Teacher's Edition, page xi, Intro to Teachers	The dotted line to the phrase "that seemed backward" is in the wrong place.	Move the phrase "that seemed backward" so that the dotted line is pointed to the center of the word "that" instead of to the horizontal line.
Page 45, Chapter 2, On the Map	The Freedom Trail is mentioned in the Sentences for Practice in the PDF as well as in Lesson B.	Change the first sentence to the following: In Lesson B and in Sentences for Practice (available in the Practice & Assessments PDF), the Freedom Trail in Boston, Massachusetts, is mentioned.
Page 100, Chapter 4, Sentences for Practice #2	"Theirs" is labeled incorrectly as a predicate adjective. It's actually a predicate nominative.	Change label on "theirs" from PA to PN.
Page 111, Chapter 5, Sentences to Analyze	In the title "Sentences to Analyze and Diagram," the word "Sentences" is misspelled.	Change to: Sentences
Page 112, Chapter 5, step e	"Compound predicate adjective" should be singular, not plural.	Change "adjectives" to "adjective."
Chapter 5, TE page h	The phrase "at the Mexican restaurant" is adjectival and should be modifying "tacos" so the labeling needs to be changed.	Change letter g in the script to the following: "At the Mexican restaurant tells us <i>which</i> tacos tasted spicy. So, <i>at the Mexican restaurant</i> is an adjectival element because it modifies a noun. It is an adjectival prepositional phrase." (Draw the modifying lines and write <i>adj</i> in the elbow opposite the line with the arrow. Write <i>prep</i> underneath the modifier line, directly below the <i>adj</i> .)
Chapter 5, TE page i	The phrase "at the Mexican restaurant" is adjectival and should be modifying "tacos" so the diagram needs to be changed.	Change the diagram so that the lines containing "at the Mexican restaurant" are under "tacos" instead of "tasted." Change the diagram so that the line containing "adv" and "prep" that goes from the "p" below "at" to "tasted" so that it points the opposite direction and points to "tacos" instead.
Chapter 6, Well-Ordered Notes A, page b, sentence c	The modifier "the" is missing from the diagram.	Add a diagonal modifying line before "other" underneath the horizontal line for "team" and put "the" on it.

Page 169, Chapter 8, subhead at bottom of page	The header on p. 167 says "in the Adjectival Clause" and here on p. 169 it says "Relative Clause." These subheads should use consistent wording.	Change the subhead on p. 169 to: Relative Pronoun as the Object in the Adjectival Clause.
Chapter 8, TE page r, Sentences for Practice #10	The diagram for the sentence is incorrect. "That night" should be changed to "at night" and marked as an adverbial prepositional phrase.	Change "that night" to "at night." Add parentheses around "at night," change the markings so that "at" is labeled as a preposition and "night" is labeled as the object of the preposition, and draw a line from "at" with an arrow pointing to "happened." Add the labels <i>adv</i> and <i>prep</i> in the appropriate places on the line with the arrow.
Pages 182–183, Chapter 8	The answers are showing in the student edition in the 2019 print.	See the last pages of this PDF for the pages without answers showing.
