


The Zen of Stringing has truly taken off! One of most popular projects to date, Janice has hit it out of the park with her relaxing knotting and stringing techniques in her beadwork. This week, we explore a new colorway and style, playing with adding a tassel and chain. We'll also look at how Janice took inspiration from a focal piece (a stunning Green Girl Studios piece!) and created an necklace around it.

Not very chatty today...

Minute Marker 5:30

Kate begins with a little refresher on our past <u>Zen of Stringing</u> projects, as well as the <u>Chunky Tribal Collars</u> that she an Emily created just a few weeks ago...here's a peek!





Kate also takes a few moments to go over our <u>Star Cut stones</u>: gorgeous, irregular faceted beads that lend themselves to this design beautifully. In the Zen of Stringing we'll be working with <u>Matte Dumortierite</u> and <u>Matte Natural Agate</u>, but we do carry several others. Kate marvels at the rainbow effect during the show, and true to her word she has started an "<u>endless strand</u>" of knotted star cuts, and you can <u>follow her progress</u> through her posts in our private Facebook Community, <u>the Bead Table</u>.

Minute Marker 33:00

To begin, Kate situates her <u>focal centerpiece</u> the way she likes it and starts on the tassel. She slides ten 1-foot-long strands of <u>Navy C-Lon</u> through one of the many openings in the pendant to their center, then folds them over, giving 20 tails to this tassel. Janice says to make sure you have an opening opposite this to hang your pendant from your necklace! Kate <u>Silk Wraps</u> with <u>Light Copper C-Lon</u> to secure the tassel in place.















Minute Marker 43:30

Using a piece of scrap paper with some measurements marked on it, Kate can accurately size her tassel just as she wants it. "Going rogue," Kate wants to add Czech Drops to her tassel, so keep in mind that you will need an extra strand of Drops if you decide to make yours this way, or, you can make yours like Janice's original and use a symmetrical pattern of:





Stiffen the ends of your C-Lon to make self needles using a plastic baggie and a dab of zap glue. String your pattern of beads on and knot into place. Use your paper to help place your beads and knots accurately, and again to help you trim the tails. Kate knots some beads along the length of her tassel and adds drops to the bottom, whereas Janice's sample has beads only at the bottom. It's up to you what you do! Kate secures her drops by bringing her C-Lon back up through her beads and silk wrapping (see photo above as well as below, right.)







Minute Marker 57:00

Moving on from the tassel, let's see how the rest of the necklace is constructed. Kate is using the <u>Ultimate Design Board</u> and <u>Metal Bead Triangles</u> to help keep her project organized.

Kate notes that the necklace part is attached to the focal in the same manner as the tassel. Each side of the necklace has 6 strands, and you want plenty of length since this is the necklace itself and there will be knots. Kate thinks 26" is a good length, she later decides this is a bit short—**go for 30"**. Keep in mind we only need six strands here, since we'll be folding the in half and separating them, half for one side of the necklace and half for the other. Again, silk wrap these strands together.

Minute Marker 1:05:30

Kate takes all her strands at once and stiffens them with Zap glue using a plastic baggie to help spread and saturate with glue...then pulls out each strand one at a time. Move quickly so you don't glue your threads together! Separate so you have six strands per side of the necklace.







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Minute Marker 1:08:00

Just bead! Add beads and knots just as we have in previous Zen of Stringing pieces. Use knots to hold beads in place and to allow for your C-Lon to show through. Kate suggests splitting your beads in half to ensure that there will be enough for both sides of the necklace (you don't want to use them all up on one side and not have any or enough for the other!) In this section, Janice uses all of her beads except the Czech Drops, which she saves for the next step, and the O Beads, which are only in her tassel. Take note, Kate *is* using her O Beads in this section of necklace. Bead and knot for about 6" per side, and then silk wrap the six strands together. Above the silk wraps, bead again, this time using only your Czech Drops and Matte Dumortierite Star Cuts.







Minute Marker 1:21:00

As we mentioned earlier, Kate cut her strands too short, and so she's going to end her first beaded section a bit early and in a different way, before moving on to the Czech Drops section. Using a single link from the Fancy Pants chain, she ends this first beaded section by looping her threads through the link and silk wrapping them closed (for the video purposes, she actually ties these in an overhand knot, but a silk wrap would keep the overall look cohesive, repeating that technique).





Janice ends her necklace much in this same way, silk wrapping to the chain and leaving her Navy C-Lon tails to hand as tassels. This piece does not have a clasp, the chain enables you to slider this right over your head. Measure to fit yourself! You can, of course, use less chain and make a shorter necklace, just use two shorter lengths of chain and attach a <u>lobster claw</u> at the rear. Kate also points out Janice's name tag! A cute and clever way to brand your jewelry, and here are her resources for tags:

- 1 Spool Navy Regular C-Lon
- 1 Spool Light Copper Regular C-Lon
- 1 Tube 11-4244 Duracoat S/L Dyed Persimmon 11/0s
- 1 Tube 8-138F Matte Transparent Orange 8/0s
- 1 Tube <u>Jet Chrome Full</u> O Beads
- 1 Strand Purple Matte Iris Czech Drops
- 1 Strand Matte Natural Agate Star Cuts
- 1 Strand Matte Dumortierite Star Cuts
- 1 Strand Matte Angelite 6mm Stone Rounds
- 1 Two Goldfish in a Pond Pendant
