, the horrors that people are capable of inflicting on each other and also the humanity that still remains. The first book is a difficult and emotional read, but I was drawn into the story and wanted to know what was next in store for the characters. The sequel presents even more atrocities, partly stemming from the rise of a US President who uses the slogan "make America great again." While these books are remarkably prescient, well-told stories, they are not for the faint of heart.




This was my choice for book club as although I had heard a lot of positive things, I did not know much about the story. The novel is about a Syrian refugee couple recounting their traumatic journey to the UK. Christy Lefteri wrote this after spending time volunteering in a refugee camp in Athens and listening to the stories of the people she met.

Her simple, straightforward prose made this sad tale that much more heart-breaking. The first few chapters had me in tears before I became almost numb to the sorrow that the main characters experienced themselves and saw happening around them. This was an emotional story that reminds us how much we all have in common.







And now for something a bit less serious. I was not so much recommended the His Dark Materials trilogy as I was shamed into it. "What?? I can't believe you haven't read this!!" So in between our selected book club readings, I began Philip Pullman's adventure series and I absolutely loved it. I enjoyed the first book so much, I dared to recommend it to my 10 year old nephew ("not enough action in the first two chapters, Aunt Stacy!"), but I'm hoping he'll come back to it when he has a little more patience.

I loved the second book even more than the first and I am part way through the final novel. The descriptive language is beautiful, going beyond what I would normally ascribe to a children's book, and the stories show so much imagination. In general, the books are about a 12-year old heroine, Lyra, who, in the course of finding out who she is and rescuing her friends, becomes tasked with saving the many different worlds in existence - and of course she meets a cast of wonderful characters along the way.

Pullman has so expertly crafted all these worlds, I could really see the characters come to life and I can't wait to find out what happens in the finale! For anyone who has not already been introduced to this series, no shame, but I can not recommend it enough.
