Staff must equip extra clothing and fluids, in the event that someone should capsize to sustain conditions and prevent worsening. Instructors must perform a kit check prior to entering the water to ensure that all parties have adequate equipment for the duration. Participation is prohibited if their clothing is inappropriate and no solution can be sourced. Dry Bags must be equipped to hold dry spare clothing. Fluids must also be equipped to sustain conditions. In tandem canoes, pairing must be made with consideration to size and ability to ensure the group has the faculty to stay together, thereby reducing the risk of exhaustion and other potential ailments.
