

## **About These Lessons**

The purpose of these lessons is twofold. The first purpose is to help students learn the proper formation of printed letters. The second part deals with beginning writing skills.

Some educators may not feel the need to teach printing because students today use computers and other media to express themselves. Here are some good reasons why it is imperative to teach young children how to make proper letter formations.

Good printing skills help:

- develop hand-eye coordination
- · organize visual-spatial skills
- · make transcribing easier and faster when printing is involved
- foster pride and confidence when presenting written work
- ensure that written communication is clear and easy to read

The second part of this book helps young children to begin to understand the fundamentals of written language skills. This is accomplished in a variety of ways.

- The vocabulary is organized by themes (At the Farm, At the Pet Store) and uses familiar words. The theme approach is also useful in teaching unfamiliar words to special needs students or those new to the English language.
- Students learn to write simple sentences using pattern sentences.
- The basic conventions are taught such as using a capital letter at the beginning of a sentence and a period at the end.
- By using a repetitive patterned approach, many children will remember the correct spelling of some words and will therefore be able to write more independently.
- With these basic writing skills mastered, students can then begin to use written language skills to express their creative ideas.

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Students practice each of the six basic strokes required for proper letter formation. They simply follow the arrows. The initial lessons introduce students to the basic strokes required for good printing. These six fundamental strokes should be practiced thoroughly. Correct letter formation will be learned much more quickly if this has been done. Students need to learn to follow the arrows.
