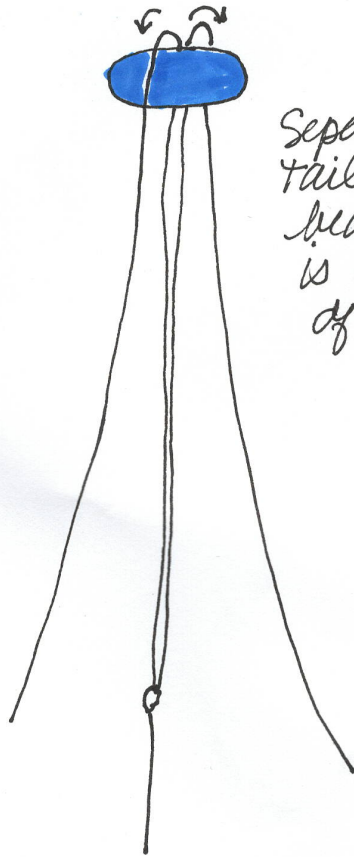
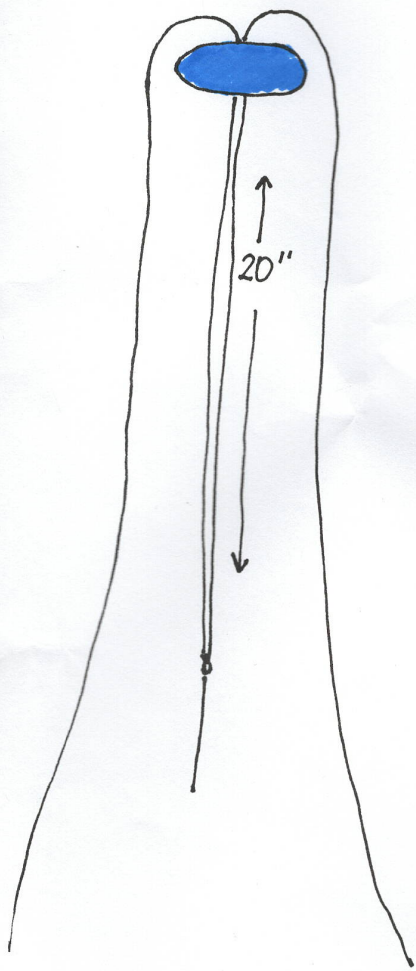
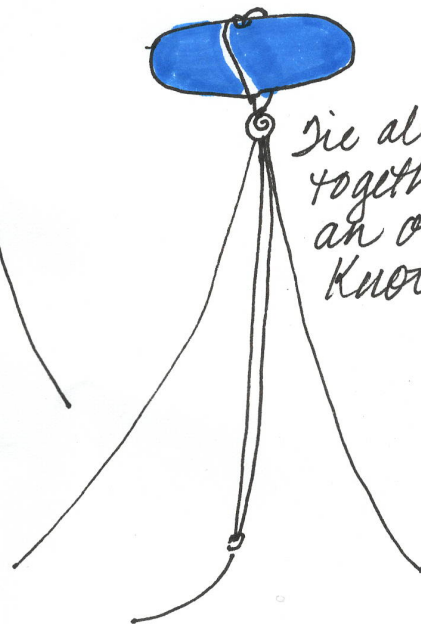


These lovely gemstones have small holes and fit on Micro C-Low Thread using medium or fine Collapsible eye needle. For a single bracelet:

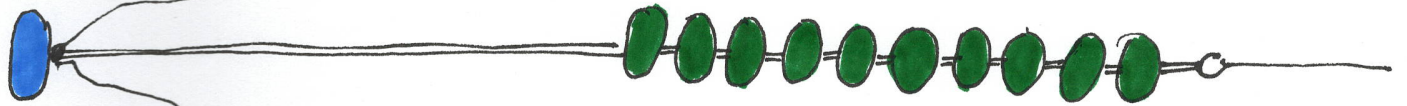
1. Begin by cutting $2\frac{1}{2}$ yards (90 inches) of thread. Thread your needle and bring the two tails together... no need to knot the tails. String on your bead that will act as your button.
2. String bead about 20 inches away from your needle. Tie an overhand knot below your button bead.



Separate threads so one tail is on one side of the bead and the other tail is on the opposite side of the bead.

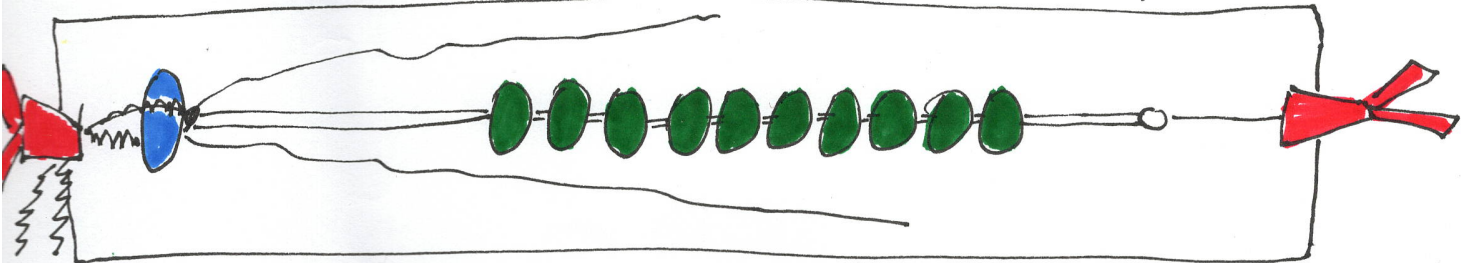


Tie all threads together in an overhand knot.

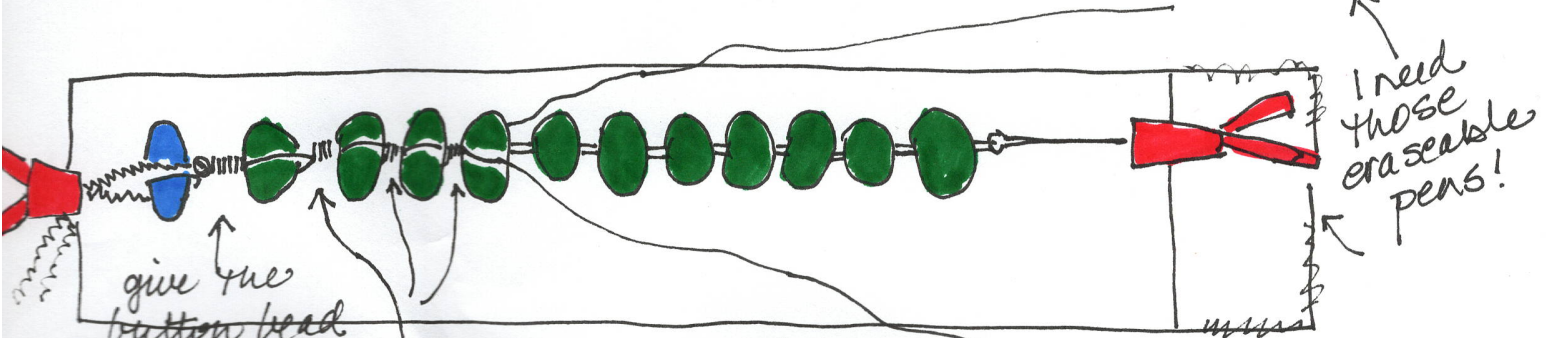


3. String on brines.

4. Secure your project to a macramé board or velvet pad using twine and clampers.



5. Slide your bead closest to the button bead and macramé several square knots ^{below}.



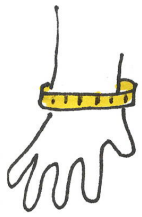
give the button bead extra knots (6-8) so it can move freely.

You can make all the rest the same or more. The tails go around each bead and macramé knot underneath.


I did 2 full square knots. continue this until it measures your desired length LESS the button loop (still to make).


6. To check your desired length:

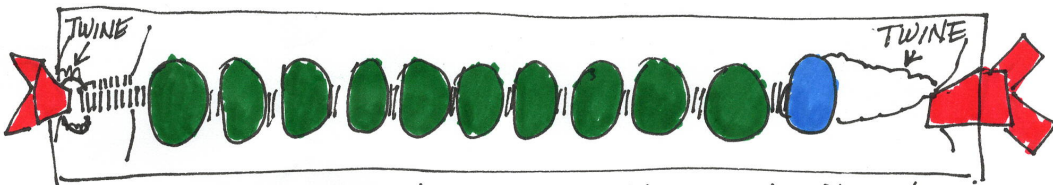
Loosely fit a tape measure around your wrist with your arm facing your feet



← you don't want to measure too tightly. You want to be able to fit a finger under the tape measure. It is also important to try the sample on your wrist as you go.

7. Leave enough length for your button loop. The loop should be knotted $2 \times$ the length of your button bead. 

8.  check that these long group of knots will fit all the way around your button bead. It can not be shorter than that.



9. Position the button loop knots in the twine so it's folded in half. The long tails should be on the underside, along with the needle + thread. (You can actually cut the needle and thread off, but leave about an inch)

10. Macramé the bottom with the top knots together towards your first bead. 2-3 complete square knots should do. Add a dab of glue to last knots. Let it dry and cut excess threads away.
