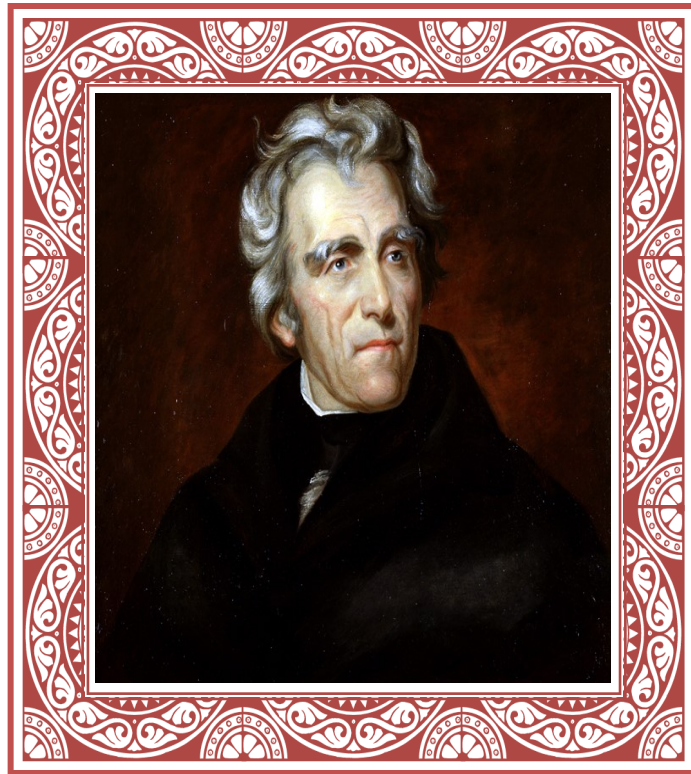

How do I get started?

First, you will want to gather your supplies. Depending on which format you purchased from us, you will need different supplies. So, take what applies, and skip over the rest.

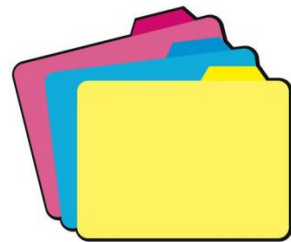
*** Printing:

- *Print instructions and Study Guide on white copy paper.
- *Print the booklet templates on 24# colored paper, unless noted otherwise.
- *White cardstock, where noted.



*** Assembly:

***Folders:** We use colored file folders, which can be found at Wal-Mart, Sam's, Office Depot, Costco, etc. You will need **3** file folders. You may use manila folders if you prefer, but we have found that children respond better with the brightly colored folders. Don't worry about the tabs.... they aren't important. If you prefer, you can purchase the assembled lapbook bases from our website.



***Glue:** For booklet assembly, we use glue sticks and sometimes hot glue, depending on the specific booklet. We have found that bottle glue stays wet for too long, so it's not a great choice for lapbooking.



***Other Supplies:** Of course, you will need scissors. Many booklets require additional supplies. Some of these include metal brad fasteners, paper clips, ribbon, yarn, staples, hole puncher, etc. You may want to add decorations of your own, including stickers, buttons, coloring pages, cut-out clipart, etc. The most important thing is to use your imagination! Make it your own!!



Ok. I've gathered the supplies. Now how do I use this product?

Inside, you will find several sections. They are as follows:

1. **Student Instruction Guide:** This section is written directly to the student, in language that he or she can understand. These instructions will tell the student exactly how to assemble the lapbook base and how to cut out and assemble each booklet. Here, they will find a layout of where each booklet should be placed in the lapbook and pictures of a completed lapbook. They will also tell the student exactly what should be written inside each booklet as he or she comes to it during the study. However, depending on the age of the child, there may be some parent/teacher assistance needed.
2. **Booklet Templates:** This section includes all of the template pages and components for the booklets within this lapbook.
3. **Study Guide:** This section includes most of the information that you need to teach this subject. You may choose to teach directly from the Study Guide, or you may choose to allow your student to read the Study Guide themselves depending on the age of the child and their ability to understand the concepts. Either way, you will find all of the information here.
4. **Resource Guide:** This section lists useful web site links or books that will be beneficial to your studies, or you may choose to extend your studies using them.

Grade Levels

This Lapbook may be used with a wide range of grade levels. Younger students may require assistance in creating the Lapbook booklets, but the content should be understandable for them. Older students may be required to do additional research and/or a research paper on the topic. You also have the option of adding a 4th folder to the Lapbook for older students to create additional booklets.

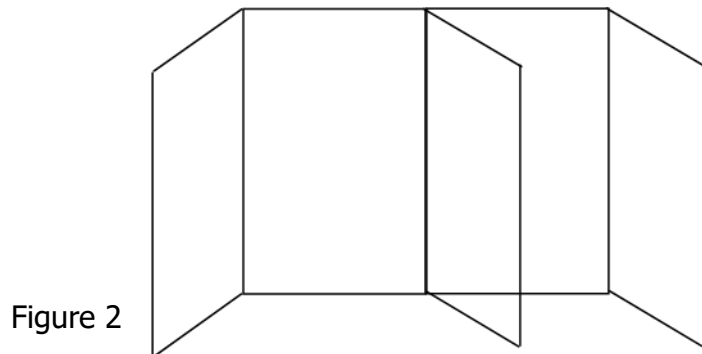
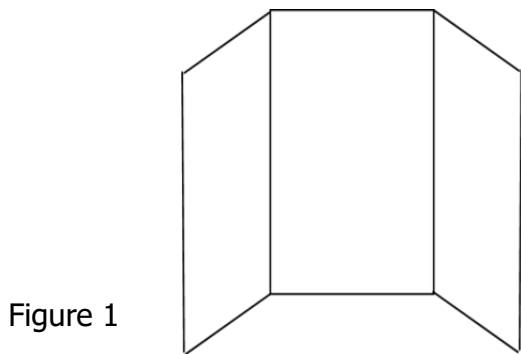

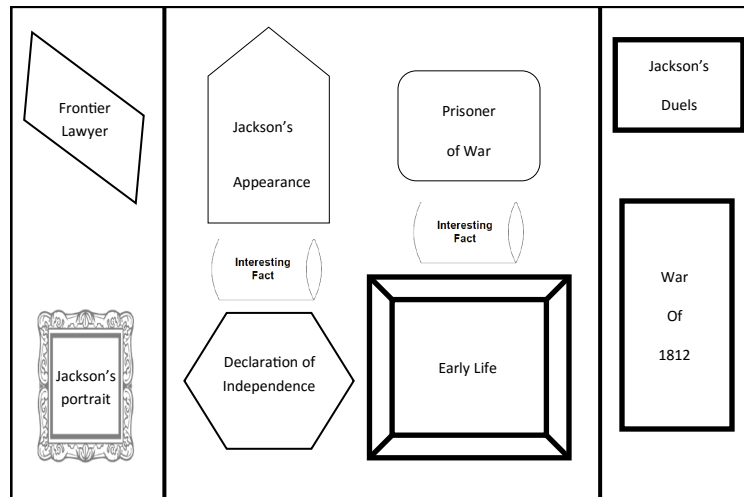
Layout & Pictures

You will need 3 folders of any color. Take each one and fold both sides toward the original middle fold and make firm creases on these folds (Figure 1). Then glue (and staple if needed) the backs of the small flaps together (Figure 2).



This is the "Layout" for your lapbook. The shapes are not exact on the layout, but you will get the idea of where each booklet should go inside your lapbook.

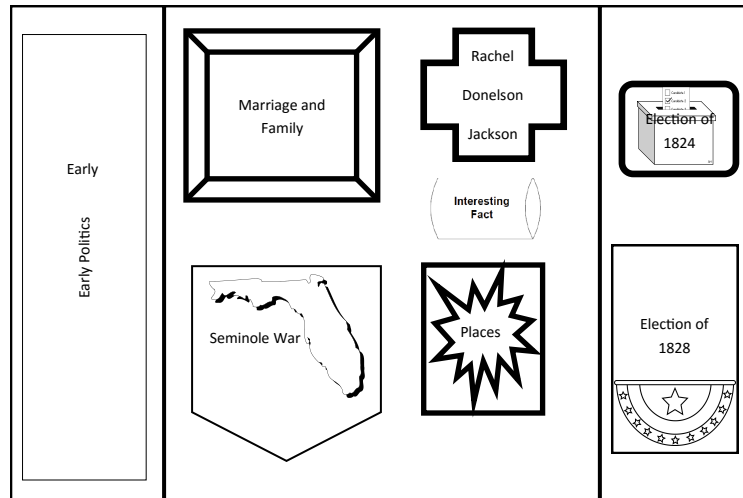

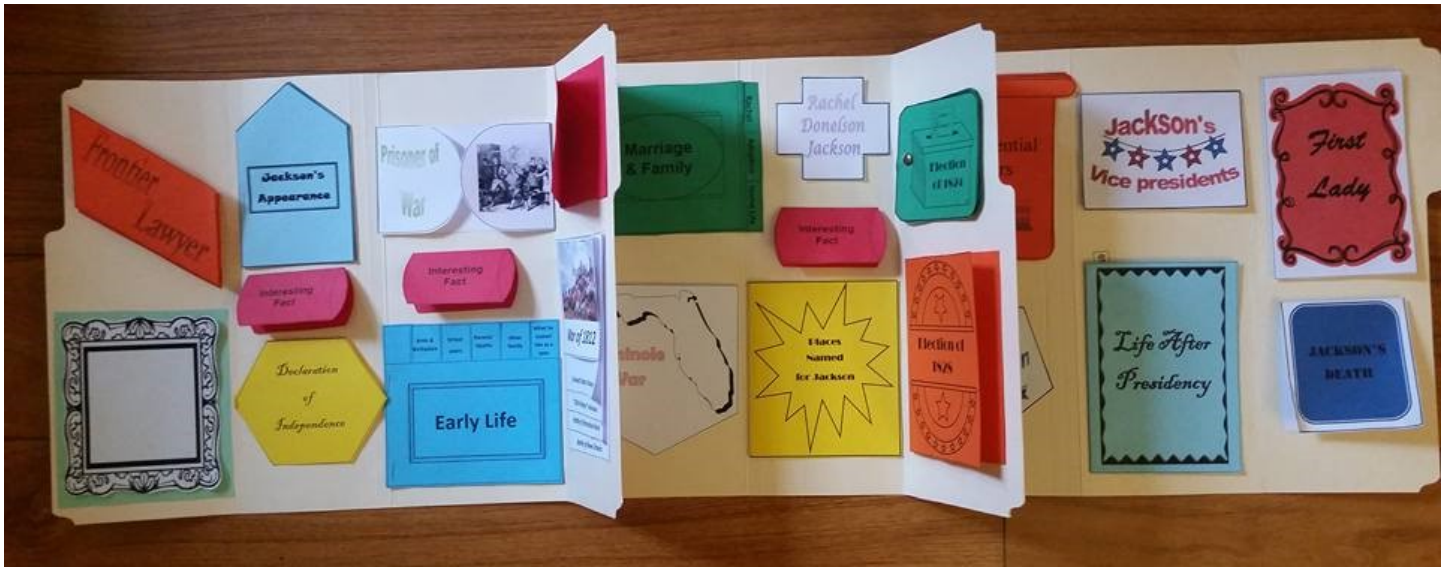

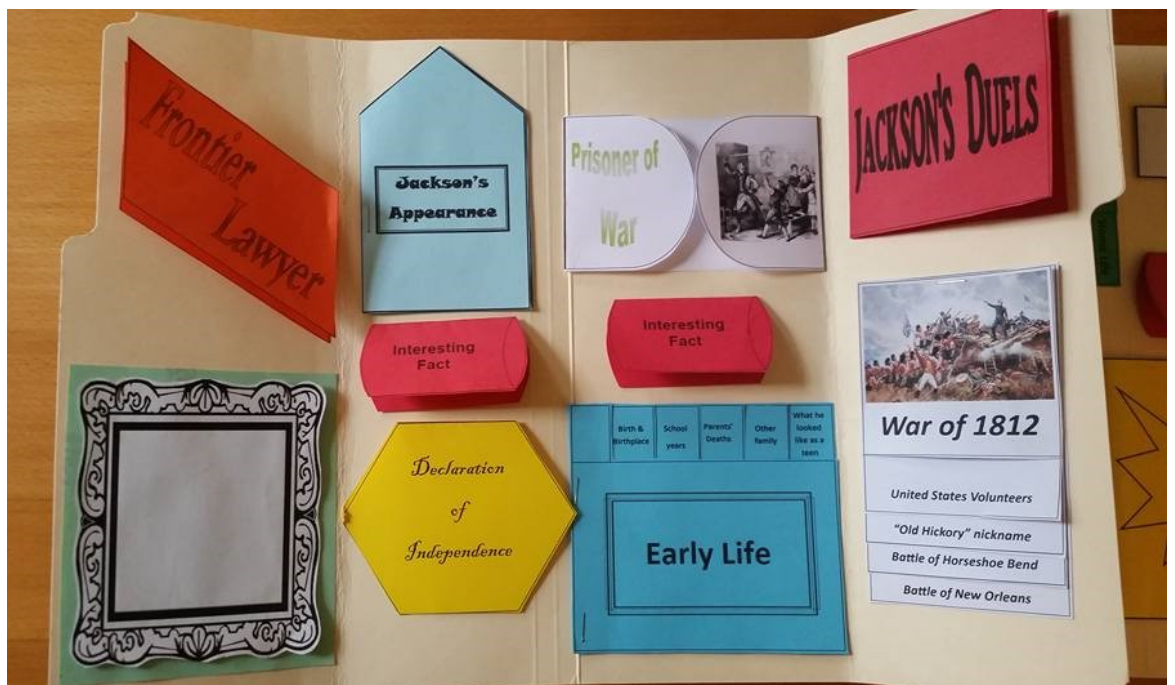

Student Instruction Guide

Booklet 1: Jackson's Appearance

Assembly Instructions: Cut out along the outer black line edges of the booklet and extra page. Fold the booklet along the center line so that the title is on the front. Place the extra page inside, and secure with a staple along the left side. Booklet will be glued into folder #1 (See Layout).

Completion Instructions: What are the physical characteristics that we know about Andrew Jackson as an adult? List them in this booklet, along with the reason why his sheer physical presence commanded great respect.

Booklet 2: Presidential Portrait

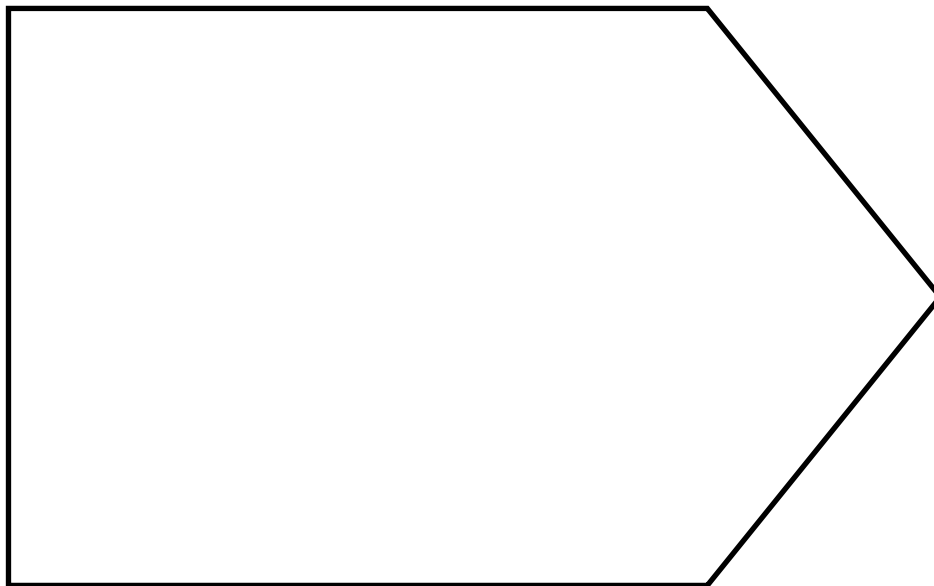
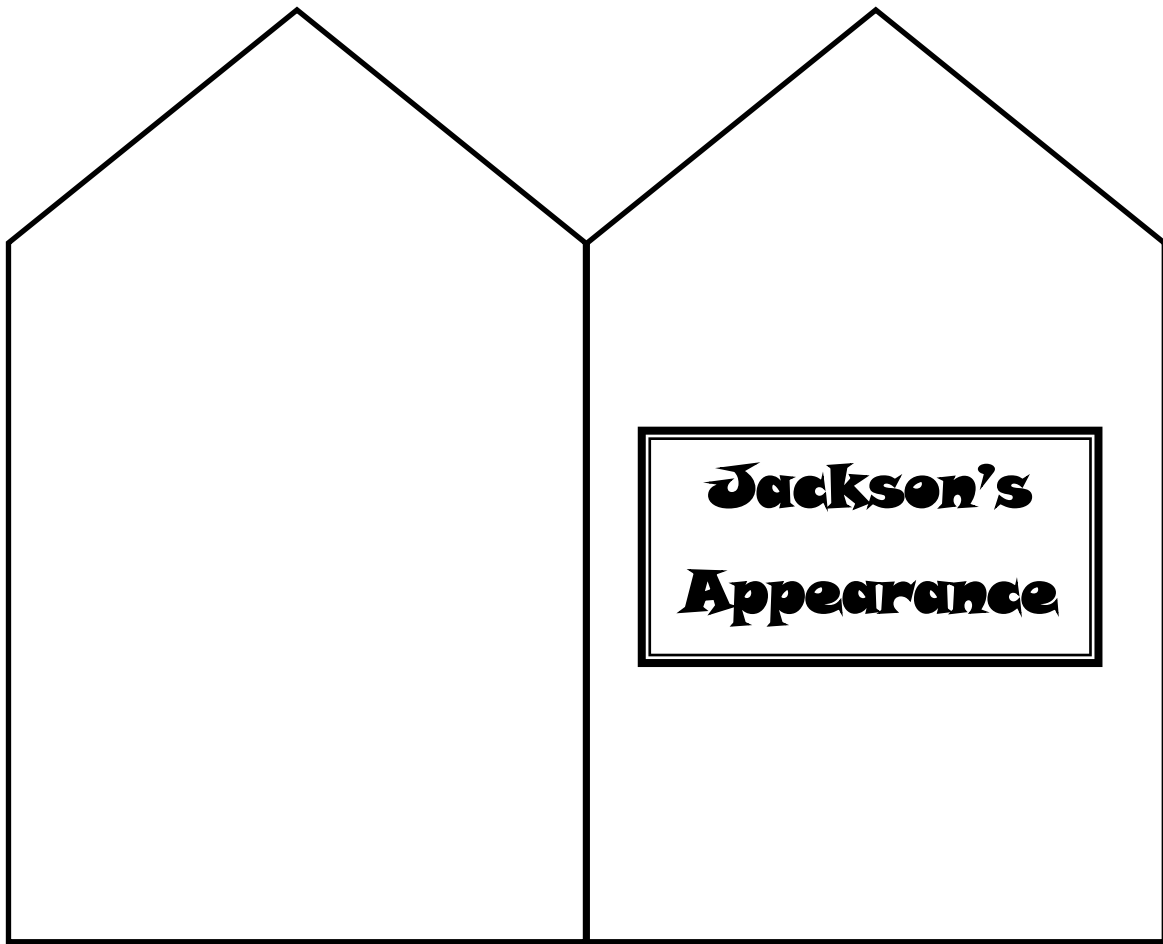
Assembly Instructions: Cut out along the outer black line edges of the picture frame. Glue to another piece of paper of a different color, and then cut around the edges to create a thin border. Booklet will be glued into folder #1 (See Layout).

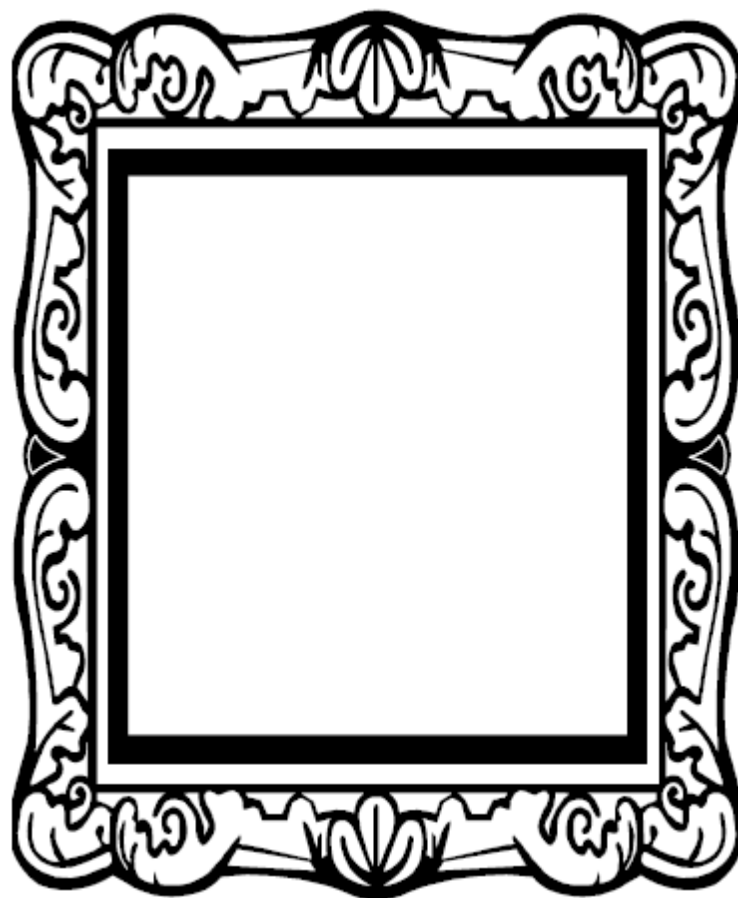
Completion Instructions: Inside this frame, draw a picture of Andrew Jackson. You may choose to print, cut out, and glue a picture of him here instead.

Booklet 3: Early Life

Assembly Instructions: Cut out along the outer black line edges of each of the six pages of the booklet. Stack the pages so that the tabs get longer toward the back and title is on top. Along the left side of the stack, secure with staples. You may choose to punch holes and secure with metal brad fasteners or ribbon. Booklet will be glued into folder #1 (See Layout).

Completion Instructions: Each page of this booklet covers a different part of Jackson's early years. Use these pages to write about each. You may choose to draw or glue pictures inside this booklet as well.

Study Guide

Physical Appearance

Andrew Jackson was tall and skinny. He measured 6 feet, 1 inch tall. His weight averaged between 130-140 pounds. His sandy colored hair as a youth turned red as he matured, eventually becoming completely white by the time he was elected president. His deep blue eyes were said by many to be one of his most prominent features.

Childhood/Revolutionary War

Born on March 15, 1767, Andrew Jackson never knew his father, who died just a few days before his birth. The senior Andrew and Elizabeth Jackson, Irish immigrants, moved their two sons to the colonies a couple of years before Andrew's birth. After her husband's death, Mrs. Jackson moved the family a few miles from the home her husband had built and into the log cabin of her sister, Jane Crawford. Some historians believe his aunt lived on the North Carolina side of the border, but Jackson always claimed he was born in South Carolina.

Andrew's mother worked hard to send him to the best school in the area, hoping he would become a minister. Unfortunately for her, Andrew didn't care much for school, despite the fact that he was a good reader. He was often in trouble because he fought with anyone who made fun of his habitual drooling. He enjoyed playing practical jokes. Andrew also liked participating in running and jumping contests, as well as horseback riding and hunting.

Many adults in his hometown could not read when Andrew was a boy, so those who were able to read often recited newspaper articles, important documents, and short stories to the crowds. Since Andrew could read at age 9, he participated in this and was chosen to read the Declaration of Independence to the people!

When the American Revolutionary War reached their hometown, Andrew, age 13, and his brothers Hugh and Robert joined the Patriots in fighting the British. A year after they joined, Robert and Andrew were captured. A story says Andrew refused to clean a British soldier's boots. Outraged, the officer brandished a sword. Andrew raised his hands to protect himself and was injured. The young Patriot's hand was cut to the bone, and he received a head wound, scarring him for life. Andrew and his brother were sent to a crowded prison where they caught smallpox. Robert died of smallpox two days after arriving home. Andrew gradually recovered. Hugh was killed in battle. Then, his mother traveled to Charleston to care for the prisoners and fell ill with cholera; she soon died. His experiences in the war embittered Andrew toward the British for the rest of his life. By the end of the Revolutionary War, both of his brothers and his mother had died. Andrew
