

The Best of Bowood: Summer Garden Essentials

There are so many plants that we love it seems an impossible task to choose a short list of key plants for building a garden. By dividing the growing season into three parts we are giving you the opportunity to plan (or revise) a garden in stages, and select elements from each list to keep your garden interesting year-round. Here we focus on summer, which for gardeners usually means the plants that flower and flourish from around the first of June until late August. This can be a challenging time for plants and hopefully you've left room for some of these champions of heat and humidity. Longer bloom times make it easier to keep the landscape in flower, combining well with the maturing foliage of the spring bloomers. Don't forget to consider the largest elements of your design first – maybe read the list from end to beginning – and to save room for fall bloomers!

Summer Bulbs, Roots, Rhizomes

Just like their spring-blooming cousins, these plants are happiest when given their own full sun space where they will be allowed to spread unimpeded, their roots left undisturbed and where watering can be monitored.

- Best planted in the fall: Allium (Ornamental Onion) and Lilium (Lily)
- Plant bareroot in spring, or potted anytime: Iris, Hemerocallis (Daylily)
- Plant in spring, dig in fall after a frost: Dahlia, Canna, Colocasia (Elephant Ears) or choose winter-hardy cultivars.

Shade Perennials

Hosta dominates the summer shade garden with extreme variations in size and wonderful variants of green. Enliven them with plants that provide contrasting textures, colorful foliage and splashes of flowering.

Sun Perennials

Summer brings an explosion of long-lasting color with these easy-care plants that take the heat and humidity.

Vines

Decorating arbors, trellises and bare walls and fences, vines add vertical foliage and flowering interest.

Shade Shrubs

Dominating this category are the many long-flowering cultivars of bigleaf hydrangeas, but don't forget the broadleaf evergreens which are stalwarts of the shade even when they have finished blooming.

Sun Shrubs

A mixture of deciduous and evergreen shrubs can bring texture and substantial bulk even when not flowering.

Trees

Some of the easiest trees to maintain, especially in a small garden, are also the most striking either as a background for shrubs and perennials or as a specimen that becomes the focal point for the whole garden.
